Agreement Reached in R. R. Fight; Labor Sharing Plan is Proposed

Washington, Sept. 2.—Private ownership and operation of the railroads under strict government supervision, with labor sharing in the management and earnings, is provided for in a bill introduced in the senate today by Senator Cummings, chairman of the Interstate Commerce Commission.

The proposed bill makes strikes and lockouts criminal offenses, and is designed to settle all differences between owners and railroad employees.

The bill is the outcome of a week's conference between labor leaders and railway officials and financiers with the senate subcommittee which recommended the bill to the Interstate Commerce Commission as the best feasible plan for settling the railroad question.

NO BAD REPORTS FROM OIL FIELD

Reports from the oil wells in the Ballinger territory today look good to the wild cat operators. There is nothing to the rumor that Russell No. 2 is shooting gas. There are no signs of gas in that well and none are expected until the drill passes the eighteen hundred foot mark.

Russell No. 2 is drilling at 1775 feet, and the log of the well compares favorably with Russell No. 1 in which both gas and oil was found at 1805.

The Lacey well is drilling at 600 feet and the formation in which the drill is working at 600 feet is the same as that found in the Cain well near San Angelo at 3400 feet, according to the drillers who put down the Cain well.

Los Arroyo is drilling nicely at 315 feet operating on day time only as one driller is off the job at present. All the casing for this well will be on the ground within a few days, and there will be no delay on account of lack of casing.

The Mustang well or Nelson & Nelson well is at a stand still for the present, but will resume drilling in a few days.

Mother Brings Dead Baby Home on Pillow; Died on Train

Nellie Sandlin, age two years, baby daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Sandlin, was buried in the local cemetery Sunday afternoon. The mother arrived in Ballinger with the dead baby in her arms on the Abilene and Southern Sunday at noon. She came from Ranger, where she had been working in a restaurant.

Mrs. Sandlin had been in Ranger for some time. The child became ill with whooping cough and the mother decided to bring it back to Ballinger. After leaving Ranger and before reaching Cisco the child went into convulsions and died while the train was at the station at Cisco.

Reports received at Ballinger state that the case was a most sympathetic one and touched the hearts of the passengers on the train. Through the sympathy of

the conductor the mother was not required to stop off and have her child prepared for burial before bringing it on home, as is the rule, but was permitted to continue her journey home with her dead baby. She came to Abilene and the conductor of the Abilene and Southern also permitted her to get on the train with her dead baby in her arms and the pillow which some one had furnished was the resting place of the little dead body while the journey to Ballinger was being made. The purse strings of the sympathetic passengers on the train came loose and the bereaved mother was given financial assistance.

The Sandlin family is well known in Ballinger, having lived here for more than twenty years. "Red" Sandlin, the father of the child is away from home at work.

1919 COTTON CROP MILLION BALES SHORT

Washington, Sept. 2.—The crop estimate forecasted today by the crop bureau places the total cotton production for 1919 at eleven million, two hundred and thirty thousand bales.

The estimate is based on reports of field agents made up on August 25th. The total crop last year was more than twelve million and forty thousand bales.

The condition of the crop on August 25, was 61.4 per cent normal.

231 CARS GRAIN LEAVE WINTERS

Grain shipments from Winters up to Friday noon totaled 231 cars and shipping has been temporarily stopped on account of congestion of grain at the important market centers.

Two hundred and thirty-one cars seem very light in comparison with our expectations, but it must be remembered that a car of grain today represents about twice the amount that formerly made a car, hence, at that ratio we have shipped the equivalent of 462 cars, based on former calculations.

Be that as it may, we are ahead of any other town so far claiming to be a grain market—Winters Enterprise.

FARMERS CAN GET NEW MEXICO SHEEP

Several farmers have recently made inquiries about the purchase of sheep. We are informed by Mr. M. W. Coll, Sheep Specialist of A. & M. College Extension Service, that there is a surplus of sheep available in New Mexico and that the prices, run lower on the whole than the prices in Texas for good quality sheep. The sheep offered are principally Rambouillet, all good stock, at prices ranging from \$12 to \$15 for ewes and \$6.50 to \$8 for ewe lambs. Those who desire sheep of this character may have the assistance of Mr. Coll in the selection and location of these sheep without cost. He will be in Ballinger September 10th and those wishing to purchase sheep may see him at that time at my office during the afternoon of the 10th. Mr. Coll will then be on his way to Mexico for the purpose of purchasing sheep.

Those interested in the purchase of sheep should either be present on that day or notify me beforehand and place their order and arrange for the purchase of same. It may be necessary, in the event a good many sheep are desired, for someone to go with Mr. Coll and look after the shipment and care for the sheep bought. This will be determined at the meeting Sept. 10th.

With the present rains and the future outlook for good prices for wool, it seems that a few sheep at least on the various farms of the county, where properly fenced, would be a good investment.

Since some have already expressed an intention of buying, we would be glad to see a good shipment brought to this county. D. F. EATON, County Agent.

For cause of action Plaintiff shows to the court that hereafter, to-wit: on the 21st day of October, 1914, the defendant, being then and there indebted to the Plaintiff in the sum of Six Hundred Fifty (\$650.00) Dollars, made, executed and delivered to Plaintiff a certain promissory note; by the terms of which he promised to pay Plaintiff Six Hundred Fifty (\$650.00) Dollars in gold coin of the United States, with interest thereon from its said date until maturity at the rate of eight (8) per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, which also provided that the matured unpaid principal and interest should bear ten (10) per cent per annum from date of maturity until paid, said note was to be paid in quarterly installments of Fifty (\$50.00) Dollars each, the first installment of which became due three (3) months after the date of said note, and the remaining installments became due one every three (3) months thereafter until the full amount of principal and interest of the entire indebtedness was paid, the last installment falling due and became payable on the 21st day of January, 1918, said note being given in part payment for the purchase of Lot No. 15, Block 134, of Alamo Heights subdivision, according to the map or

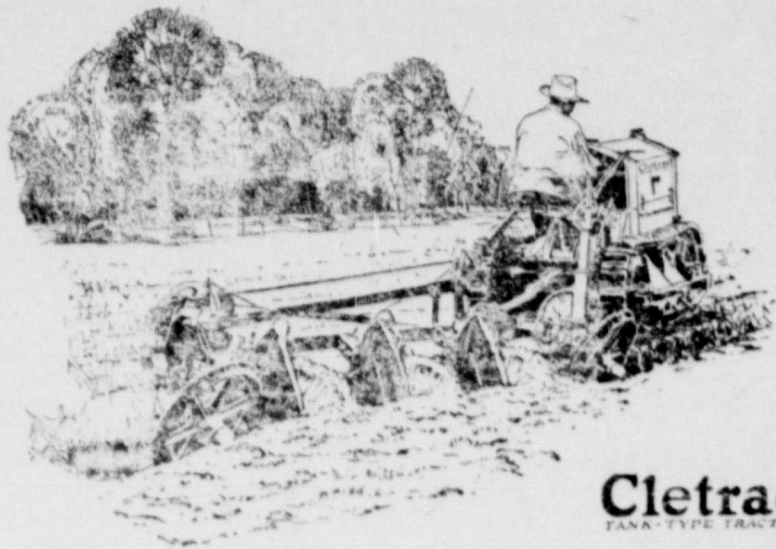

BACK TO AMERICA

New York, Sept. 1.—Condemned to ten years solitary confinement as an alleged spy in Germany, Mrs. Katherine Peterson, arrived here today on the transport Sirra as the bride of Capt. Edwin W. Peterson, of Boston. Mrs. Peterson served nineteen months of her sentence and escaped when the revolution threw open the jails in Germany. She said her cell was over-run by rats and that she was almost insane when the flight of the kaiser brought her freedom.

After her escape, Mrs. Peterson reached Paris where she met Capt. Peterson to whom she had previously been engaged. She first met him at Tufts college where she studied dentistry under him. Mrs. Peterson refused to give her maiden name but it was said that she was born in Berlin, came to this country several years ago and became an American citizen. On the outbreak of the war she returned to Germany where her

arrest and conviction followed in April, 1917.
