Carbon High School Now Being Improved

Work on the new class-room-gymnasium building is progressing nicely. The new building will consist of three class rooms, two utility rooms, two dressing rooms with showerbaths, a room for spectators, and the gymnasium.

By adding the class rooms, we shall be able to move the study hall out of the auditorium and put it back as originally built.

We now plan to leave the floor out of the gymnasium, and floor the basement rooms of the main building instead. The State Department of Education has recommended each year that the concrete floors in the main building be covered. By covering these floors, we believe that it will increase our State Aid allowance by \$200.00 to \$300.00.

We are in need of more room for the school, and we are very fortunate in being able to receive R. F. C. funds for the work. Every child in school is identified by the building.

We appreciate the hearty cooperation that we are receiving in this project. We will do all the school work. This is a period of reconstruction, but the school is not in session. Anybody can own a school building.

Captain Tells Whale of Story; It Rains Whales

Boston, Mass.—The wind blew a hundred miles an hour! It rained a hundred whales! More than a hundred leebegs were sighted! So say the officers and crew of the Hanburg-American line freighter, Hagen, which arrived here recently after the storm-tost Atlantic crossing in memory. Two baby elephants and 13 monkeys were part of his cargo.

The trouble started, according to Capt. Karl Windhorst, on Good Friday when the storm broke and reached a peak three days later when one of the 14 Javanese monkeys died, leaving a remainder of 13 and a bad taste in the superstitious minds of the crew.

That afternoon the wind rose to hurricane force and things happened in earnest. Two life boats were stove in, cabin doors were splintered and part of the top rail carried away. Then just before dusk two giant combes rose out of the murk, and the rain of whales began.

Presumably the school was caught up by the two huge waves, which met in a thunder of foam on the forecastle head, for the officers declared that at least a hundred whales plopped into the sea on both sides of the ship, some even bumped down the steamer's steel sides.

Phone Wires In Africa
Strange Big Giraffes

Kenya Colony, Africa.—Brafta have compelled the constructors of telephone lines in Kenya Colony to use higher telephone posts. This fact was revealed on the occasion of the recent opening of the first big telephone trunk line in East Africa.

It was declared that existing lines were broken by the necks of giant giraffes, which were not infrequently strangled to death in their efforts to release themselves from the wires.

The new service will link Nairobi with Mombasa and Dar-es-Salaam, the capital of Tanganyika, a distance of about 600 miles.

The Katy Serves

Pioneer railroad in its territory—the Katy through-

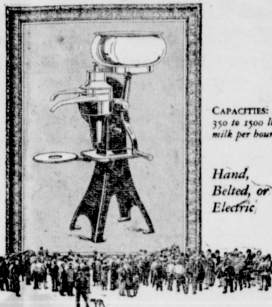

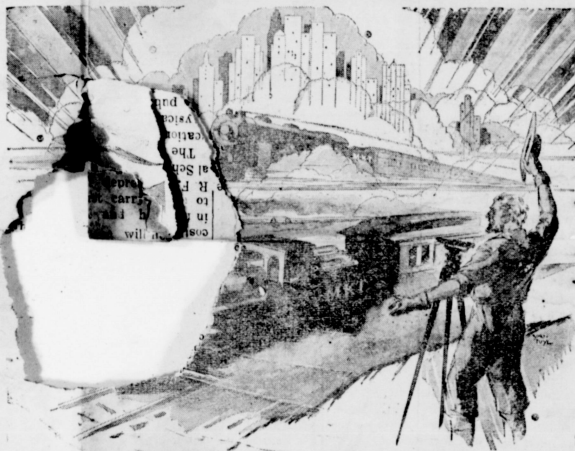

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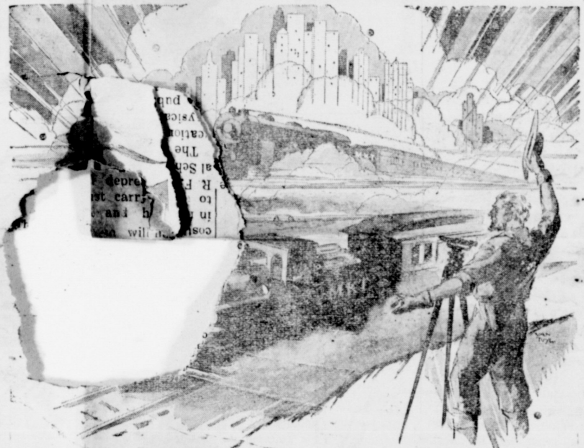
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
