DEMONSTRATION FARM MARKET ESTABLISHED

GAINESVILLE—The fourth demonstration farm home makers' market to be established in Texas under the supervision of market specialists of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service was opened in Gainesville late in May in a centrally located building formerly occupied by the chamber of commerce. Its facilities are available to any member of a farm family which will agree to abide by the rules and regulations of the market committee which have been approved by the county home demonstrators. The market is to be open from 7:30 a. m. to 12:30 p. m. each Wednesday and Saturday morning. Similar markets are in operation in Amarillo, Lubbock and Austin.

All products sold on the market must be grown or made by the seller, who must have a health certificate, renewed every six months. An entrance fee of 50¢ is charged and a commission of 10 per cent deducted from selling. Half of this goes to pay the market manager and half is applied to the operating expense. Every seller must guarantee his products before placing any not satisfactory product on the market. All products must be labelled to conform to the Federal and State Pure Food and Drug Acts. Products sold under the "Better 4-H Products" label of home demonstration clubs must be approved by the standardization committee of the Extension Service.

About 50 customers stopped the first morning for purchases of milk, whipping cream, butter, cottage cheese, American cheese, pork products, fresh vegetables and berries, cookies, cakes, graded eggs, and live and dressed chickens.

United States Government Revenue Act for 1932 Section No. 751; provides that a tax of TWO CENTS be imposed on all checks except those cashed at the window of the bank. Such checks cashed at the bank are not subject to this tax. This bank has no choice in the matter but is compelled to collect said tax of TWO CENTS per check and remit the Government monthly. Naturally, this new tax imposes a tremendous amount of detail on all banks.

This tax was effective June 21st and all checks presented on or after that date will be taxed in accord with the new law, by charging the customer's account at the rate of two cents per check.

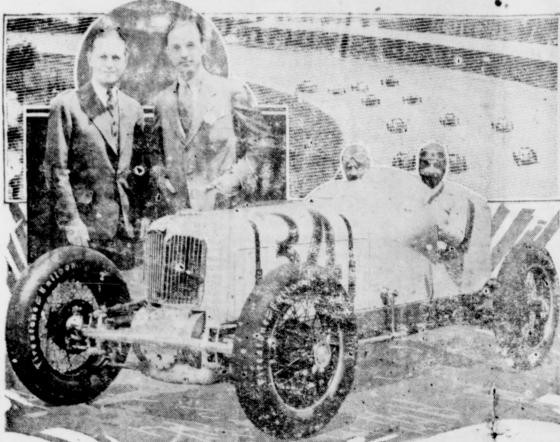
