Spend More For Family Laundry

Americans Form Habit Due To Conditions of War, of Sending Out Wash.

CHICAGO—Americans are spending more for laundry than ever before. Sending the family wash to a commercial laundry gained momentum during the war because of the convenience and the shortage of household help. The industry believes the habit is firmly entrenched and that having eliminated the weekly wash day, housewives will not be anxious to revive it, says the Chicago Tribune.

Laundries collected 409 million dollars for services in 1939. Industry sources estimate this year's total at more than 620 million dollars.

"There is every reason to expect that household laundry service will continue at a level higher than the pre-war figure," said George H. Johnson, general manager of the American Institute of Laundering.

Maybe Spend More.

A survey of 3,500 customers of the nation's one plant in Joliet, Ill., Johnson said, disclosed that 98 per cent of the families serviced expect to send as much or more wash to laundries as they did during the war. Only 1 1/2 per cent indicated they intend to send less.

As to what the housewife can expect from laundry service, Johnson said: "The customer can look forward to a return to peacetime service and quality as rapidly as the plant can put those improvements into effect."

Laundries again will sew on missing buttons and turn or change shirt collars and cuffs. Special starching will be resumed and there will be broader use of waterproofing and flameproofing of dresses and curtains.

Customers in crowded areas where delivery has been slow will get relief as soon as the local situation clears up, the institute manager asserted. But in some communities where service has been on a four to seven day schedule, he added, plants may continue their work time routings after delivery restrictions end.

Lack Skilled Workers.

Some laundry operators more than any other factor, Johnson said. Whereas a skilled pressing machine operator can turn out 30 shirts an hour, production in some cases dropped as low as 12 to 15 during the war.

The girl who was accustomed to working in a laundry had just the skills needed in war plants," Johnson said. "When the overall employment picture improves, laundry service will improve as well."

War Gadgets Are Sealed For Possible Future Use

PITTSBURGH—The instruments of war, temporarily in disuse, are not going to be beaten into ploughshares.

Rather, they will be scientifically sealed in specially built containers and treated by a new process that will prevent corrosion, decay or deterioration.

At Dravo Corporation's Neville Island plant near Pittsburgh, generating units, height finders and directors are being stored in the all-steel, hermetically-sealed containers.

As soon as the container is filled, the vessel is welded, the air is pumped out, and nitrogen gas is forced in.

Nitrogen, an almost inert gas, won't react with any of the materials in the apparatus.

Silica gel, a chemical dehydrator, also is put into the container, to absorb any trace of moisture that might still be clinging to the container.

After that processing, temperature changes will not harm the contents of the containers.

Seek Arctic Bases To Thwart Attack

Government Taking Steps to Defend Far North.

WASHINGTON—The government is taking steps to protect the nation from air attack through its unguarded Arctic approaches, it was learned here.

Receiving major attention is a proposed long-range agreement with Iceland providing for peacetime use by the army air force of American-built Meeks field, one of the world's largest and most strategically situated bases.

This was revealed by reliable sources coincident with warnings from top American air force generals that the United States is vulnerable to attack through the Polar regions. In the future, they said, Polar projection maps must take precedence in defense planning over the old Mercator projection which was designed for an era when transportation was confined to the surface.

Gen. Carl A. Spaatz, who commanded the strategic air forces in Europe and later in the Pacific, told the senate military affairs committee that "Trans-Polar flying leaves America wide-open at the top." This followed Lt. James H. Doolittle's admission to the committee that "anyone who is thinking of the defense of this country or its vulnerability to attack has got to start with a Polar projection."

General Spaatz also said that "there can be only one defense (against air attacks)—invincible air supremacy in this hemisphere, and along the air approaches thereto."

Action is being taken to obtain rights to hemisphere air bases necessary to this type of defense. Negotiations are in progress with Brazil for joint use of American-built bases there, and with Ecuador for use of bases on the Galapagos Islands which, situated in the Pacific west of Ecuador, guard the approaches to the Panama canal. These also were built by the United States.

Television Set Outlook Good, Says RCA Official

CAMDEN, N. J.—Between 300,000 and 400,000 sets were sold last year and this figure will be doubled in 1947, it was predicted recently by Frank M. Folsom, executive vice president of the Radio Corporation of America. The six cities are Philadelphia, New York, Chicago, Los Angeles, Albany and Schenectady.

Asserting that television was just about ready to go in a big way, now that new transmitting equipment is becoming available, Folsom said the RCA-Victor division, of which he is in charge, would go into production next April. An average price for receiving sets would be around \$300, he said, but some sets might be as low as \$150.

Folsom and four of his top executives went over the entire electronics field with a group of newspaper reporters who are on the semifinal lap of a nation-wide reconversion survey.

Production of new radio sets is so far behind schedule because of shortages in component parts that the entire industry will do well to turn out 400,000 units by Christmas, Folsom forecast 2,500,000 sets by that time.

Nothing new has been added to radio receivers since before the war, according to Joseph B. Elliott, general manager of the RCA-Victor home instrument division, but work is well along on a set only 6 inches high and a little more than half that wide. A one-third reduction in size also has been made in a combined radio and victrola with an automatic record changer.

'Foes' of Black Market Feather Their Own Nests

TOKYO—The newspaper Yomiuri Hochi said recently that Jap officials at Osaka who were responsible in prosecuting black market dealings in sugar had apportioned among themselves 1,500 pounds which had been seized as evidence.

"Persons concerned in the sugar scandal currently are being punished," the newspaper added.

All Tokyo Restaurants Out of Bounds for Yanks

TOKYO—All restaurants and drinking places in Tokyo have been placed out of bounds for American servicemen. Military police authorities who imposed the ban after they found generally unsanitary conditions, said the order would be lifted as proprietors clean up their places to meet United States sanitary requirements.
