# In Food Riots

### Form Mobile Squads to Convoys and Put Down Violence.

GERMANY. — British officials announced here today that they had ordered the army to put down food riots and riot out sabotage groups taking advantage of tension resulting from the general hunger, says the United Press.

ARMORED cars will join military forces protecting food convoys if additional "difficulty" occurs, the announcement said.

**Rations Devoiced.** Severe restrictions are to be placed upon the distribution of food to prevent the formation of a "few devious" routes in a "few devious" areas that had happened on a large scale in Hamburg.

It was thought that the population would be able to cope with the shortage of supplies.

**Seek Supplies.** Supplies are being sought in the United States, Britain, South Africa, Australia, New Zealand, Denmark and Norway. The search has uncovered quantities of white cabbage, carrots and Swedish turnips in Denmark which have been sought for immediate shipment to Hamburg, according to reports from Copenhagen. The vegetables were valued at 1,500,000 kroner (\$300,000 at the 1939 rate of exchange).

First consignments of other foreign food shipments are en route to the British zone, and all should arrive in the next few months, commission officials said. However, they foresaw only a 10 days' supply of flour and insufficient quantities of all other foods except fish.

Additional supplies will be needed, it was announced, to maintain even the "Belsen" ration of 800 calories a day introduced in the British zone on April 1.

"If rations are not increased we shall begin to see its effect on the population in the British zone in a short time," said a British medical officer. "What happens after that is anybody's guess."

**United States Navy Sinks 24 Japanese Submarines** ABOARD U.S.S. GOODRIE OFF SASEBO, JAPAN. — Twenty-four Japanese submarines, including the I-58 which sank the cruiser Indianapolis just before V-J Day, were sunk by the U. S. Navy recently with demolition charges and gunfire.

The submarines, deemed unsalvageable, sank in 900 feet of water. The wreckage was scattered over a one-mile-wide area.

**Returned Serviceman Finds Little Difference** PRAIRIE, MINN. — A returned serviceman who was injured during the war found little difference between his life before and after the war.

**Sweden Decides to Cut Ration as Aid to Hungry** STOCKHOLM. — The Swedish government has decided to cut bread and flour rations by about 6 per cent, in order to save grain much needed by war-ravaged countries in Europe.

This will save 22,000 tons of grain and 50,000 tons of flour which already have been purchased in America. Grain to be used for relief purposes is at the disposal of U. S. authorities.

**Contribution of Windcat** ST. HELENS, ORE. — Mrs. Stella Soderstrom of Cedar Grove added her contributions to the waste pit drive during the past year and found she had given 200 pounds, six rendered from 38 wildcats, 5 coyotes, 10 bears—and a few skunks.

Mrs. Soderstrom got the idea when she killed a wildcat which she skinned and traded the fat for 50 cents a pound.

**Victory Medal Ordered; Filipinos Are Eligible** WASHINGTON. — The war department recently ordered procurement of the World War II victory medal.

It may be awarded to all members of the armed forces of the United States or of the government of the Philippines who served honorably on active duty at any time between December 7, 1941, and V-J Day.

Pending manufacture of the medal, the service ribbon is being issued as soon as available. The first supply will be sent to stations at which soldiers are being discharged.

**Americans Battle 5,971 Cases of Typhus in Japan** TOKYO. — American infantrymen were fighting a typhus epidemic in the Osaka area described as the "largest typhus epidemic among civilians to confront the army during the war emergency."

Cases reported in Osaka reached 5,971 and 7,113 cases were recorded in the 12 prefects in the 25th division jurisdiction. The death rate was set at 8 per cent.

The number of typhus cases among troops since the occupation was three, none of which was fatal, six army medical officers said.

FINDING A NEW SENSE OF VALUES

LESSON TEXT—Luke 12:15, 20; 13:24-30; 14:1-10. MEMORY SELECTION—The kingdom of God is not meat and drink, but righteousness, and peace, and joy in the Holy Ghost.—Romans 14:17.

Money, riches, possessions—that's what men are living and striving for in our day. It is going to seem a bit strange, but it will be very salutary to stress once again the eternal truth, best summarized by our Lord Jesus when he said, "A man's life consisteth not in the abundance of the things which he possesseth" (Luke 12:15).

Don't Depend on Riches

A rich man increased his riches, and he increased in weakness, and he fell, and he was not able to be raised up, because he had depended on his riches. He might have seen years of comfort and ease ahead. Evidently he had not read, or did not believe, the words of Scripture, "Bless not thyself of tomorrow; for thou knowest not what a day may bring forth" (Prov. 27:1; also James 4:13-17).

Money is like a broken reed. The man who leans it will not only fall, but will pierce himself through with many sorrows (1 Tim. 6:9, 10). Don't depend on riches—they will miserably fail you in your hour of need.

Beware of the Snare of Riches

The rich young ruler had come running to Jesus to seek eternal life, but had turned away sorrowful when he found that a man cannot love money and love God at the same time. Jesus improved the opportunity to point out that it is impossible for a rich man to be saved, except as the grace of God gets hold of him and sets him free from dependence on his wealth.

Apart from the grace of God, it is so easy for a rich man or woman to trust in riches, and to feel no need of God. Look again at 1 Timothy 6:9, 10, and you will see that even the desire to be rich leads a man into a temptation and a snare. The man of God is warned to "flee these things; and follow after righteousness, godliness, faith, love, patience, meekness," and thus to be able to "fight the good fight of faith" (1 Tim. 6:11, 12).

We repeat that all this has a strange sound to modern ears, so accustomed to the worldly philosophy of trust in things and in dollars. We need to warn our young men and women about the awful loss of loving money.

And the other disciples, and all the things of the world, and the man of God is warned to "flee these things; and follow after righteousness, godliness, faith, love, patience, meekness," and thus to be able to "fight the good fight of faith" (1 Tim. 6:11, 12).

God will never be in debt to anyone. There is no sacrifice made for his glory which does not find its glorious recompense, and no burden borne for his sake which does not bring its rich reward.

All this is not the result of some kind of a "deal" with God. We do not serve him because we expect a reward, but the assurance of the reward is there to encourage and spur us on in life and service for him.

The practice of harvesting your winter legume seed has been added to the AAA list of practices that can be paid for in 1946. The rate of payment may be as much as \$3.50 per acre, depending upon amount of seed harvested, but cannot exceed \$35.00 per farm.

If any producers plan to harvest hairy vetch in 1946, contact should be made with the AAA office, so that approval for harvesting these seed can be made. The approval must be issued before the seed are harvested, if payment is to be made through the Government Program.
