Army Enlistments Are Exceeding Expectations

With Army enlistments already exceeding the goal set for the southwest has stepped far ahead of its original schedule in the current recruiting campaign for the U. S. regular Army. Lt. Jay H. McHaffey, Eastland U. S. Army Recruiting Station, has announced:

"Our previous goal was 70,000 enlistments by next June. 30 for the Eighth Service Command area, of which Texas is a major portion," Lt. McHaffey said. "As a result of extraordinary response in this area we have already realized slightly more than 71 percent of our original quota."

While the current recruiting drive has been underway for less than five months, a all-time record of 400,000 is expected for the entire nation when final reports are completed, according to a War Department announcement in Washington this week.

"The Army's manpower requirements, however, still exceed the number we have recruited," Lt. McHaffey pointed out. "So far voluntary enlistments are furnishing only a fraction of the needs of the service both abroad and at home."

Sugar Rationing Will Probably End In June

Fort Worth, Jan. 12.—M. P. Hanna, district OPA rationing executive here, went out of office Saturday with the prediction that the end of sugar rationing soon will follow.

He forecast liberalization of sugar allotments in the next three months and entire disappearance of consumer sugar rationing by the end of June. Restrictions on the use of sugar for industrial purposes, he forecast, will continue through 1946.

Hanna prophesied that another sugar stamp, good for three months instead of four, will be validated before the present stamp expires on April 30. Unless something happens meantime to meet the sugar supply adversely, he forecast an end to rationing before the second 1946 stamp has run its predicted three month course.

May Tear Down Fuehrer's Lair

Fear Retreat Might Become Symbol of Nazi Reich.

If you have been to Berchtesgaden since the war ended, you will understand why there is talk of destroying Hitler's eagle's nest perched atop the highest alpine in that area, as his house and that of Goering and Bormann farther down the mountain-side were leveled. Only it will be a much harder job. I have just been to the eagle's nest and I can tell you at first hand why there is some apprehension about it. The eagle's nest is the retreat der Fuhrer had built for himself on a point 5,000 feet high. It is made of the solid stone of the Bavarian mountain on which it is anchored. To reach it, you go up a precipitous winding road. Himmler's Mercedes, with its five speeds forward, in which I was traveling, gave out and sputtered steam and water a third of the way up. A jeep that picked me up at that point stopped, too, a little later, but we finally arrived at our destination with the aid of a second jeep.

Tunnel Solid Rock. You first reach a tunnel more than a hundred feet deep into the solid rock and guarded by huge bronze doors. It leads to a double-decker elevator that rises 800 feet through a shaft bored through the rock to the eagle's nest. The top cage of the elevator—a bronze section with a circular mirror on the back wall and leather-cushioned bench around the walls—was for Hitler. A trap door in the right hand corner as you enter was for the SS men to drop down into their cage below, which was white-washed like cell. When the elevator reached its destination at the top of the mountain—the SS got out on the ground floor and Hitler entered his living quarters on the first floor. From the view you get at this height, despite the fact that the house itself and the furnishings—were left behind by the German souvenir hunters—are unattractive—is enough to give anyone delusions of grandeur.

I stood on the narrow terrace looking out over the breath-taking scene talking with one of the American guards. It was what he told me that made me realize that some day the eagle's nest might have to be destroyed.

Hitterism Not Dead. The guard told me that two SS men had just been arrested up there. That surprised me very much, and I remarked that they might have known there was a good chance of being caught if they went around a place like that. "Why would they do it?" I asked the guard. His answer startled me. "This is still a shrine to many Germans," he said very seriously. Then he pointed down the hill to Hitler's guest house just back of his house that had been bombed. Germans were repairing it for a barracks for occupation forces. "The Germans would like to work down there, work as they work no place else—they never lose a second," the guard said. "Why—because they can see the eagle's nest from there."

It is true that it is almost impossible to find a German in Germany who ever admits being a Nazi. From these two incidents, it would seem to be true also that the spirit of Hitlerism is not dead in Germany. That is why the things that remind the people of Hitlerism at the height of the fuhrer's glory may have to be destroyed so they will not become symbols of that spirit which has to be done away with if a new Germany is to come out of the war.

Fire Fighters Are Just That and Nothing More. ST. LOUIS.—Mrs. Ralph Crowder almost solved the problem of getting in the fruit crop. A large and productive tree in her back yard was laden with apricots. Unable to cope with the harvest herself, she called the fire department. "There's an apricot tree in my back yard," she told the fireman who answered the telephone. But the connection was cut off and a few moments later Mrs. Crowder was startled by the arrival of a ladder truck, which reared to a stop in front of her home. "Where is that tree?" one of the firemen asked breathlessly. When he was told that Mrs. Crowder was offering to let the firemen pick fruit, he shook his head. "We have no time to pick apricots," he explained. "There might be a fire somewhere and it would not look well for the fire department to be up in a tree picking fruit."

Allies Seize Huge German Dye Trust

Confiscation Is Ordered by Control Council.

BERLIN.—Allied confiscation of the billion-dollar I. G. Farben organization, greatest of Germany's industrial combines, was ordered by the four-power control council recently. It directed that some 200 Farben plants and its vast financial assets be seized at once. Properties and funds of I. G. Farben, which ranked with such international industrial giants as Du Pont and British Imperial Chemical, will be taken over as reparations for such disposition as the Allies see fit. The control council also formally proclaimed the abolition of the National Socialist party and the labyrinth of Nazi bureaus and subdivisions which directed every phase of German life. The order prohibited any attempt to reform Nazi groups and provided for confiscation of all party funds, records and real estate. Lt. Gen. Lucius Clay, U. S. deputy representative on the control council, said the seizure of I. G. Farben was agreed upon by the coordinating committee made up of American, French, British and Soviet representatives. The decision was unanimous and does not require formal council approval, he said.

The owners and stockholders of I. G. Farben, which produced a large portion of Germany's war materials, will receive no future profits from those plants which are still operating and there will be no compensation for the seizure. Approximately three-fourths of the Farben German factories are still intact despite Allied bombing.

What United States Made For War on Axis Enemies

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The United States smothered its Axis enemies with 186 billion dollars' worth of weapons, equipment and supplies, not counting the atomic bomb. War Production Administrator J. A. Krug has revealed. The output for a fleet of 297 thousand military airplanes, of which 97 thousand were bombers. Seventy-six thousand, four hundred and eighty-five ships—including 64,500 tons of artillery shells, navy ships and 5,423 transport vessels. Seventeen million, four hundred thousand rifles, carbines and sidearms; 215,000 pieces of field artillery and mortars; 165,252 naval guns. Forty-one billion, four hundred million rounds of small arms ammunition; 4,200,000 tons of artillery shells. Eighty-six thousand, three hundred thirty-eight tanks and 2,434,553 trucks.

Navy fire power increased tenfold in the five years. The merchant fleet was quadrupled. The total output of goods (war and civilian and services) rose by more than 50 per cent, while the output of raw materials increased 60 per cent.

Employment in manufacturing alone increased by 6,407,000 persons from 1939 to 1944.

Krug said that while America's spending for war materials was enormous, it represented only two-fifths of the industrial output. The balance, he said, provided civilians "more commodities and services" than in "such rood prewar years" as 1937 and 1939.

Millions Being Moved to New Homes in Germany

FRANKFURT.—A huge migration involving the transplanting of some 10 million Germans to new homes and the restoration of several hundred thousand to their former homes is under way. Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's headquarters said that 500,000 Germans from Czechoslovakia's Sudetenland province have entered the American occupation zone. Movement of 150,000 Germans from what now is the American zone in Austria back to their homes in other sections of the Reich also has started, officials said. Sudeten Germans arriving in the American zone are being distributed as equitably as possible among German towns.

Japanese Cheapness on Atomic Bomb Is Revealed

TOKYO.—Leading Jap physicist told the army newspaper Stars and Stripes that government refusal to grant only \$3,300 held up possible development of an atomic bomb proposed four years ago by Nip scientists. Dr. Ryokichi Sagane, American-educated professor of physics at Tokyo's Imperial university, said leading Jap physicists wanted to begin work on an atomic bomb four years ago.

IMPROVED UNIFORM INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Lesson for January 20

THE LAWS OF A PEOPLE

LESSON TEXT—Exodus 20:1-17. GOLDEN TEXT—"I will delight myself in thy commandments, which I have loved!" Psalm 119:47.

Law is necessary to order. Basic laws have been laid down by God for the orderly administration of His universe.
 Physical laws are of great importance, but of even deeper significance are the moral and spiritual laws which control the human life. There is in the world a moral law—a distinction between right and wrong—which man may ignore only to his own sorrow, and which he cannot abrogate or destroy.

These fundamental laws were given to Israel at Mount Sinai, but they speak to us with remarkable freshness and directness. They merit more extensive study than we can give them in this limited space, but we can note their broad outlines and certain practical applications.

I. A Right View of God (vv. 1-11).
 The first and most important question to be asked regarding any law is, "By whom was it established?" Legislation by an unauthorized person or organization has no power over others. Who gave the Ten Commandments? Verse 1 tells us "God spoke all these words."

Men may sneer at theology as being outworn, but the fact is that the Christian doctrine is the only safe foundation for Christian character. 1. Honor to Worship (vv. 2-5). There can be but one true God, and He alone is to be worshiped. He is a personal being, ready to enter into communion with each one of us. No man or likeness can take His place. Bowing down before idols, no matter what they may be called, is expressly forbidden by God. 2. How to Worship (vv. 6, 7). We are to love Him and to keep His commandments. There is to be no sham about this, for no matter how sweet and pious may be the praise and prayer of man, he has taken the Lord's name in vain unless he keeps the Lord's commandments by holy living.

3. When to Worship (vv. 8-11). God has ordained that man should not necessarily bear the burden of toil. He is to have a day of rest and a time for worship, undisturbed by the duties and responsibilities of daily labor.

America needs a mighty stirring up from the desecration of the Lord's day.

II. A Right View of Man (vv. 12-17).
 To be right with God means that we will also be right with our fellow-man. Conversely, the man who is manifestly wrong in his relation to his fellowman is either not right with God at all, or he is not living out his Christian life in practice. This should show in:

1. Family Life (vv. 12). The fifth commandment has to do with the relation between child and parent. There is a plain and direct command that father and mother should be honored. Only in respect and obedience to parents can the child possibly find true and proper development.

Parents who have permitted children to go astray during the war years will need to stress anew the God-required obedience to their authority.

2. Physical Life (vv. 13, 14). God is interested in our bodies. Already we have noted His provision for a day of rest each week. Now we are reminded of the sanctity of human life. "Thou shalt not kill," and remember there are many other ways to kill a man other than shooting him.

Let us be sure that we are not a party to the destruction of any one's life either by reason of carelessness or greed.

Note the emphasis on adultery. Moral uncleanness, which is of a very common in our day, is one of the most effective methods of destroying the body even while degrading and defiling the soul with sin.

3. Social Life (vv. 15-17). "Thou shalt not steal"—and remember thy dishonest appropriation of what does not belong to you is stealing, call it what you will. And "false witness"—now it has become our very civilization! Not a little of it is found within the church, more shame upon us! Lastly, we come to "covetousness"—which has been called one of the "respectable sins of nice people." It is subtle and often hidden. Let us root it out of our lives by God's grace.

Gems of Thought
