Disabled Children May Obtain Social Security Benefits

Several disabled children over 18 years of age received their first monthly social security checks in February, according to C. M. Vaden, Jr., Field Representative of the Abilene Social Security Office. Recent legislation provided for these payments to start for the month of January, 1957. A number of applications have already been filed, and more are being received.

Under the new provisions, children who are disabled may receive social security benefits after they reach age 18, if they were disabled before age 18, are unmarried and dependent upon a deceased insured parent. The term "parent" includes natural

Ten Patrolmen Are Assigned To 33-Mile Toll Road

A contingent of ten Texas Highway Patrolmen has been assigned to the new 33-mile toll road, linking Fort Worth and Dallas, to be opened to the public in the near future, it was reported here.

Jack Sutherland, currently captain of the Fort Worth patrol district, has accepted the lower rank of sergeant in order that he may be assigned the command spot of the crew that will patrol the modern thoroughfare.

Other patrolmen assigned to the toll road are: E. J. Wimberly, now stationed at Weatherford; L. E. Wickham, Fort Worth; J. O. McMains, Fort Worth; C. M. Lewis, Fort Worth; R. L. Taylor, Arlington; J. B. Claybrook, San Antonio; D. K. Stevens, Ballinger; J. W. Wilson, Tyler, and Leroy C. Swope, presently stationed at Brownsville.

The patrolmen will use the latest and most efficient equipment in their toll road assignment. Their patrol cars will be new models fully equipped with police, high powered, interceptor engines for maximum acceleration and high speed. The patrol units also will have red dome lights, and two sets of radios connecting them with the Texas Department of Public Safety and the Toll Road Authority. Each car will carry complete first aid equipment, shotgun, and safety equipment to clearly mark accident scenes.

Not only will the patrolmen be able to render first aid in the event of an accident, they will have with them a two-gallon can of gasoline for those who are unfortunate enough to run out of fuel. And they will carry fire extinguishers and cameras to be used in the event of an accident, as well as road maps and a booklet explaining Texas traffic laws.

All of these services are aimed at supplying the public's need in service and in safety.

North Zone Mourning Dove Season Opens September 1

The 1957 shooting season for mourning dove in the North zone will begin Sunday noon, September 1, according to the director of law enforcement of the Game & Fish Commission. Thirty days later the season will open in the South zone. The seasons for the north zone will be September 1 to October 17 inclusive; south zone, October 1 to November 17, inclusive. The white wing season has been authorized for the Rio Grande Valley area for September 13, 15, and 17.

Shooting is allowed from noon until sunset with the bag limit of 10 per day and with 10 in possession. Under federal and state regulations all shotguns must be plugged to three-shell capacity. Shooting from vehicles or across the highways is prohibited. The directors issued warning to shooters to make arrangements with land owners for their hunts.

Three East Texas counties, Jasper, Tyler and Newton, will have no open season. In a local bill, these counties were excluded from the general laws and a special season was set up. This special season is in conflict with

the federal laws.

Reports from all over the state indicate the largest dove crop in years. It is estimated that some 600,000 white wings will be available for the Valley hunt.

Mourning doves are plentiful now in every area, it was reported. Unless there is a drastic change in weather conditions before September 1, they are expected to remain in the local areas. Cooler weather or rains could change this condition. Water hole shooting also can be affected greatly, especially if heavy rains fill new water holes, providing too much water in various areas where food is available.

"Every safety precaution should be used," the director said. "Hunting season usually brings on several accidental deaths, due entirely to carelessness."

He also warned that all persons between the ages of 17 and 65 need licenses when hunting outside their home counties. These licenses now are available from wardens and other authorized license dealers throughout the state.

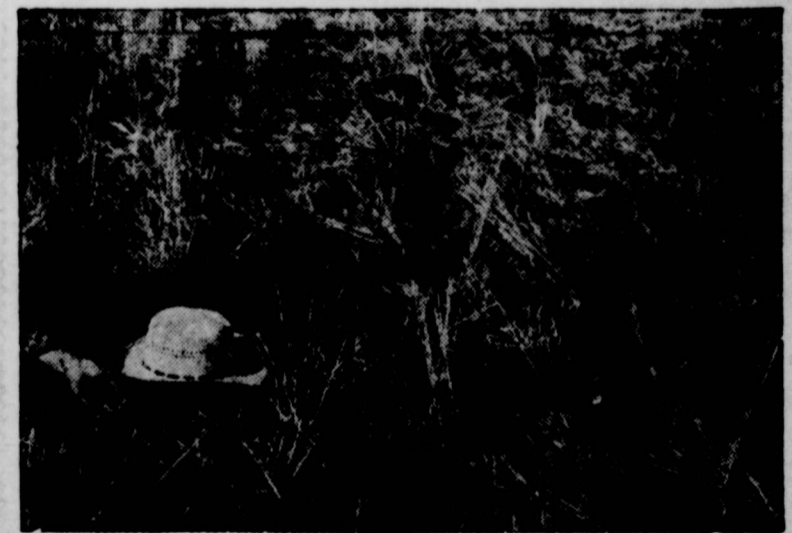

ASC Office Is Holding Annual Poll For Community Committee

Balloting by mail began recently in most Eastland County communities for the election of five men from each community

to serve on the community committee from 1958, it was announced by Emmett E. Powell, office manager of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conserva-

tion. The election will close September 6.

Ten men were nominated by the community election committee to be submitted to the farmers, it was reported. The five receiving the highest number of votes will be named the 1958 community committee, consisting of chairman, vice-chairman, member, and two alternates. The

It is not necessary that the child himself have any record of work under the social security law to be eligible for benefits as a disabled child, it was pointed out. However, he must have a disability severe enough to prevent him from engaging in any substantial gainful activity. The disability must be medically determinable.

Disabled children over 18 who believe they qualify, or persons caring for them, should inquire regarding benefits by writing the Social Security Administration, P. O. Box 1641, Abilene, Texas, Vaden advised.
