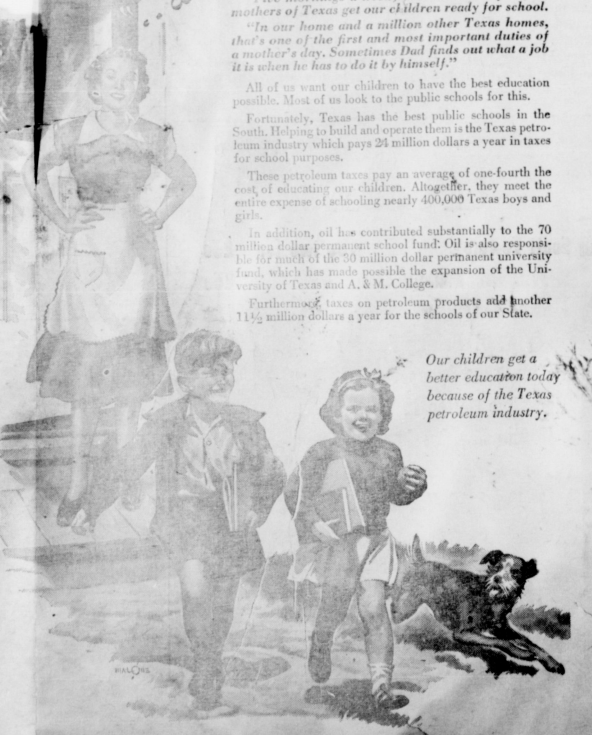

**As Wounds**  
 are rapidly if the all supplied with ascorbic Vitamin C. Some observations have been made by surgeons of wounds of persons who receiving an adequate amount of vitamin C in their diet before operations for appendicitis healed in less than the average time. The theory that the healing was due to the vitamin was put to an experimental test by Dr. Lawrence E. Detrick, research fellow at the University of California, Los Angeles. Using guinea pigs as subjects, he kept one group on a generous vitamin C ration in its diet and found that these animals healed their wounds at a more rapid rate than the control groups receiving a normal diet.

**Diamond Dust Oil**  
 Contrary to popular belief, diamonds are not used to cut diamonds. Instead diamond dust, mixed in olive oil, is applied to the edge of a paper-thin disc made of phosphor-bronze. This disc, spun around at high speed without stopping, may take as long as a week to sily a one-carat diamond. Larger stones, of course, take a proportionately longer time.

**Collection of Superstitions**  
 Although this is a scientific age, Dr. Benjamin Cartwright, education professor of the University of Oklahoma, has a collection of 10,700 superstitions. He began his collection 20 years ago. Many superstitions originated as a means of teaching good morals, good manners or neatness, he believes.

**France's Taxless Villages**  
 In the Jura mountains there are 24 French villages whose population of 10,000 not only do not pay taxes but actually receive a yearly dividend of from 100 to 200 francs. The explanation is that each village owns a large forest whose lumber is exploited in a business-like manner.

**Woman for President**  
 It is often said that Beiva Lockwood, who headed the Equal Rights party ticket in 1884 and again in 1886, was the first woman nominated for the Presidency, but Mrs. Victoria Claflin Woodhull (later Martin), was nominated in 1872 for the Presidency at Vineland, N. J., by a convention styling itself the "National Elective College." Mrs. Woodhull received no electoral votes and only a few scattered popular votes.

**Democratic Insignia**  
 The first cartoon to carry a donkey representing the Democratic party appeared in Andrew Jackson's administration.

**300,000 Nurses**  
 Three hundred thousand nurses are employed in 6,600 hospitals in the United States.

**One Egg Equal**  
 One egg is equal in leavening quality to one-half teaspoon baking powder.

**Crocodiles**  
 Contrary to the usual belief, crocodiles do not shed tears.

**English Actor**  
 Born in Dorchester, Maurice Evans made his stage debut at the age of seven with the Wessex players, an amateur group. As a youth he worked for a music publishing firm but was constantly engaged in dramatics. While playing in "St. Francis of Assisi" he attracted the attention of the manager of the Festival theater at Cambridge, who engaged him for his repertory company. In 1934 he played at the Old Vic and his performance of "Hamlet" led Guthrie McClintic to bring him to the United States to appear with Katherine Cornell in "Homo and Juliet." His first starring role on Broadway was in "St. Helena."

**Odd Book Operations**  
 Some unusual operations are performed on ancient books and manuscripts in a special laboratory at Moscow. Two thousand Chinese scrolls taken there for treatment were moldy and partly stuck together, and of fragile paper. An electrical table was made for them, and by charging them to a high potential with static electricity they were opened up successfully.

**French Service Decoration**  
 The Medaille Militaire, France's premier decoration for distinguished service in action, commands so much respect for its owner that even in military prison unusual favors are granted to him, declares Collier's. At another London, the medal is fastened to the front of his cell door and a guard is stationed there to watch it.

**Stethoscope Mine Testing**  
 The stethoscope, an instrument used by doctors, soon may be used to test coal mine tunnels. The present method is to "sound the roof" with cane or pick handles to detect weaknesses. When one is discovered, timbers are placed under the faulty section to hold the coal in place. Some faults, however, are not disclosed by this method and large roof sections sometimes fall with lightning swiftness, killing miners. The mine-size stethoscope, it is hoped, might expand the testing sounds and disclose danger signals not heard by the unaided ear.

**Hetty Green's Clothes**  
 When young Hetty Green, famous woman capitalist, went to New York to spend a winter her father gave her \$1,200 to spend on clothes with three months to go. She spent that and invested \$1,000 of the money in bonds. She went about the city looking shabby, until her hostess bought her a complete party outfit for a big social event. The Miss Green attended the ball in her shabby old clothes. When she left New York she took the clothing with her, still unworn.

**Record Photography Speed**  
 University of Minnesota scientists have taken the fastest photograph on record—one that required but one one-hundred-millionth of a second. It was taken on an x-ray cathode ray oscillograph which recorded on a photographic plate the oscillations of an electrical current in a hundred-millionth of a second. It is called a vast improvement over any previously constructed oscillograph.

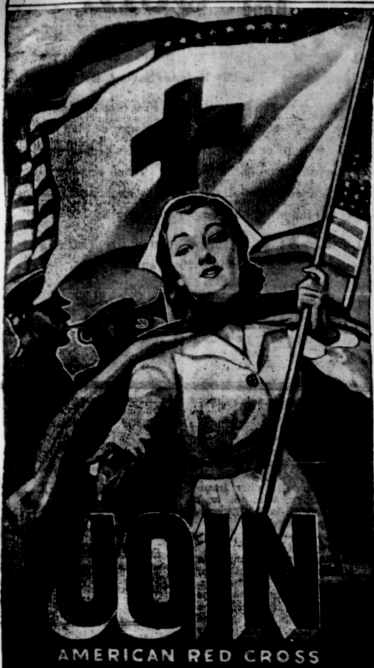
