FORT WORTH, Texas, Jan. 30. Live stock, poultry, rodeo and horse show premium lists are being sent to thousands of persons by the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show, which will open Friday night, March 10.

More than \$60,000 in awards are enlisted in all of the premium booklets. In the agricultural show there will be classes for individuals, boys, agricultural clubs and county wide exhibitions.

Several new classes have been added to the horse show, which will be held matinee and night. Each performance will present one or two horse show events. One new feature in the horse show class is a pulling contest for teams of horses and mules.

Drug Bought As Mild Sedative Kills Texan

ANSON.—After drinking a deadly poison which he apparently had purchased from a drug store as a mild sedative, Robert Meeker, 25, died in an ambulance enroute to a hospital at Stamford Wednesday.

Following an investigation, County Attorney, Omar Parison, said there would be no charges filed in the case, since officers were convinced the fatal was accidental. Meeker's father, Justice of the peace at Stamford, told the druggist that he believed the death of his son was accidental; and that he held no ill toward any one. The clerk who made sale to Meeker was prosecuted over his fatal error, officers said.


