Magnolia Has New Kiel Pool Oiler

Prospects for Caddo Line of production in the Nined area, 12 miles southwest of Cisco, appeared bright Saturday as completion work continued in Low Drilling Company's No. 1 F1 Townsend, a wildcat test. Oil men believed the well would be good for at least 30 barrels per day.

Drilled to 2,905 feet, the well began testing last Wednesday. Swabbing work indicated that a substantial well was in prospect. The hole was shut-in Friday with work to be resumed Monday.

Low Drilling Company of Cisco drilled the well as a farm-out from Magnolia Petroleum Company, which has substantial acreage holdings in that area. There is 194 acres in the Low farm-out block, it was understood. It was expected that Magnolia would drill an offset to the Townsend well.

In the Jo Kiel pool, Magnolia has filed a completion report on their No. 4 R. H. Dunning. The well flowed 88 barrels during a 24-hour potential test through a 14/64 inch choke with 300 pounds of casing pressure. Flow was from 24 perforations at 2,838-42 feet.

Location for the Dunning well is Section 92, Block 3, H&TC Survey.

A new wildcat for the area two miles west of Scranton in Callahan County is the Moore & Moore Drilling Co. No. 1 M. E. Fitzpatrick, a 3,500 foot project. Location is 2,922 feet from the north and 2,582 feet from the east lines of Section 20, BOA Survey, Callahan County.

Income Tax Law Provides Benefit For Drought Loss

A. E. Fogle, Jr., Administrative Officer of the Internal Revenue Service office, today called attention to a provision of the Federal income tax law which may benefit farmers of this area who have been forced to dispose of livestock because of drought condition.

Mr. Fogle explained that under a section of the Internal Revenue Code added in 1956, the forced sale of livestock used for draft, breeding or dairy purposes solely on account of drought may be treated as an "involuntary conversion" if the farmer so elects. This means that any profit on the sale will not be subject to Federal income tax provided the sales proceeds are reinvested in the same kind of livestock within one year following the year of sale.

Mr. Fogle pointed out that this new provision applies only to livestock sold during the year in excess of the number that would normally have been sold in the absence of drought. He made it clear that this new rule does not apply to sales of poultry.

Mr. Fogle stated that in order to qualify, the livestock sold must be replaced with livestock of a like kind used for the same purpose. For example, dairy cows

sold must be replaced with dairy cows. He noted that the period for replacement may be extended beyond the end of the year following the year of sale upon application and showing of reasonable cause to the Internal Revenue Service district director's office.

Mr. Fogle pointed out that farmers who qualify and elect to take advantage of this tax relief should submit the following information with their income tax return for the year of sale:

1. Evidence of the existence of the drought conditions which forced the sale of livestock;
2. A computation of the amount of profit realized on the sale;
3. The number and kind of livestock sold;
4. The number of livestock of each kind that would normally have been sold in the absence of drought.

The return for the year in which the livestock are replaced should contain the following information:

1. The date of purchase of the replacement livestock;
2. The cost of the replacement livestock;
3. The number and kind of the replacement livestock.

In event replacement is not made within the time prescribed, an amended return should be filed for the year of sale and any additional tax due paid.

Mr. Fogle stated that taxpayers having questions on this or any other Federal tax matter may obtain help by visiting the Internal Revenue office at Abilene.

For easy seeing, make sure the bulbs you buy are the right size for their intended use. Bulbs that are too

small may result in eye fatigue, as well as dim and cheerless places in your home.

The list below shows recommended bulb sizes for some of the most commonly used lamps and fixtures. It's your guide to better light . . . with the right bulb in the right place.

Table and end table lamps	150 watt
Floor lamps	300 watt
Kitchen ceiling fixture	150 watt
Multiple socket ceiling fixtures (per socket)	60 or 75 watt
Tin-to-wall lamps	100 or 150 watt
Vanity lamps	100 watt

For three-way lamps, use the following bulb sizes: Floor lamps, 100-200-300 watt three-light; table and end table lamps, 50-100-150 watt or 30-200-230 watt three-light; vanity lamps, 30-70-100 watt three-light; wall lamps, 50-100-150 watt three-light.

Easy TV Supper Features Chicken Cutlets With Cranberry-Apple Relish

Both the Chicken Cutlets and the Cranberry-Apple Relish for this TV Supper can be made ahead of time. At mealtime the Chicken Cutlets are fried to a piping hot golden brown while the sauce and the asparagus (or other favorite vegetable) are heating. Treat yourself to a real lazy and relaxing evening by serving this meal on paper plates or trays and end dish washing worries for the evening! You'll have fun fixing and serving this meal. You may want to treat your friends to this TV supper idea whenever they come around and you don't want to stay in the kitchen!

CHICKEN CUTLET WITH EASY SAUCE.
 Green Olive Garpish
 Buttered Hot Asparagus
 CHERRY CRANBERRY-APPLE RELISH
 Hot Bread Sticks
 Ginger Cookies to Pass

INGREDIENTS FOR CHICKEN CUTLETS
 1-1/3 cups water
 1 teaspoon salt
 2/3 cup uncooked white rice
 2 cups finely diced cooked chicken
 1 tablespoon chopped onion
 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
 3/4 teaspoon salt
 1/4 teaspoon pepper
 2 egg yolks
 2 egg whites, slightly beaten
 1 cup fine cracker crumbs
 Cooking fat for frying cutlets
 1 1/2 1/2 oz. can condensed cream of chicken soup
 1/2 cup water

INGREDIENTS FOR CRANBERRY-APPLE RELISH:
 2 cups cranberries
 2 apples, pared and cored
 1 orange
 1 lemon
 1/4 cup beet or cane sugar

METHOD FOR MAKING CHICKEN CUTLETS: Put the water, salt and rice in a 2-quart saucepan and bring to a vigorous boil. Turn the heat as low as possible. Cover the saucepan with a lid. Leave over this low heat for 14 minutes. Turn off heat. Leave lid on for 10 minutes. Add the chicken, onion, lemon rind, salt, pepper and egg yolks to the rice and mix thoroughly. Separate the mixture into 6 equal portions of 1/2 cup each. Press into balls. Chill. Cover if mixture is left in refrigerator more than two hours. Press the rice and chicken mixture together firmly and shape into "pork chop shaped" cutlets.

Dip cutlets first into the egg whites, then into cracker crumbs. Fry, in a skillet of hot fat, cooking one side to a golden brown before turning. Serve hot with a sauce made by heating together the chicken soup and water. The cutlets may be kept hot for about 30 minutes by placing them uncovered in a 250° F. oven.

This recipe makes 6 cutlets.

METHOD FOR MAKING CRANBERRY-APPLE RELISH: Put cranberries and apples through a food chopper. Quarter oranges and lemon, removing seeds and put through food chopper. Add to the cranberry-apple mixture. Mix in the sugar. Chill in the refrigerator before serving. This relish may be stored in the refrigerator for several weeks. Pass the cranberry-apple relish or serve on the tray with the cutlets.
