By DEE GORDON Eastland County Agent Get your spray ready for our fruit trees. It will soon be time to start a preventative spray schedule for fruit trees. Many of you have already used the dormant oil spray and some have sprayed with a fungicide to control brown rot.

Owners of commercial orchards should follow a spray program outlined in the "Texas Guide for Controlling Insects and Disease on Fruit." Home owners with only a few fruit trees may follow a simplified spray schedule which is also outlined in the bulletin mentioned above. The owner of a small orchard or a few trees should use malathion or methoxychlor and spray on the following schedule: 1. Petal fall spray (when

75 per cent of blossom petals have fallen)

Shuck split (10 days after petal fall)

First cover spray (10 to 14 days after shuck split) 4. Second cover spray (14 to 21 days after first cover). The spray schedule will prevent most insects from damaging fruit. If fruit damaging insects occur following the completion of the above schedule, sevin can be used fectively up to within one day of harvest.


One of the secrets cessful home gardenic well-prepared soil. well-prepared quantity of organic in the form of peat moss, improves ture of the soil. Rural deners may also want to manure for this purpose.

Approximately 4 bushels of organic matter should be applied to each 100 square feet of soil area. It can be worked into the soil either by spading or plowing but mix it thor-

oughly. It is also a good idea to apply some organic fertilizer to most gardens. A complete fertilizer such as 10-20-10 is usually beneficial when the soil is a silt loam or clay. An application of from 3 to 4 pounds per 100 square feet of soil is usually sufficient,

Broadcast the fertilizer over the area and then spade or disc it into the soil. Fertilizer may also be applied as a band placed to the side and slightly deeper than each row where the seed will be planted

As a general rule, leafy vegetables will respond to additional amounts of nitrogen fertilizer. Root crops will usually respond to more







RDON SPOT By DEE GORDON Eastland County Agent

As I travel over the county see more and more damage caused by the ice storms this winter. The ice broke and spintered shade trees as well as fruit and nut trees. Earl Walker's pecan orchard at Cisco was one that was heavily damaged. At least onehalf of the limbs on many of the trees were broken.

Evergreen trees also received heavy damage. An exd tremely heavy coating of ice on the dense foliage broke many of the larger branches. Prompt attention and proper treatment of the damaged trees will help prevent permanent disfigurem en t an d possible premature death of the trees. It is best to hire a trained person to do the job if the ice damaged tree is large or the breakage has occurred high in the branches. However, many people will be doing their own work.


While the tree wounds are still fresh, much of the repair work can be done with a sharp pruning saw and an asphalt tree wound paint. An excellenit temporary tree wound dressing is orange shellac. This is sometimes hard to find, but is usually available at nurseries and garden centers.

There are three simple guidelines to follow when re-moving the broken branches. The damaged branches should be removed flush with the branch. Stubs will only lead to a proliferation or sucker growth later on.

To prevent tearing the bark and causing additional damage to the tree in removing heavy limbs, make the first cut with the saw from the boltom side of the limb about 12 inches from the main bran-

ch. When the saw starts to bind make the second cut from above about eight inches from the main branch. After the branch splits off re-move the remaining stub with a saw flush with and parallel to the main branch. Lastly, apply the tree wound dressing to the exposed surface to prevent the entrance of disease and insects.

The extension publication "Modern Pruning Methods" is available in our office and will be helpful when you do your pruning.
