County Livestock Show Plans Animal Judging As 'Packers'

All animals in the fat stock division of the annual Eastland County Livestock show, March 23 and 29, will be judged on a packer basis as they have in past years, C. M. McCain, general superintendent, said today.

Fat steers will be placed as prime, choice, good or medium and will carry cash prizes of \$15.00, \$9.00, \$6.00 and \$3.00, respectively, depending upon how they are graded.

Lambs will be placed prime, choice or good and the amount of prize money will be \$5.00, \$3.00 and \$2.00; whereas fat pigs are to be either choice, good or medium will carry prizes of \$5.00, \$3.00 and \$1.00.

Each exhibitor is limited to two animals in the various classes except that FFA chapters or 4-H Clubs may exhibit five animals as a project of the club or chapter.

The lambs or pigs may be either sex. The lambs must be shown with their wool on. Fat pigs must come within the weight limit of 175 to 225 pounds or be eliminated from the show. Many of the barrows and gilts in the past have been too fat either for the show or as a top quality market animal.

The following is an editorial written about Carbon in 1909 by J. S. Davis while he was publisher of The Messenger in the 1920's. It is titled "My First Visit To Carbon" and reads as follows:

It was Saturday in the fall of 1909. We were visiting a farm house one mile south of town.

Early that morning the wagons, buggies, horse-backers, and pedestrians began to stream by. They kept on pouring into town until the afternoon. The streets, alleys, and all vacant spots were filled with these teams and vehicles.

The stores were jammed with customers until one had to wait for his turn. The girls were pretty but on bobbed hair nor short skirts. No automobiles were honking down the streets, no filling stations nor garages; but a very fine livery stable. Mud was knee deep in the streets, but what did it matter? The sturdy mule teams pulled right through it. We thought Carbon was the busiest little town we ever saw. It was and it is. But things have changed.

Incidentally a Ranger Junior High club girl is chairman of the group, Sandra Alsop.

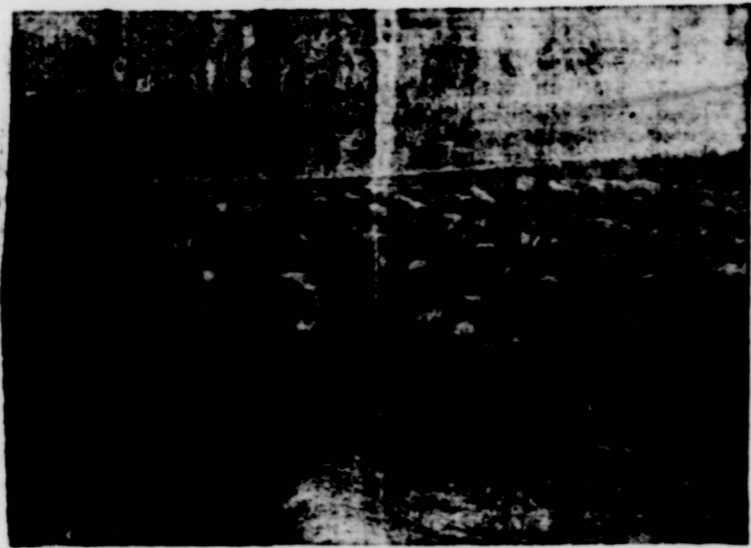
A Pleasant Hill boy, Park Plambeck, Jr. is a member of the Cisco Junior High club. Park

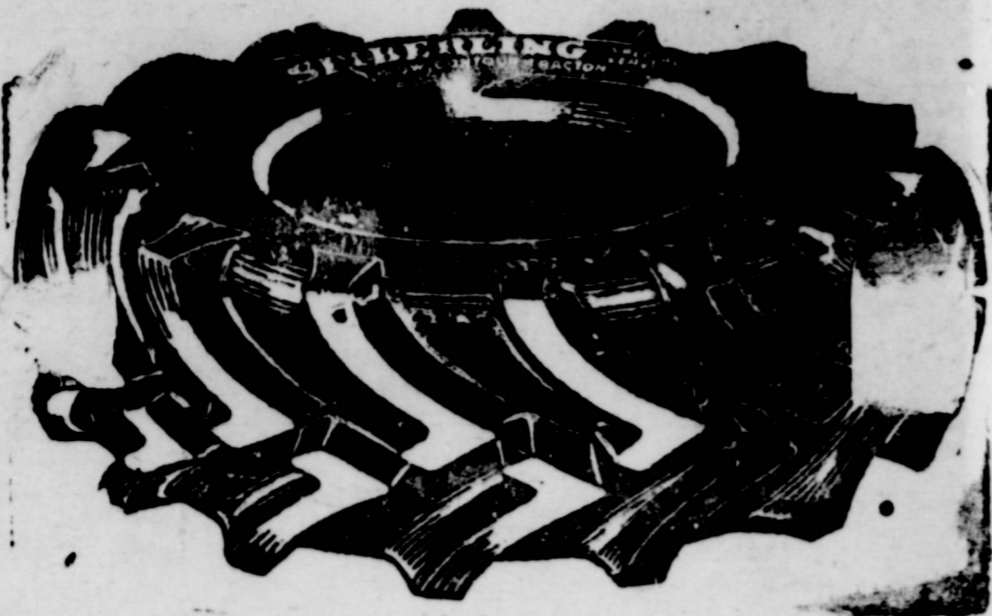

House plants like other living things need moisture, air and plant food; peat facilitates drainage and lets air get to the roots, and increases the water holding capacity of the mixture.

This soil mixture should be suitable for most house plants such as geraniums, philodendron, ivies and begonias. Plants such as succulents, cactus and sedums require a mixture with more sand to provide necessary drainage. One-third peat, one-third sharp sand and one-third garden soil makes a good mixture for these cactus type plants. Prepared soils are available from local florist shops and garden suppliers for those who do not have the facilities for preparing potting soils at home.

Black spot and powdery mildew are the most common leaf diseases of roses in Texas. Extension Specialists advise the use of control measures, dusting or spraying, as soon as the first new shoots begin to develop.

Black spot is the disease which causes the large roundish, black spots with irregular or frayed margins on the soft twigs and leaves. It will soon be making its appearance. One of the best preventative treatments, is the use of a sulphur-copper dust mixture, 90 parts of sulphur and 10 parts of copper, applied weekly except during hot, dry weather. Applications made during such weather may cause burning.

During wet weather, the rose plants should be thoroughly dusted or sprayed. If the disease becomes established, spray with

captan, maneb or zineb. Both sides of the leaves should be coated with the spray material. Spraying will give better results than dusting.

Powdery mildew causes white powdery coating on the leaves, buds and young stems of the rose plant. The sulphur-copper mixture is recommended for early control and as a preventative treatment because it is cheaper than other materials. However, if powdery mildew becomes established, then weekly sprayings with karathane or mildex are suggested. If both diseases become established, a combination of chemicals may be used. In general, the yellow and white varieties are more susceptible to these diseases. Radiance and red Radiance varieties are resistant to both.
