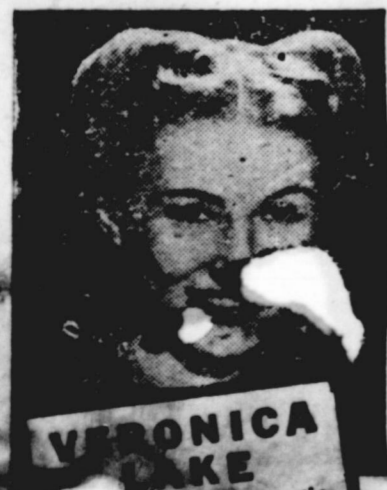

Severe restrictions placed upon the German zone to prevent them from buying and devouring their entire month's ration in a "few days," authorities said. German officials said that had happened on a large scale in Hamburg recently.

The British expressed doubt that 70 per cent of Hamburg's population was without bread because of this practice, as German civilian officials claimed.

**'Flour Supply Adequate.'**  
"Checks show that bakers' shops still have adequate supplies of flour," one British official said. "We believe the looting recently was due to a highly vociferous minority."

Meanwhile, authorities scoured Scandinavia and the empire for new food supplies. An announcement said a British control commission was seeking fish and canned vegetables to substitute for the meat ration.

### Seek Supplies.

Supplies are being sought in the United States, Britain, South Africa, Australia, New Zealand, Denmark and Norway. The search has uncovered quantities of white cabbage, carrots and Swedish turnips in Denmark which have been bought for immediate shipment to Hamburg, according to reports from Copenhagen. The vegetables were valued at 1,500,000 kroner (\$300,000 at the 1939 rate of exchange).

First consignments of other foreign food shipments are en route to the British zone, and all should arrive in the next few months, commission officials said. However, only a few hundred tons of flour and equivalent quantities of all other foods except fish.

Additional supplies will be needed, it was announced, to maintain even the "Belsen" ration of 800 calories a day introduced in the British zone on April 1.

"If rations are not increased we shall begin to see its effect on the population in the British zone in a short time," said a high British medical officer. "What happens after that is anybody's guess."

## United States Navy Sinks

**24 Japanese Submarines**  
ABOARD U.S.S. GOODRICH OFF SASEBO, JAPAN. — Twenty-four Japanese submarines, including the I-58 which sank the cruiser Indianapolis just before V-J Day, were sunk by the U. S. navy recently with demolition charges and gunfire.

The submarines, deemed unfit for salvage, sank in 900 feet of water off the once-great naval base of Sasebo.

Navy crews enthusiastically completed within three hours the job which they had dubbed "operation road's end."

The Japanese crews saw a farewell gesture lashed cherry blossoms to the periscopes of their vessels just before they moved out of Sasebo at dawn under their own power.

## Fat of Wildcats Adds to

ST. HELENS, ORE. — Mrs. Stella Soderstrom of Cedar Grove added up her contributions to the waste fat drive during the past year and found she had given 200 pounds which she rendered from 38 wildcats, 5 coyotes, 10 bears—and a few skunks.

Mrs. Soderstrom got the idea when she killed a fat wildcat which invaded her hen house. She skinned it, rendered it and traded the fat to a butcher for four cents a pound.

Miss Bequette suggested that children whose hearing impairment occurred at birth or in infancy will usually profit from special classes in lip reading.

She advised a special hearing aid for those mature enough to care for it, especially those whose hearing losses are nearer 40 than 20 per cent.

"Since hearing impairment is a defect affecting the language processes, the child should be encouraged to take an active interest in language activities," she said.

"He should be watched so that he does not withdraw from groups or undergo a personality change as the direct result of his impaired hearing.

"Favorable results are obtained if the special considerations that are shown the hearing impaired child are done without calling attention to the defect."

## Victory Medal Ordered;

### Filipinos Are Eligible

WASHINGTON. — The war department recently ordered procurement of the World War II victory medal.

It may be awarded to all members of the armed forces of the United States or of the government of the Philippines who served honorably on active duty at any time during the war.

## Americans Battle 5,971

### Cases of Typhus in Japan

TOKYO. — American infantrymen were fighting a typhus epidemic in the Osaka area described as the "largest typhus epidemic among civilians to confront the army during the war emergency."

Cases reported in Osaka reached 5,971 and 7,113 cases were recorded in the 12 prefects in the 25th division jurisdiction. The death rate was set at 8 per cent.

The number of typhus cases among troops since the occupation was three, none of which was fatal, 8th army medical officers said.

### Finds Little Difference

LONG PRAIRIE, MINN. — Herbert Lenke has returned to civilian life as a butcher after three years in war, but he talks of the safety of a foxhole. Here's what happened since he's been a butcher: He cut his hand and an infection developed; a knife slipped and six stitches were required to close the wound, and after the wound healed, an ax slipped and knocked him on the head.

## Sweden Decides to Cut

### Ration as Aids Hungry

STOCKHOLM. — The Swedish government has decided to cut bread and flour rations by 10 per cent, in order to save grain much needed by war-ravaged countries in Europe. This will save 22,000 tons of rye and 50,000 tons of wheat which already have been purchased in America. Grain to be used for relief in Europe is at the disposal of U. S. authorities.

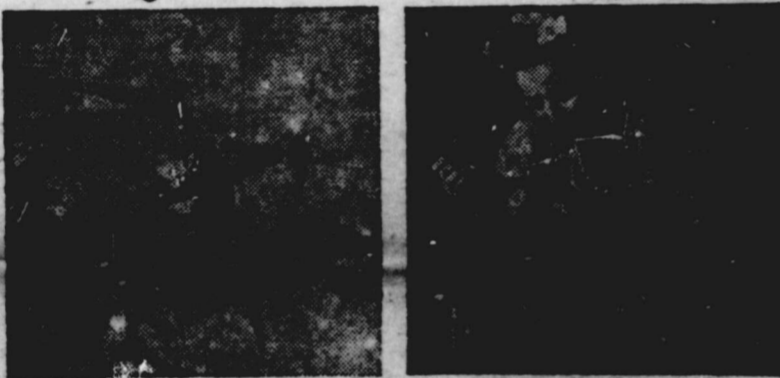

More than 200 manufacturers have formed the Home Furnishings Style Council. All of them will use the same nine basic colors in designing certain lines of their merchandise.

For homemakers this means simplified shopping for everything from floor coverings through furnishings, drapery materials, linoleum, upholstery, Venetian blinds, paint and wall papers, points out this Capper's Farmer expert.

Colors were chosen according to those most popular for homes today and named after sections of the United States. They are green (Shenandoah Group), tan (Alamo Group), mauve (Prairie Group), rose (Grand Canyon Group), gray, (Great Smoky Group), cedar, (Santa Fe Group), blue (Great Lakes Group), burgundy (Adirondack Group), and beige (Cape Cod Group). Each group has been broken down into tones and shades from the lightest to the darkest values.

**FINDING

 SENSE**

**LESSON TE:**  
 MEMORY RELECTION: Dominion of  
 God is not in the things of the  
 world, but in the things of the  
 Spirit, and in the things of the  
 Holy Ghost.

Money, possessions—that's  
 what men are living and striving  
 for in our day. It is going to seem  
 a bit strange, but it will be very  
 salutary to stress once again the  
 eternal truth, best summarized by  
 our Lord Jesus when he said, "A  
 man's life consisteth not in the  
 abundance of the things which he  
 possesseth" (Luke 12:15).

**I. Don't Depend on Riches (12:19,  
 20).**

The rich man increased in selfish-  
 ness as he increased in wealth. He  
 began to feel secure because he had  
 laid up much goods. Now he be-  
 came proud and boastful. He  
 thought he saw years of comfort  
 and ease ahead. Evidently he had  
 not read, or did not believe, the  
 words of Scripture, "Boast not thy-  
 self of tomorrow; for thou knowest  
 not what a day may bring forth"  
 (Prov. 27:1; also James 4:13-17).

Well, can a man depend on  
 riches? The answer is no. They  
 are here today and gone tomorrow.  
 Man himself is here today and gone  
 tomorrow. When he goes, he leaves  
 all that he has unless he has invest-  
 ed it for God.

Money is like a broken reed. The  
 man who leans on it will not only  
 fall, but will pierce himself through  
 with many sorrows (1 Tim. 6:9, 10).  
 Don't depend on riches—they will  
 miserably fail you in your hour of  
 need.

**II. Beware of the Snare of Riches  
 (18:24-27).**

The rich young ruler had come  
 running to Jesus to seek eternal life,  
 but had turned away sorrowful  
 when he found that a man cannot  
 love money and love God at the  
 same time.

Jesus improved the opportunity to  
 point out that it is impossible for a  
 rich man to be saved, except as the  
 grace of God gets hold of him and  
 sets him free from dependence on  
 his wealth.

Apart from the grace of God, it  
 is so easy for a rich man or woman  
 to trust in riches, and to feel no  
 need of God.

Look again at I Timothy 6:9, 10  
 and you will see that even the de-  
 sire to be rich leads a man into a  
 temptation and a snare. The man  
 of God is warned to "flee these  
 things; and follow after righteous-  
 ness, godliness, faith, love, patience,  
 meekness," and thus to be able to  
 "fight the good fight of faith" (1 Tim.  
 6:11, 12).

We repeat that all this has a  
 strange sound to modern ears, so  
 accustomed to the worldly philoso-  
 phy of trust in things and in dol-  
 lars. We need to warn our young  
 men and women about the awful  
 danger of loving money.

**III. Seek True Riches in Christ (18:  
 28-30).**

Peter and the other disciples had  
 forsaken all the things of the world  
 to follow Christ, and now as he re-  
 minds the Lord of that fact, he re-  
 ceives the assurance that there is  
 a higher level of riches and reward  
 for the loyal disciple.

God will never be in debt to any-  
 one. There is no sacrifice made for  
 his glory which does not find its  
 glorious recompense, and no bur-  
 den borne for his sake which does  
 not bring its rich reward.

All this is not the result of some  
 kind of "deal" with God. We do  
 not serve him because we expect a  
 reward, but because we love him,  
 and the assurance of the re-  
 ward is only to encourage and spur  
 us on to love and service for him.

**IV. Beware of the Snare of Riches  
 From Money (19:1-10).**

Zacchaeus was a man well versed  
 in the devious ways of the extor-  
 tioner. He knew money, and how  
 to make it. But he was not satis-  
 fied. He knew there was something  
 more worth while than riches. His  
 life was empty.

He sought Jesus. On the way  
 the Master said he knew that he  
 must lay down his money and  
 give it to the poor. Zacchaeus  
 said, "I will give half of my  
 goods to the poor, and I will  
 give three times as much for the  
 support of my father's household."
