Pvt. Odom Helps Mop Up Japs On Negros Islands

With The American Division in The Philippines - Pvt. Clyde R. Odom, Rr. 2, Carbon, learned the hard way what newspaper headlines mean when they announce that Japs are being mopped up.

Pvt. Odom, first scout, spent five weeks driving into the mountains of Negros Islands, assignments of his veteran regiment, the 164th Infantry, cracked organized resistance in the hills of that island.

For five weeks the men of Guadalcanal, Bougainville, Leyte and Cebu hardened infantry team pounded one hill top after another, taking each at a price as the Japs dug in to die, and die they did. The infantrymen were forced to go into their hill by hill and hole by hole.

Fighting was so bitter that our own mortars were forced to fire within ten yards of one company at one time in order to cover them. The desperate Jap dug into caves in the hillside. Every little hut was a fort.

Finally, after five weeks of living on field rations, the Japs took their last major strong point and only a few battered remnants of the Jap force remained.

Those Japs knocked out were destroyed one by one or in small groups when the artillery and tanks could reach them.

Said Pvt. Odom: "I think the toughest part of the campaign was chasing the Nips from one hill to another, but at last we got them where they couldn't go any further. Then my company took the hill they were on so that ended our campaign."

Sergeant Collins Has Arrived In United States

With The 12th Air Force - Sgt. Robert L. Collins, Carbon Ordnance worker, has returned to the United States from the Mediterranean theater of operations.

His wife, Margaret, and their son live at Granger. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Collins, live at Carbon.

Having a total of 28 months overseas duty, Sergeant Collins was serving with a B-25 Mitchell bomb group that flew in the final Po Valley air assault that sped the end of the war in Italy and in all Europe.

The Carbon ordnance man is one of the thousands of 12th Air Force combat unit veterans now being deployed to the United States. After proper rest, he will, if necessary, receive further training for the final campaigns against the Japs. Other like Sgt. Collins will be assigned to important duties in the United States or, if eligible for discharge under the point system and no longer needed in the a.m.y, he will be sent to a surplus pool to await discharge.

The unit with which he served the veteran 340th medium bomb group, first sent its Mitchells in action in Tunisia 28 months ago in support of Field Marshall Montgomery's Eighth Army.

In support of the 340th went on to establish itself as an outstanding "bridge busting" team and a specialist in close support bombing far ground troops. The organization was twice cited as a Distinguished Unit by the War Department.

Europe's Food Picture Is Grim

War Continued Too Far Into the Spring to Permit of Seasonal Planting.

SUPREME HEADQUARTERS, AEF. — A battlefied for five and a half years, Europe finds itself, at the conclusion of peace, confronted with the grim specter of a continent with a food shortage which probably will mean more acute and widespread hunger in the first winter of peace than in any winter of war.

The war continued too far into the spring for Europe to feed herself through the coming winter from her own crops and produce. There is yet time for some planting which will help to meet the needs. It is being done and desperately with men and women dragging the plows.

But with farmlands still dead with mines, with power driven equipment gone and horses virtually vanished and with 8,000,000 to 10,000,000 displaced Europeans still in Europe alone, the yield will be too small.

European never fully fed herself. It is regarded by relief and rehabilitation officials here as unlikely that this year's farm yield will be more than 50 per cent normal.

No Even Spread Possible. With an even spread that yield there still would be want. Because of a transport breakdown and international inequalities it is obvious that there can be no even spread.

Worst hit undoubtedly will be Holland and Poland, but France and Greece also will suffer. Food from America already has started coming in. It has helped feed Britain. It has come in a thin trickle to France and Italy and Greece. An even thinner trickle has been dropped by air into Holland.

But there is neither specific commitment nor definite assurance to what extent the Allies all together will be able to fill the gap between what Europe produces and her utter minimum needs.

The UNRRA provides only the medium through which the supply of food can be arranged. It is Military government officials who will have charge of the food distribution to the western Allies' zone of occupation here as unlikely that this year's farm yield will be more than 50 per cent normal.

The normal average peacetime diet consumption in the United States is between 2,500 and 3,000 calories a day and American troops in the European theater received 5,000 calories a day. The ratio planned by UNRRA is 1:150 (as a maximum) for Germans and 2:000 for liberated countries.

Belgium Picture Better. The German diet is coming from what is left — and for as long as it lasts. It is estimated that total food stocks in storage and on the farms in Germany will not last beyond fall. That means that she must feed herself through the winter from this year's crops. Most of these were either ruined or never planted.

Holland is in the most tragic position. She is on a starvation level with only about 10 per cent of the most intensively farmed land inundated by salt water, she not only has no hope of feeding herself now, but no chance of normal crops for several years.

Belgium is in better condition. The situation in Denmark is not yet known exactly, but presumably that country will be able to provide for its own needs.

France this last winter of liberation and on into this spring is an example of the difficulties ahead. Last winter was the hungriest of the war for France as a whole. Even now into the spring there is almost no meat, butter or milk in Paris and holders of ration tickets seldom are able to turn them in for the actual groceries they are almost to represent.

Planting is less than 75 per cent normal. France is still in lack millions of deportees and prisoners of war too weak or too late to get the spring crops adequately under way.

Doctors Try New Influenza Vaccine

Satisfactory Results Shown In Experiments.

PRINCETON. — A new influenza vaccine, having about 10 times more immunizing potency than usual commercial flu vaccines, is announced in the Journal of Experimental Medicine of the Rockefeller institute.

This vaccine is being made commercially and has been tried on human beings. The results have not been published but reports indicate that they are most satisfactory.

The vaccine was developed under the auspices of the committee on medical research and development, America's scientific war agency.

The new features of the vaccine are reported in the Rockefeller publication by Dr. Wendell M. Stanley, of the Rockefeller institute, Princeton. The experiments were made with the aid of Miss Josephine M. Stafford and Miss Mary Elizabeth Eshelman.

The new features of the vaccine are in the methods of preparation. The results of flu vaccination in the past have been irregular. Dr. Stanley says that the irregularities probably were due to presence of foreign proteins in the vaccines and to varying amounts of the virus, the stuff that affords protection.

Furthermore, in the previous vaccines the manufacturing methods were somewhat difficult. The new vaccine is made more easily, a fact which promises large scale production.

This vaccine includes the viruses causing each of the three present known strains of flu. These are Porto Rico, Lee and Weiss. The vaccine affords some protection against all of them, and more against the Weiss form of flu than other reported vaccines.

Human Serum Cuts Deaths From Whooping Cough

CHICAGO. The mortality rate of whooping cough now may be decidedly lowered by the use of a specific serum, Harriet M. Felton, D., Philadelphia, reports in the Journal of the American Medical Association for May 5.

Until very recently, Dr. Felton observes, there has been no treatment measure which has been able to influence the clinical course of whooping cough in any great degree.

Development of this particular serum, which is now called hyperimmune serum, has been under way for less than 10 years. Thus far, the observations have been made on small groups and without untreated control cases. The efficiency of hyperimmune human serum has been indicated only by the dramatic reduction of the fatality rate, especially in infants in the first six months of life.

This serum is prepared from the blood of adult donors who have a history of whooping cough in childhood, who receive a series of injections of whooping cough vaccine. The serum is separated from the whole blood and usually frozen for storage.

"Severe whooping cough in infants," Dr. Felton says, "is one of the medical conditions before which the physician today often feels completely inadequate. The incidence of this disease has dropped significantly during the last five years, but the mortality rate in children under one year of age continues to be very high. The statistics have been difficult to evaluate because many cases have not been reported, and in infants death is frequently caused by the complications of the disease rather than the actual disease itself. It has been estimated that about 25 per cent of the infants under six months of age who contract whooping cough succumb."

"With a lightning attack the enemy was boldly pushed into the midst of our position. Tell me, what possible reason could there be for a dagger into us? No, you need not explain. You and the other platoon leaders and men are a bunch of cowards — shuddering at bombings. Furthermore, you men are sleeping. Be alert!

"But if you men counter-attack me with lightning ferocity the enemy will be completely wiped out."

"Remember the responsibilities being entrusted upon you men. The lives of your fellow soldiers and commanders are very much concerned about the present situation.

"Do you expect the other companies to do your part, you damn fools?"

AROUND THE HOUSE

It removes all scum. Once a week when washing the thermos, add a tablespoon of baking soda and shake well. Scald and sun.

MAN'S FAILURES AND GOD'S PROMISES

LESSON TEXT—Genesis 6:5-7; 8:1, 4, 14, 20-22.
GOLDEN TEXT—While the earth remaineth, seedtime and harvest, and cold and heat, and summer and winter, and day and night shall not cease.—Genesis 8:22.

The beginnings of all things in the book of Genesis include, we are sorry to note, the beginning of sin in the fall of Adam. Soon we read of the first murder, Cain slaying his godly brother, Abel, because his acceptance with God exposed the wrong heart-attitude of Cain.

The godly line was renewed in Seth, but before long sin again lifted its ugly head. Now the wickedness of man had become so widespread that God was driven to a drastic judgment.

I. Judgment for the Wicked (6:5-7)

The Lord sees the wickedness of men—let us not forget that! At times it seems as though the ungodly flourish in their sin and that there is no judgment upon them.

God knows what goes on in the world. He is long-suffering and merciful, but there is a boundary line to His patience, and when that limit is reached, there can be nothing but judgment.

Ever imagination of the thoughts of man's heart was evil continually (v. 5). One is reminded of Jeremiah 17:9, and of such a contemporary estimate of man as that of Dr. Mackay, who said, "Psychology has unveiled the dismal and sinister depths in human nature. Man can no longer flee from reality into the romantic refuge of his own heart; for the human heart has become a house of horrors in whose murky recesses man cannot erect for his sake either a shrine or a citadel. Man is evil; he is a sinner."

God did not change His mind (v. 6), but man by his sin moved himself out of it.
