New Road From Carbon To Cisco Is Approved

The Texas Highway Commission has approved a Farm-to-Market project that will provide a paved road from Carbon west to the Cisco-Rising Star Highway, it was reported by County Judge John Hart. The project will give residents of the Carbon and Pleasant Hill communities a direct road to Cisco.

Plans for the road are being completed by the highway department's county engineer, Gordon Smith, and staff. When surveying work is completed in the near future, Commissioner Ed McCannies of the Cisco precinct will be in charge of the right-of-way buying.

Judge Hart believes that construction work will begin early next year. Plans call for the new pavement to go west from Carbon to Highway 183 near Reed's Store, about 7 miles south of Cisco.

When this road is completed, Highway 6 through Carbon will be a straight-line road through Cisco via Highway 183 and Highway 880 to Albany and north and northwest.

Proper care can keep white
nylons looking bright throughout
their lifetime. Wash white nylons
separately. Colored articles
included with white garments are
likely to fade and discolor the
white.

Wash nylon garments thor-
oughly after each wearing.
Home furnishings articles, too,
should be laundered as often as
necessary to maintain a pleasing
appearance. Pretreat heavily
soiled areas with a paste of water

and heavy-duty detergent before
placing in the machine or hand-
washing. Machine washing,
whenever possible, is the most
effective way to launder white
nylon. After pretreatment, wash
in warm water, using a heavy-
duty detergent, a non-precipita-
ting type water softener, and a
liquid sodium hypochlorite
bleach.

Nylon brighteners such as
"Pro-Nyl" or "Nylonu", available
for consumer use, will help main-
tain the whiteness level of nylon
garments when used repeatedly.

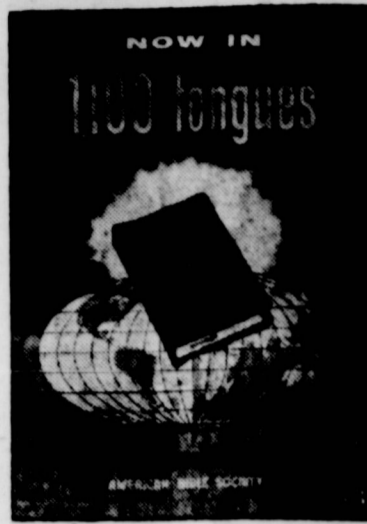

Questions & Answers

Q — My world War II GI term insurance policy lapsed two months ago. I'd like to reinstate and, at the same time, convert to a permanent plan. What premiums will I have to pay?

A — You will have to pay one monthly premium at the term rate plus the first premium at the rate required by your new permanent policy. Also, you must sign a statement that you are in as good health as you were when the term policy lapsed.

Q — If a school drops a veteran enrolled under the Korean GI Bill because of too many absences, would he be allowed to make his one-and-only change of course and study something else?

A — Only if he can establish that his unsatisfactory attendance record was due to reasons beyond his control. If he cannot establish this fact, he will be denied further training, under the law.

Q — I understand that World War II veterans must apply for GI loans before July 25, 1958. Does this mean I actually must have obtained my GI loan money before this date?

A — Not necessarily. Instead, the lender must have agreed to make you the loan, and must have requested VA's approval, before the deadline date.

Though washable garments, such as slips, blouses, shirts, in the new synthetic fibers are tops in ease of care and length of wear, they sometimes tend to cling to the body in cold, dry weather.

Scientific research, which developed these fibers, has come up with an effective, easy way of combating this tendency — just add a small amount of liquid detergent, fabric softener, or a special liquid anti-static agent to the final rinse water. Liquid detergents and fabric softeners —

often marked as "laundry rinses" can be purchased at most grocery stores. Liquid anti-static agents can be obtained at notion counters in drug or department stores.

Try new garnishes for soup . . . Everyday food items which make unusual soup garnishes are thin strips of canned pimiento, paper thin slices of lemon, orange or lime, slices of stuffed olive, and grated or crumbled cheese. Whipped cream with a dash of horseradish is good with some types of soups. With tomato soup, try popped corn.
