Eastland Leads In Poll Taxes

Eastland leads in the number of poll taxes paid this year in Eastland County, according to a tabulation made by the tax collector's office. According to the count Eastland leads the entire county with 1,843 poll taxes paid, Ranger is second with 1,316 and Cisco is in third place with a total of only 1,240.

A total of 6,049 state and county poll taxes have been paid by Eastland county voters which compares favorably with other years.

A \$1 Dinner for 4



In these days of cut prices—bats within reach, shoes within reason, stockings at par and two frocks for the former price of one—the budget wears an exceedingly cheerful face. But don't eat up all the money you save. Stick to your weekly "dollar dinner for four" habit. And now that a dollar goes much farther than it did last year, you'll find that for the small sum of twenty-five cents per person, you can plan other dinners quite as tempting as this one. A dietitian has put her seal of approval on the menu and tested the recipes for you.

MENU

- Hamburger, Mexican Style, 53¢
- Mashed Potatoes, 6¢
- French Onion and Butter, 12¢
- Pear and Orange Salad, 11¢
- Cheese Sticks, 5¢
- Deauville, 3¢

Hamburger, Mexican Style: To one pound of hamburger steak add one teaspoon salt, a few grains of pepper and form into eight little cakes; then pan-fry in drippings until brown and tender. Remove to baking dish, sauté one tablespoon chopped onion, in one tablespoon butter, add the contents of one 11-ounce can of corn, one 10-ounce can tomatoes, three-fourths teaspoon salt, three-fourths teaspoon chili powder; bring to boiling point and pour over the meat cakes. Bake in a moderate oven—350 degrees—for thirty minutes.

Pear and Orange Salad: Have very cold one source can of pears, one orange, four lettuce leaves, and four tablespoons French dressing. Arrange a drained pear in each lettuce leaf, lay on slices of orange and pour over the French dressing.

STRENGTHEN YOUR STAFF OF LIFE

A WOMAN who had sailed the seven seas, seen the new moon rising from the morning mist half-way up the Alps and listened to the weird music of Timbuktu, returned to her home in Iowa. Someone asked her what impressed her most about these various countries she had visited.

"The bread," she replied.

This statement would seem to indicate a singular lack of something which travelers are supposed to have—an appreciation of the finer things, it is sometimes called. But over in remote sections of Russia, this traveler had sat in a little restaurant of the working people and studied them as they sliced their pumpernickel from the loaf—crust unbolting, rye with its peculiar aromatic flavor. She, too, had eaten it over a bowl of steaming horchak. She had dined in exclusive boulevard cafés of Paris, where Pierre sliced sections of wheat bread from a loaf almost five feet long—plain ordinary, as it is called. In contrast to the French plain rich—or rich bread. And from there she had gone into quaint little French provinces, where sea water is used exclusively in bread-making, for the mineral content it affords. Over in Milan she had lighted in the flaky Italian bread with its crunchy crust which accompanies the antipasto or for magic in the chestnut bread of Corsica mountaineers; in the hancbread or "hard-tack" loaf of the Scandinavians. It seemed to the student of breads and of hu-

man nature that not only had these people put something of their heritage, their crops and their labors, into their breads—but their breads had put something of their personality into the people.

Our National Breads

Here at home, although we think of bread as a rather uninteresting essential of the meal, there are two typically American breads which are interesting to travelers in our country—the corn bread of the South and the Boston brown bread of Yankee fame.

More and more dietitians here, are making a study of bread. They have discovered that while our favorite white bread is not nearly so lacking in nutriment as it has been sometimes supposed, it needs some strengthening if it is to be our national staff of life. Recently an expert dietitian has made some interesting tests of various kinds of bread substituting canned tomato juice for milk thus adding that vitamin wealth which tomatoes afford. She makes the following comment on these breads:

"Breads made with tomato juice have good texture and lightness and compare favorably with those made with milk."

New Recipes

Following are the found of recipes which are food nutritious and good:

Tomato Cheese Biscuits: Sift together the flour, baking powder

and salt, work in the butter and cheese, using knives or tips of fingers. Add tomato juice and pat or roll out in rounds and bake in a hot oven—450 degrees—for twelve to fifteen minutes.

Tomato Bran Muffins: Sift together one cup flour, four teaspoons baking powder, two tablespoons sugar, one-half teaspoon salt and one-third teaspoon soda. Add one cup bran. Add two well-beaten eggs and one cup tomato juice and finally three tablespoons melted shortening. Bake in muffin tins in a moderate oven—375 degrees—for about twenty minutes.

Tomato Cornmeal Sticks: Sift together one and one-fourth cups flour, four teaspoons baking powder, one-half teaspoon salt, one-third teaspoon soda and one-fourth cup sugar. Add one egg, one cup tomato juice and three-fourths cup melted butter. Bake in cornstick pans in a moderate oven—375 to 400 degrees—for twenty to twenty-five minutes.

Tomato Bacon Muffins: Sift together two cups flour, four teaspoons baking powder, one-half teaspoon salt, one-third teaspoon soda, one tablespoon sugar and one cup tomato juice. Add two well-beaten eggs. Then add two tablespoons bacon drippings and four tablespoons crisp minced bacon. Bake in muffin pans for twenty-five minutes in an oven 375 to 400 degrees.
