Veterans May Enroll In Vocational School

The Eastland County Vocational School is interested in enrolling Veterans in trades courses such as welding, radio, plumbing, and refrigeration. This type of work will be set up for those veterans whose job is not related to the type of training he wants to be eligible for.

The veteran who is working as a laborer and is interested in learning a definite trade, we can organize a class in that trade, provided we can secure sufficient enrollment to pay expenses. By attending class 12 1/2 hours per week, the veteran can draw 1/2 subsistence provided it does not put him over the ceiling wage of \$175 and \$200. Plane Output Is Just a Trickle

18 Billion Yearly Volume in War Is Cut to Billion, Survey Discloses.

NEW YORK. — In a summary report by Aircraft Industries association, representing all manufacturers in the field, the biggest industry in the world on V-J Day a year ago, American aircraft manufacture has shrunk from its more than 18-billion-dollar yearly volume to a mere one billion dollars a year and 16th place in point of employment among American industries.

In the following respects, however, the summary shows a situation much more favorable than many in the industry dared hope for a year ago, when the army air forces showered them with 10,263 cancellation telegrams stopping 74 billion worth of work and the navy issued 5,597 cancellations worth more than three billion.

The cancellations were carried out so quickly and in such an orderly fashion—almost all have been wound up within the year—that all principal aircraft manufacturers are still healthily in business, even tramping with the years of delay and litigation following World War I, which drove every plane maker out of business.

Demand for transport and personal planes, at home and abroad, leaves the industry with a backlog of orders on its books for 47,657 civil planes and employment for 200,000 men and women. This contrasts with the biggest pre-war year of 1941 when only 6,587 planes were made.

Surplus Disposal.

Vast surplus disposal has been carried out without serious disruption of this market.

Vast technical advances have been made in the military field. All first line combat planes of a year ago could now be replaced with radically new and improved types and contracts have been let with the industry for research and development of still more radical types in the field of supersonic speed, jet and turbine propulsion, remote control of airplanes and guided missiles, including the development of an atomic engine for aircraft.

Thus, while alarmed at the reduction to a mere trickle of current military production—the service will get only 1,600 new planes this year as against the air co-ordinating committee's recommendation of 3,000 as the minimum for safety—industry leaders find two redeeming factors in addition to the healthy demand.

Short on Personnel.

First, the armed services, particularly the army air forces, have not the personnel to handle any large number of new planes and, second, new ones produced today will be quickly outmoded by those now in the laboratories and wind tunnels.

Indicating the rapid decline in military production the figures show that total monthly deliveries fell from 108 to both services in January to only 67 planes in July. Of the first number 13 were bombers, 52 fighters, 3 transports and 10 rotary wing aircraft. In July only 3 bombers were delivered, only 52 fighters, 6 photographic planes and 6 transports.

Despite the low level of deliveries, world records were set by many of the new planes, such as the distance record from Guam to Washington, East-West and West-East speed records for fighters, bombers and transports.

The report points out that where the air lines domestic and foreign had only 440 planes on V-J Day they are now flying 708 and have placed orders for 269 four-engined and 468 two-engined transports on June 30. In the first quarter of the year there were 2,692,772 revenue passengers, an increase of 500 per cent over the same quarter of 1945.

Most surprising growth, however, appears in the recon on personal airplanes. In the first half of the year the industry produced 13,500 planes and, barring strikes and material shortages, expects to make 35,000 in the year as against production in 1941 of only 6,597 planes.

Hong Kong Is Now Flooded With Spies

Propagandists Have Own Way; British Do Nothing.

HONG KONG. — Chinese secret agents, gangsters, agitators, strong-arm men, propagandists and political miscreants are finding Hong Kong a happy hunting ground. They operate against a background of official British silence and grow bolder day by day.

In this home base of the British Pacific fleet, the prostrate British lion is having his face pushed into the mud now and then.

Chinese troops, who first entered the colony by virtue of being attached to units moving from the interior to Manchuria via Hong Kong, indirectly have been the cause of much of the ill-feeling by their ignorance or contempt for the colony's laws.

Although municipal law forbids it these troops carry side arms—and use them.

High Altitude Mystery

Rays Discovered by AAF

WASHINGTON. The existence of high altitudes of mysterious atmospheric radiations which affect radio and electrical equipment in aircraft was reported by the army air forces. The effect of the rays was observed during special study of cosmic rays made in a B-29 bomber, the "Arc" said in a statement.

Chinese Protest Market

Killings by Jap Cops

TOKYO. Chinese nationals, counting two deaths in the struggle for commercial rights in Tokyo's Shimbashi market area, urged that General MacArthur be asked to disarm Jap police.

The Jap police countered with a declaration they were staking their lives to control black market operations.

Four truckloads of Chinese were fired upon as they passed the Shibuya police station. Twenty-one Chinese and two Jap policemen were wounded.

Alcoholism of Women

Reported on Increase

NEW YORK.—More and more women in the United States are becoming alcoholics, Dr. Robert Hopkins hospital in Baltimore reports.

In an article in the September issue of the "Woman's Home Companion," he wrote that the number of women patients admitted to mental hospitals for this disease has increased sharply in the past 10 years.

Huge Peace Tower Is Proposed for Tokyo

TOKYO. — Japanese women diet members proposed construction within three years of a 487-foot tower of light and a figure representing the goddess of peace, and paid for by popular subscriptions. Their leader in the project is Kiyo Takeda. She's from atom-bombed Hiroshima.

IMPROVED UNIFORM INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

PAUL'S BACKGROUND AND EARLY LIFE

LESSON TEXT: Acts 21:39; 22:3, 7, 36; 25:4, 8; Philippians 2:5.
MEMORY SELECTION: Remember now by creating in the days of thy youth.—Ecclesiastes 12:1.

God works through men. When we study his work we study the lives of men—all types of men—but all yielded to him, and used by him.

Paul stands out as one of the most influential characters in all history. His life and letters, which we are to study the next three months, writings of tremendous effect on the human race. Especially is this true of his position and influence in the Christian church.

Under God he was the one who carried the gospel to the Gentile world, and then began the great missionary program of the church, which goes on to this very day. His writings are the steady and extensive foundation of much of our study and teaching of Christian doctrine.

I. Birthplace (Acts 21:39).

The place of a man's birth has a definite influence on his personality and usefulness. Tarsus, where Paul was born, was one of the most cosmopolitan cities in the world of that day. It was a Roman province, where men proudly held their citizenship in the great empire. Greek, the language of world culture, was spoken there.

Tarsus was a great educational and university center. It was in a rich and fertile area. It was at the head of navigation on the river Cydnus and on a great Roman highway. It was the capital of the province.

II. Education (Acts 22:3).

After his early training in the home and under rabbis in Tarsus, he went to Jerusalem to study in the law school of the best equipped Hebrew college of that day, under one of the greatest teachers, Gamaliel.

Somewhere in his rearing he was taught a trade, for every Jewish boy learned to support himself with his own hands (see Acts 18:3).

He was instructed in the Word of God, and had a consuming zeal for religious things. Until he was converted, it counted against Christianity, but afterward it became a firm basis for spreading the truth in all the world.

III. Citizenship (Acts 22:27, 28).

The mighty power and prestige of Rome stood behind every Roman citizen. Paul used his citizenship for protection. It helped him in his service for the Lord. His prestige was a great asset.

It is a good sign when a man is proud of his national background, and it speaks well for the nation to which he belongs. But Paul came with a different background to know and appreciate a higher citizenship.

IV. Religion (Acts 28:4, 5).

Though a free-born Roman citizen, Paul was a Jew, and loyal to the religion of his people. He was a member of the strictest sect, the Pharisees, in which his family had held membership for generations.

When he became a follower of Christ, there was no ground on which anyone could be guilty of blasphemy and his witness as the out-break of a new viewpoint on the part of a renegade Jew.

Paul counted it to be an honor to be known as a Hebrew and gloried in the fact that he was born, trained and lived within that racial as well as religious circle.

No one need ever be ashamed of his race, although he may be ashamed of things which members of his race have done. But there are even more things of which to be proud, and a man may add to the standing of his race by living his own life in cleanness of character and nobility of purpose. It is rarely a commendable thing to be ashamed of the race of one's fathers.


