Cpl. Turner Is Awarded Silver Star Medal

For saving the lives of many of his wounded comrades on Corregidor, Cpl. Johnny Price Turner, 24, whom hard luck has dogged since the day the Japs attacked the Philippines, has been awarded the Silver Star Medal.

Cpl. Turner, son of Mr. and Mrs. D. A. Turner, Rt. 2, Carbon, is a patient at Brooke General Hospital. The award was presented by Brig. Gen. John M. Willis, commandant of the center.

Cpl. Turner, who served with C Battery, 60 Coast Artillery, Fort Mills, Corregidor, was wounded by shrapnel in the right forearm during the heroic defense of that island.

Following his capture on May 6, 1942, he was placed in Cabanatuan, P. I. prison camp. There Jap guards struck him in the right eye with a rifle and due to lack of medication, he lost his sight in that eye.

Five months later he was moved to a prison camp at Mukden, Manchuria, and for the next three years his hardships were intensified by the cold, lack of food, and clothing, and hard work.

"The first winter in Manchuria we snared stray dogs with traps made of rope and fish bones," he said, "and we managed to have enough to eat. Even 146 men died that winter. The Japs got wise and beat us." He attended the dog meat, and for the remainder of the time we barely had enough food to exist."

Cpl. Turner said the Japs put them in a steel factory making die tools, but when the Americans learned they were for tank parts, they refused to work. So they placed them in a leather factory and here, at least, they were able to make their own shoes by tacking leather over wooden soles. The men would wrap burlap sacks around their feet to keep them warm.

To get to work they left their camp at 6 a. m. daily, trudged 4 miles each way through deep snow worked a full day and returned about 7 p. m.

The first they knew that the Japs had surrendered was when a party of 4 Americans and one Japanese-American interpreter parachuted into their camp. They were scheduled to arrive simultaneously with a group of Russian soldiers who were to liberate the prisoners, but through some accident they arrived a day ahead of time.

The Japs grabbed the Americans and beat them up before they were able to explain why they were there. "You can imagine how glad we were to see them," Cpl. Turner said, "but the guards had guns on us and we could only stand by and watch. The next day the Russians arrived. They disarmed the Japs and gave us their weapons. We had to stand guard of our former guards a month until American occupation troops arrived and we could go home."

After his liberation, he volunteered for duty in the Philippines again—he has a girl there—and served with military police battalion until Nov. 25, 1945. Then he was returned to the States by

U. S. Army Fights Nazi 'Baloney'

Occupation Troops Urged to Get Facts on Efforts to Feed Germany.

BERLIN.—So he would not be obliged to "swallow baloney fed him by complaining Germans but be able to answer back," each United States occupation soldier in Germany was urged by the army to arm himself with facts on American's efforts to feed Germany and the world, says the Associated Press.

The army distributed among the troops an article by Dr. Carl F. Taesch, former department of agriculture, publicist who recently joined the staff of the food and agriculture branch of the military government.

"It would be helpful to the military government in Germany," said the article, which contained statistics on food in Germany, "if you would regard yourself as a good will ambassador of the U. S. A. vested with powers of initiative in getting this story across to the German people. We have a firm policy, but it is human, and we have a record of achievement of which every American can well feel proud."

The article's distribution recalled a story in the army newspaper Stars and Stripes a few weeks ago which said that large sections of the German population were ignorant of America's food contributions and that many Germans believed the United States army was to a large extent living off the land.

The article, used by the army's information and education section in its courses for soldiers, said that in the 10 months from August, 1945, through May, 1946, American sources supplied more than 600,000 tons of food to help support the German civilian ration.

Of this, 57 per cent came from army stocks, 4 per cent from army excess subsistence, and 39 per cent from direct imports. Seventy per cent of the contribution consisted of wheat flour, cereals and biscuits. This, the article said, was 75 to 80 pounds of food for each German in the American occupied territory. In addition, the United States, to boost German food production.

Health Is Deteriorating In British Zone Cities

HERFORD, GERMANY.—A marked deterioration in the health of city dwellers in the British zone of Germany was reported in a British military government statement recently. Reports from all urban regions of the British zone, the statement said, show signs of increased malnutrition, absenteeism and lowered resistance to disease. Signs of starvation were noted in some rural districts, where the population suffers little from lack of food, the reports said.

Black Market Now Is Ruled by Widow

Relict of Mob Leader Takes Over Tokyo Job.

TOKYO.—The widow of a notorious underworld western-style clothes—and an Oriental, all of insurance to match—has moved in as queen of Tokyo's Black Market.

Yoshiko Matsuda claims the high office in the underworld by right of succession. An ex-member of her husband's mob rubbed him out and made her a widow.

The defunct husband, Giichi Matsuda, was the boss of Tokyo's underworld until the time he announced that henceforth the Black Market would be "legitimate, ethical and businesslike."

Those who didn't want to live under his new ukase of honor among thieves could go back to honest toil, he said—in effect.

One, however, fortuitously decided that bumping off the king of the Black Market could be counted as an honest day's toil.

The killing caused great consternation in Matsuda's empire, whose main place of business is right out in front of Shimbashi railway station in downtown Tokyo.

Oriental apitoma was quickly restored, however, among Tokyo's estimated 5,000 Black Marketers who had banded together as an association under Matsuda.

They voted to make Mrs. Matsuda the new ruler, and she accepted with alacrity.

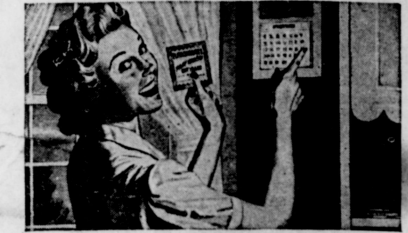

Plane, With Jet Aid, Breaks Speed Mark

DAYTON.—The army air force's XA-3F, powered by one jet and two conventional engines, set a new speed record of 1,000 kilograms (2,204 pounds) payload over a 1,000 kilometer (621 mile) course. The time of the flight was 1 hour, 30 minutes and 31 seconds.

The record was made under National Aeronautical Association rules, topping the previous record of 369 miles an hour set by Lt. Edward Grabowski over the same air Command made payload. The XA-3F was piloted by Lt. Col. T. P. Gerry, 32, of Chicago.

Tells How Nazis Drafted French Slave Laborers

NEUNBERG.—Fritz Sauckel admitted to the international war crimes tribunal that he forced the Vichy government to impose the death penalty on any Frenchman who attempted to interfere with drafting slave labor for Germany.

The former Nazi labor chief said that Pierre Laval carried them to be applied, though, only to "serious" cases.

French prosecutors also drew statements that he organized a special force of terrorists to recruit workers for transport to the Reich, and that he had ordered recalcitrant laborers placed in shackles. The prosecution also charged that Hitler had threatened to take over the rule of France himself unless more slave labor was forthcoming.

Hug by Fiance Is Fatal To Girl, Coroner Finds

LONDON.—Florence Quarrel's fiancee hugged her so ardently she collapsed and died, a London coroner said recently.

During an inquest, Leslie Bowner told the coroner that he and the girl, who was 22, had been kissing when she collapsed in an armchair, breath, she died a short time later. He had been engaged to her seven months.

A government pathologist testified that during an embrace Bowner exerted pressure on a vulnerable nerve center in his sweetheart's throat, which caused immediate paralysis of the heart and lungs. The coroner ruled that the death was accidental and freed Bowner of responsibility.

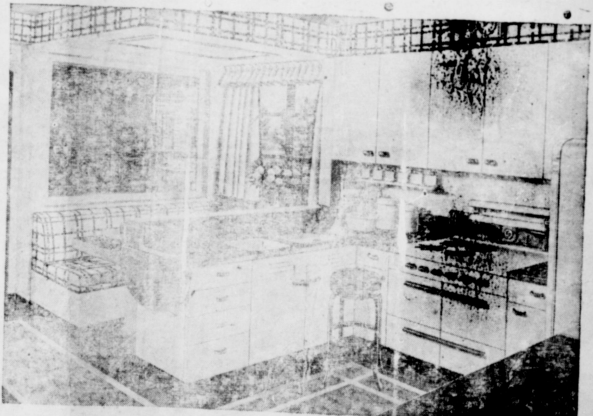

Pasture Improved By Proper System Fertilizer Addition Produces Good Stand

A pasture improvement system that has enabled farmers following it to increase their grass production 75 per cent through applications of nitrogen in the fall and 80 per cent through spring treatments, was recorded by Prof. D. R. Dodd, extension agronomist of Ohio State university. Professor Dodd measured the results in numerous tests on Ohio farms of nitrogen applications in the fall of 1944 and the spring of 1945 and his findings were based on these tests.

The nitrogen fertilizer was applied on pastures in the form of ammonium nitrate at an average rate of 123 pounds per acre in the fall and 115 pounds in the spring.

Professor Dodd reported that the effect of the plant food on the

JESUS AND THE SACREDNESS OF HUMAN LIFE

LESSON TEXT—Exodus 20:13; Matthew 5:21-24; 10:29-31; 18:10-14. MEMORY SELECTION—But I say unto you, That whosoever is angry with his brother without a cause shall be in danger of the judgment.—Matthew 5:22.

Human life is sacred, and that is not primarily because of any law of man, but because of God created man in his own likeness and image. Since that is true, no man has any right to take the life of another for any cause except at the direct command of God. Only by the orderly process of law for the protection of society and in accordance with the Word of God may there be any such action by man toward man.

I. The Prohibition of Murder (Exod. 20:13).

The word "kill" in this commandment is one which means a violent and unauthorized taking of life, and is therefore more properly translated "murder."

Not all killing is murder. A man may kill another entirely accidentally, or he may be the duly constituted legal officer carrying out the law of the land in taking the life of one who has forfeited his right to live because he has slain another.

There is also the right of self-defense, be it individual or collective as in war. But these are the only exceptions; let us not attempt to justify any other.

Murder is more prevalent than most of us suppose. In 1944 there was a murder every fifty minutes in our land.

Do not forget the deaths, the destruction of life, by avoidable automobile accidents. Some of these were really murder because the one responsible drove with defective brakes, dangerous tires, or while he was intoxicated. Add to these the deaths of industry caused by failure to provide proper safeguards or healthy working conditions, and by the exploitation of child labor, and say that we should cry aloud, "Thou shalt do no murder."

II. The Provocation to Murder (Matt. 5:21, 22).

Murder finds its provoking cause in the heart of man. Our Lord was concerned about correcting the desires rather than to apprehend the offender after the act had been committed. It is the better way, and the more effective one.

In this matter of murder, Jesus cut right through the outward aspects of the matter and pointed out that an angry hatred in the heart is the root of all murder. If we hate, we have murder in our hearts. Circumstances may hinder its fulfillment, but the danger is always there until we remove the cause.

III. The Prevention of Murder (Matt. 5:23, 24; 10:23-31; 18:10-14).

Prevention with God means more than putting up a barrier to try to keep men from killing one another. He deals with the heart of man and when that is right the whole life will be right. There must be:

1. A Right View of Self (Matt. 5:23, 24). We must learn by prayer and humility of heart to suffer at the hands of others, to keep peace, to seek our brother's welfare.

Note that it is not even a question of how we may feel against our brother. If he has sinned against us we are to do as we can to win him. We who believe in Christ are to be in deed as well as word the children of our heavenly Father (Matt. 5:45), loving not only those who are kind to us but also our enemies.

2. A Right View of God (Matt. 10:29-31). He who knows when a sparrow falls to the ground is concerned about the smallest detail of our lives. No man can lay hands of violence on another man without having to reckon with God about his misdeeds.

3. A Right View of Man (Matt. 18:10-14). Even the little ones, apparently defenseless and at the mercy of a cruel world, have guardian angels who have access to the throne of God. He has a special interest in the lost—our refugees in the rescue of the one who has strayed, so we see that even those whom the world regards as weak and unimportant are in the mind of God for good. He watches over them.

The man who sees himself for what he is, and who only realizes what God thinks of man, will find that he agrees with the command of God, "Thou shalt not kill."

plane, reached Hawaii on Christmas Eve and was put off the plane due to priority.
He was eating in a restaurant in Honolulu when a drunken man came in with a knife in his hand and threatened a nearby soldier. Turner reached out to grab his hand and was stabbed three times.
He was given emergency treatment in Honolulu, put on another plane and rushed to Letterman General Hospital, San Francisco. From there he was sent to Wm. Beaumont Hospital, El Paso, in order that his stab wounds as well as his eye and arm might be healed.

While a patient there he was examining a German P-38 souvenir pistol. It went off "like a bootie trap" he said, and a bullet penetrated his leg leg breaking the bone. "Bad luck just keeps following me," he grinned.

The citation for which Cpl. Turner was awarded the Silver Star follows: "For gallantry in action at Fort Mills, Corregidor, Philippine Islands, on May 6, 1942. When a heavy artillery barrage fell directly on the battery local defense foxholes and machine gun positions causing several casualties. Cpl. Turner voluntarily exposed himself repeatedly to artillery fire, succeeded in rescuing many of his wounded comrades, and brought them to safety. Although enemy planes were overhead, he continued his heroic task and was responsible for saving the lives of a number of his fellow soldiers. Cpl. Turner's courageous action provided a lasting inspiration to those with whom he served and is in keeping with the highest traditions of the American soldier."

Cpl. Turner enlisted in the Army Feb. 10, 1941, at Gall, Texas where his parents lived at that time. He formerly made his home for a number of years with his uncle, Price Turner, on a ranch near Big Lake, Texas.

Besides the Silver Star he wears the Presidential Unit citation with two Oak Leaf clusters, the Purple Heart, the Philippine Defense ribbon with one battle star, the Asiatic Pacific ribbon with two battle stars, the American Defense ribbon with one battle star, and the Victory ribbon and the Good Conduct Medal.

He hopes to re-enlist and return to the Philippines for assignment. "And please send this story back to the Philippine papers," he said, "my girl, who lives in Lucena on Luzon, just doesn't believe all this could have happened to me and that I am still a patient in the hospital."

He has a brother still in service, Don E. Turner, with the Marines at Tsingsing, China and another brother, Bobby Turner, recently discharged and living at De Leon.

a socialist government to take it over and run it, and people will be more willing to vote a socialist government to take it over. Therefore socialists and communists who have infiltrated into key positions in labor unions and certain government bureaus are working hand in hand with big business combines to force the little man out of the picture. It's the foe of both ends against the middle.

There have been several examples of such teamwork in the past few years, but none more outstanding than in the oil and grocery businesses. The independent groceryman narrowly missed extinction when a scheme to limit profits, under which only the chain store could possibly survive, barely failed to be put into effect. And the small, independent producer of crude oil upon whose activities the welfare of much of this district depends, has been severely hurt by the freezing of prices under conditions which greatly favored the major companies, with their pipe lines and refineries, and their vast resources.

Unless men are sent to Congress who know the score and who will fight against monopolies at every hand, all business will ultimately be under one great government monopoly, with the resultant loss of political as well as economic freedom, and the graft, waste, inefficiency, and low standard of living inherent in the socialist system.

The highest standard of living the world has known was developed by the free activities of countless plain Americans, each minding his own business according to his own best judgment.

VETERANS

I am first and foremost for making adequate provisions for those disabled in the war and the dependents of those killed. Those killed must not be forgotten just because they aren't here to speak for themselves and vote.

Beyond that, the ex-GI can depend on me to be his best and most active friend in Congress. I don't have to say that I understand the ex-GI, because I am one.
