The grain crop in our vicinity is good, some farmers cutting oats and are optimistic for the prospects.

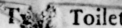

PECAN

Over 100 pecan trees were tended the pecan buds during the week and learned how to grow pecan buds. The patch bud method was advocated by Jim Kelley of the state department of agriculture. Mr. Kelley explained that there were many fads in pecan budding due to the various methods of cutting buds, and the different protective materials used. He recommended that beginners stick close to the patch bud while experimenting with any fancy short cuts. The method used is immaterial, just so long as the buds are made to grow.

After care is very important with budding, as well as grafting, since the successful growth of the new shoot depends on correct pruning back at the proper time. He all grafts to a brace to prevent blowing proper time. All grafts should be to a brace to prevent blowing off, and some buds will need the same attention. Many buds that start off fine are lost because of neglect. It is a great mistake, according to Mr. Kelley, to place buds and grafts with no additional attention.

Mr. Kelley was impressed and expect them to do well, with the large amount of native timber in the county and the number of owners who have started to clean out the foreign growth and give the pecans a fair chance. He urged all owners of native pecans to cut out or poison foreign growth giving the pecans more room and sunlight.

Ten demonstrations were given during the week with the county agent, vocational teachers and state department of agriculture cooperating. An effort had been made to select the best of the week demonstration much new work started tonight. Mr. Kelley distributed copies of the bulletin, "The Pecan in Texas," bulletin No. 95, which may be had free of cost by writing the state department of agriculture at Austin.

When the Thousand-Acre Pecan club was being promoted for the purpose of getting small pecan groves planted from native nuts all over the county, it was proposed to give a pecan budding demonstration within reach of every member of the club. It was partly for the purpose of meeting this agreement that the pecan schools have just been held.

Spanish Tongue Circles the Globe

Laws, Customs and Culture of Spain Given to Vast Region of Earth.

Washington.—The Spanish monarchy has passed, but the "Spanish speaking empire" lives on, says a bulletin from the Washington (D. C.) Headquarters of the National Geographic Society. Spain has given its language, laws, customs, and culture to a vast region of the earth, the bulletin points out, and continues:

"This Spanish culture empire, that covers five million square miles and numbers close to a hundred million people, was once a political empire—one of the greatest the world has known. It sprang into existence quickly in the stirring days of the close of the Fifteenth century and the beginnings of the Sixteenth, when Europe was being electrified every few months by some new discovery or daring bit of exploration.

Spain Looked to the West.

"It grew to the west rather than to the east, for two reasons. Portugal, by previous voyages, had marked out the East by way of the south for her sphere. Therefore Columbus—also intent on reaching the East—sailed westward. From that moment he returned from his first voyage, reporting hitherto unknown land, the interests, imagination, and activities of the Spaniards all faced west. In the second place this westward trend by Spanish exploration was confirmed immediately by a bull of Pope Alexander VI marking out in general the Western hemisphere for Spanish activity and the Eastern hemisphere for that of Portugal, the dividing line in the Atlantic was fixed, after a period of dispute, along a meridian 370 leagues west of the Cape Verde Islands. Brazil had not then been discovered, but the line fell well inland from the Brazilian coast and so legitimized Portugal's later claim to that portion of the New world, leaving to Spain all the remainder.

"The adventurers and gold-seekers who pushed westward in the footsteps of Columbus had soon carved out for Spain all the West Indies, most of South America and large areas in Central and North America. Haiti was the first of the islands which Spanish influence radiated. Jamaica and Cuba soon came under Spain's wing, then the Isthmus of Panama, Florida, and the coast of Argentina were reached in 1513. The same year Balboa crossed the isthmus, waded into the Pacific, and claimed it and all its bounding lands for Spain. Six years later the Spaniards sent Magellan across this newly found ocean. He found little land in crossing, but did set up a Spanish claim to the Philippines, which Spain later made a colony.

"In the meantime Spanish control was spreading in the New world. The conquest of Mexico began in 1519, Panama City was founded the same year and became a starting point for expeditions north and south along the shores of the Pacific. There was invaded in 1532 and Chile came at least partly under Spain soon after. The

California coast was explored in 1542 and land expeditions went about the same time into regions that are now New Mexico, Texas, Arizona and even Colorado. Settlements had previously been established in Venezuela and Colombia on the Caribbean coast of South America.

European Gains Soon Lost.

"At the same time Spain was the great power of Europe, controlling the Low Countries, much of Italy, and later Portugal, with all her eastern empire. But over all these European and eastern portions of her empire Spain had only tenuous control, and when the empire broke up they passed on to new or old sovereignties, little colored by Spanish culture. Spain made her deepest impression on her New world territories and on the Philippines. These regions fell heir to the Spanish language, religion, law, customs and architecture; and in the former at least these factors remain today as Spanish as in the mother country.

"In exploring the Spanish-speaking world the logical starting place is Spain, fourteenth and fifteenth centuries, which have influenced one-eleventh of the earth's land area. And of course the Spaniard takes his course westward as did Spain's empire. In the western coast of Africa four patches of territory are encountered where the Spanish flag as well as Spanish influences rest. Offshore are the Canary Islands. There the Spanish flag is left behind; to such small proportions has the political realm of Spain shrunk.

"The next bit of the Spanish world encountered lies in the New world. It is Uruguay, smallest republic of South America, where the children of Spain are carrying on the culture of the mother country. Beyond, eight other countries—all those of South America save Portuguese Brazil and British, French and Dutch Guiana—fall, too, under the banner of Spanish culture.

Defections in West Indies.

"In the West Indies there have been defections. Trinidad and the Leeward and Windward Islands, although once all claimed by Spain, have lost or never felt Spanish culture. Over Porto Rico the flag of the United States flies; but it is still a part of the Spanish world. Similarly the Spanish seed was first planted in the New world, the western half of the island still shows strongly the Spanish impress. This is the Dominican Republic, where language and law are still Spanish. But in the western half of the island, covered by the Republic of Haiti, Spanish culture succumbed to that of France and Africa.

"Jamaica, once a stronghold of Spain, has long been dominated by British culture; and the Bahamas, claimed by Spain, have known only British influences. Cuba has been independent of Spanish political power since 1898, but is still culturally a part of Spain—the most Spanish of the West Indian islands.

"Through the Isthmus of Panama, Central America, and Mexico, Spanish cultural influences sweep unbroken as they have for the past three centuries and more. Florida shows little effect of her former Spanish own-

ership save a few architectural touches and its geographic names. Texas, too, passed to Spain, but in many a colony near the Rio Grande the Spanish language is almost as necessary as the English. In Arizona and California, once under Spanish influence, the situation is much like that in Texas.

Spanish Influence in United States.

"But one American state stands on a different footing. New Mexico has barely passed the point at which its English-speaking influences weigh more heavily than its Spanish factors. Only a few years ago it could have been listed as a part of the Spanish world. Then its legislature was conducted in Spanish or in the two tongues; and Spanish was the current language on street and range and farm. As it is the beam has tipped only a little the interpreter is still an important person in the courts, and it is easy enough to find communities in the state in which it still speaks no Spanish he can make himself understood only through some school child. These youngsters are being taught English now in the public schools and in a few generations

"Continuing westward one finds no further traces of Spain's world-wide empire until he reaches the Philippines. There, in spite of the mixture of blood, Spanish culture took firm hold; at least in the non-Mohammedan country. Spanish customs, laws and architecture will no doubt coil life in the Philippines for many years to come. In spite, however, of the passing of Spanish influence may not be so long delayed if the United States continues to govern the islands. Already English is in about as general use as Spanish, and if present educational methods continue the Philippines may yet join Jamaica and California as regions definitely lost to the Spanish world."

WHAT TO EAT

When making gravy without browned flour, add the flour to the fat and stir until well blended, then add the liquid and a teaspoonful of caramel to give the color. Add a little more brown color.

Molasses Biscuit.—Mix and sift two and one-half cups of pastry flour with one-half teaspoonful each of ginger and cinnamon, a grating of nutmeg, three tablespoonfuls of shortening are now added, and when well mixed add three-eighths of a cupful of buttermilk and three tablespoonfuls of molasses. Pat half an inch thick and cut with a small cutter. Bake in a hot oven ten minutes. These are served with butter and marmalade.

Lemon Tart.—Make a rich pastry and bake in fancy-shaped tins about two inches deep. Crimp the edges of the crust and fill with the following: Mix four tablespoonfuls of cornstarch with one-half cupful of cold water and add to one and one-half cupfuls of boiling water, stir and cook until thick. Beat the yolks of four eggs, add two cupfuls of sugar, one tablespoonful of butter, the juice of three lemons and the grated rind of one. Cook over water until smooth and thick enough to stir up in points and when stirred with a spoon. Fill the shells and cover with the egg white beaten stiff with five tablespoonfuls of sugar added. Bake in a moderate oven until lightly crisp brown.

Mock Duck.—Take a two-pound steak two inches thick and split to hold the dressing. Season well on both sides with salt and pepper. For the dressing take two cupfuls of toasted crumbs, two slices of diced cooked bacon, one-half teaspoonful of salt and pepper to taste, add one egg slightly beaten, two chopped onions, a half teaspoonful of onion salt and half a cupful of water. Beat the steak and tie with a string. Seal all over until brown. Cook in a Dutch oven slowly until tender.

Lizard Teaches Lesson

Chuckwallas are gentle and easily handled, and make interesting pets if captured and kept in comfortable quarters with a satisfactory food supply. We know too little of the habits of even our common wild neighbors, and these dwellers in the desert country do many interesting things that we do not understand, says Nature Magazine. For instance, if we could eliminate the waste of our bodies by means of a certain kind of water, it would be very convenient at times, and we might go for months without drinking it. Apparently some of the cold-blooded reptiles suffer from the heat and many thrive in the hottest parts of our low desert valleys, basking on rocks so hot that one can hardly bear to touch them with the naked hand.

Queer-Looking Crocodiles

Some of the queerest-looking crocodiles in the world have been received at the British zoo. They are of the kind known as gharials, and came from Borneo. They are most fantastic in appearance, as their alarming-looking, well-armed jaws are drawn out into long, narrow snouts, swelling at the tips. They are the giants of the family, often growing to be well over 20 feet in length. They have the true crocodile teeth, these being set in a straight line and interlocking, the fourth tooth on either side of the lower jaw meeting a notch in the upper jaw.

Highlights of Chase House

The Chase house at Annapolis, Md., was built in 1770 by Edward Lloyd. A three-story, boxlike exterior in Flemish bond. 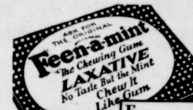

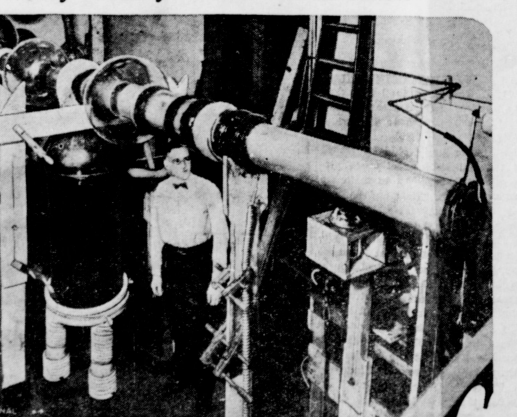

Honoring the "Maid of Grand Pre"



HISTORIC EVANGELINE OAK ON BAYOU TECHE

THE other day several thousand people gathered in the little town of St. Martinville, La., to participate in a ceremony which rolled back the pages of history to events that took place more than 175 years ago.

The ceremony was the unveiling of a statue and when it stood revealed there was recalled once more a great tragedy in American colonial history, and one of the tenderest love stories in American literature, the story of the quest of Evangeline for her lover, Gabriel, immortalized in a poem by Henry Wadsworth Longfellow. For the statue was a life-size image of the young girl of Grand Pre.

Of those who had gathered there to pay her honor were her own people—Louisiana descendants of the eighteenth century Acadians and a delegation of several hundred Acadians from Montreal, Grand Pre, Montreal and other Canadian cities and towns who made a pilgrimage to this shrine for this occasion and who were also repaying a visit made by the Louisiana Acadians to Canada last year.

Erecting the statue over the spot near the left wing of the old St. Martinville Catholic church in St. Martinville where the real Evangeline lies buried is one of the steps in the project of establishing a national memorial to her. The men were ordered there, in particular, and the Acadians, their sufferings, their romance and their faith. In general, the real "Evangeline" was Emmeline Labiche, the faithless "Gabriel" was Louis Arcevaux, and their life story is a part of the tragic tale of the simple folk of Acadia who were deported by British soldiers from their homes away back in 1755.

Colonel John Winslow will live in history as the officer sent to "see" the little village of Grand Pre, on the shore of the Basin of Minas, to do this.

Winslow arrived at Grand Pre on August 10, September 1755. Colonel Winslow issued a proclamation informing the people that the lieutenant-governor had a communication to impart to them. The men were ordered there, to appear in the church at Grand Pre at 3 o'clock in the afternoon of Friday, September 5.

On that fatiguing Friday a strange sight greeted the 418 men as they filed slowly into the church that had been familiar to them from their youth. Stern-faced soldiers, wearing bayonets and red coats guarded the door and in the middle of the church a table had been placed and around it were other armed soldiers.

As Colonel Winslow entered, attended by his staff, a deep hush fell upon the people. Without any preliminaries, he proceeded to deliver his address in English. Immediately afterward it was interpreted in French.

With the pronouncement of the terrible words, "That you, and your families, and your household goods, and that you yourselves are to be removed from this, his majesty's province," a murmur of anguish es-

Hawthorne who first gave the poet the hint of the romance which he wrote into his poem. Under the date of October 24, 1858, was the following memorandum in Hawthorne's handwriting: "A young girl of Acadia, on their marriage, they all men of the province were summoned to assemble in the church to hear a proclamation. When they assembled they were seized and shipped off to be distributed through New England, among them the bridegroom. His bride set off in search of him, wandered about New England all her lifetime, and at last when she was old, she found her bridegroom in his deathbed. The shock was so great that it killed her likewise."

H. L. C. was Horace Lorenzo Conolly, then a neighbor of Hawthorne at Salem. He had been rector of St. Matthew's Protestant Episcopal church in South Boston. But Hawthorne was probably in error in stating that Conolly obtained the story directly from a French Canadian.

At any rate some time later Hawthorne took Conolly to dine with Longfellow at Cambridge. During the dinner the clergyman told Longfellow that he had been lying in vain to study the story of Acadia. It was based on an incident told him by Mrs. George M. Halliburton, a former parishioner, who had formerly lived in Nova Scotia. Conolly then wrote the story briefly. Longfellow said to Hawthorne: "If you really do not want this incident, let me have it for a poem."

His friend willingly consented, and "Evangeline" was the result. The other account—and this is the one which you will hear in the Acadia country of Louisiana—is that Longfellow, while he was an instructor at Harvard, told the story by a handsome young Acadian, then a student at Harvard. Edward Simon, later a judge in Louisiana, who had learned it from his friend, Judge Poit, told the story by his grandmother, Madame Anne Bastarache, who brought Evangeline to the Teche country. Madame Bastarache died in 1837, at the age of 63.

It was Madame Bastarache who told of how Emmeline Labiche sprang out from her former life and of how the faithless lover together that he had married another girl was happy. On the banks of the ancient Duke Delois Blanc, Louis Arcevaux settled with his bride and there many of his descendants are to be seen. 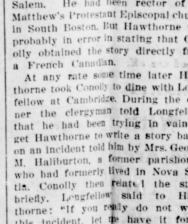

GROWING TURKEYS MADE PROFITABLE

Confinement Method for Poults Is Practical.

Eastern states have an advantage in growing turkeys with the development of new methods and the closeness of market, providing they send high-quality turkeys to market, according to Ira J. Hollar of the New York state college of agriculture.

In the Middle West many small flocks are kept as a sideline, but because of the blackhead, a disease of the intestines and liver, and low prices many of these flocks have been discontinued. The western states that have grown the most turkeys are now growing fewer and some states that have not been considered important are now increasing their flocks. Pennsylvania shows a 25 per cent increase in 1929 and 8 per cent more in 1930, he says.

The old theory that turkeys must have plenty of range is not only false but more expensive than the new methods. It has been proved that turkeys can be profitably raised in confinement. At the Pennsylvania state college 95 per cent of all turkeys started were raised to market age when confinement was practiced. In New York state the "cage" method of raising turkeys has also proved satisfactory.

Many of these new suggestions about raising turkeys are available on request to the mail-order college of Agriculture, Ithaca, New York. Ask for New York state turkey leaflet.

Housing Early Pullets Helps Egg Production

Prof. Willard C. Thompson of the New Jersey State College of Agriculture, Rutgers, N. J., has some valuable advice about housing pullets into their laying houses.

"When the combs of early-hatched pullets begin to turn red, it is time to move the laying houses ready for use. Then, if moved into their new quarters promptly, these birds usually can be depended upon to start to lay the first eggs at a time when the hens are slackening their efforts.

"Space for the early-hatched pullets should be increased by removing market birds and concentrating the survivors in fewer pens.

"Pens reserved for the incoming pullets should be cleaned, disinfected and supplied with litter. Space may be allotted for the first of four square feet a bird, and, once the pullets are in their new quarters, they should be kept confined to the pens. The regular laying ration is advised for the pullets as they go into winter quarters."

Art of Caponizing Js Profitable Operation

Poultry raisers who can spare a little time should study up the art of caponizing, which means a good price upon the market, and are at ways in good demand. The operation process is easily learned and is so profitable that it pays to poultry man to try his hand at it. The slip are not lost, and if you kill a few by practicing you can sell the carcasses on the market or use it for house consumption. Of course it is necessary that you have proper tools to do this work, but these can be purchased at poultry supply stores anywhere.

Poultry Hints

Eliminate the males and improve the quality of summer eggs.

If poultry raising is an earnest about building up a flock of pure breeds and keeping them up to the mark as fanners and brooding fowls you will soon be a money maker.

Potatoes are not a good poultry food for winter feeding, they contain too much heat-producing substance; but a preparation may be used with advantage when the weather is cold.

During the hot weather leave doors and windows open in the poultry house to give all possible comfort to the flock.

Good ventilation is not confined to expensive poultry houses. An effective system can be devised cheaply for any house.

It is better to have birds in range shelters. The cockers should be separated from the pullets, and this is done when they are eight or ten weeks of age. The pinner the better

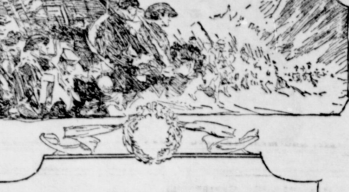

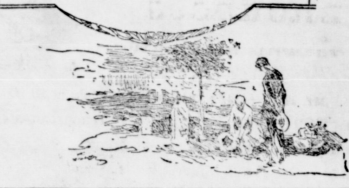

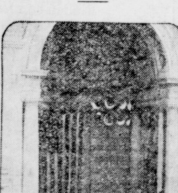

JESUS IN GETHSEMANE

GOLDEN TEXT.—Saying, Father, if thou be willing, remove this cup from me; nevertheless not my will, but thine, be done. LESSON TEXT.—Luke 22:39-54. JUNIOR TOPIC.—Jesus in the Garden. INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC.—Obedy Ohn at Any Cost. YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC.—The Meaning of Gethsemane.

I. Jesus at the Mount of Olives. (v. 39). He went from the upper room under cover of the night to the Garden of Gethsemane, a favorite resort on the slope of the Mount of Olives...

II. His Companions (vv. 40, 41). Peter, James and John, who had been with him on the Mount of Transfiguration, were permitted to go with him into the deep shadows of the Garden (Matt. 26:37). He took those who were best able to apprehend the meaning of the tragic hour to be his sympathizing companions...

III. Jesus Praying (vv. 41-44). 1. Withdrawal from the disciples (v. 41). Even these members of the inner circle could not now go with him. He tore himself away from them, for he must be alone in this darkest hour...

2. He said (v. 42). If thou be willing, remove this cup from me. The cup did not mean primarily the physical sufferings of the cross, though they were, exceeding great. He did not now desire to escape from the cross and thus to stop short of his redemptive work; for this was the supreme purpose of his coming into the world (Heb. 2:14). He was so completely identified with a sinning race that the judgment of a holy God which rightfully would have fallen upon it was about to strike him—the Father's fire was actually turned from him. The cup, therefore, meant his death as the bearer of sin. He came to Gethsemane with the full knowledge of what it meant, and consciously brought his human will into accord with the divine will. 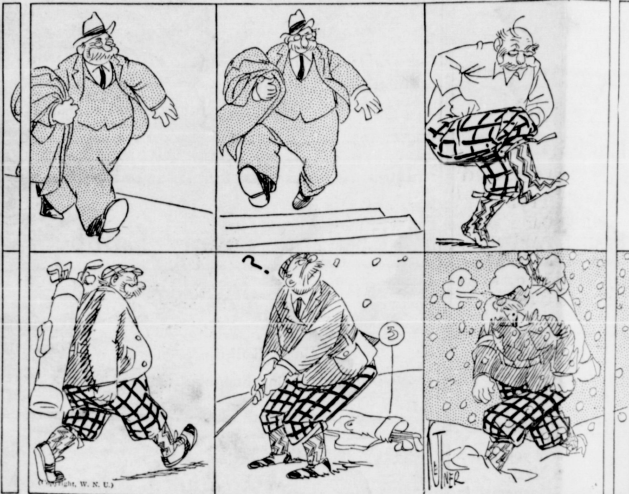

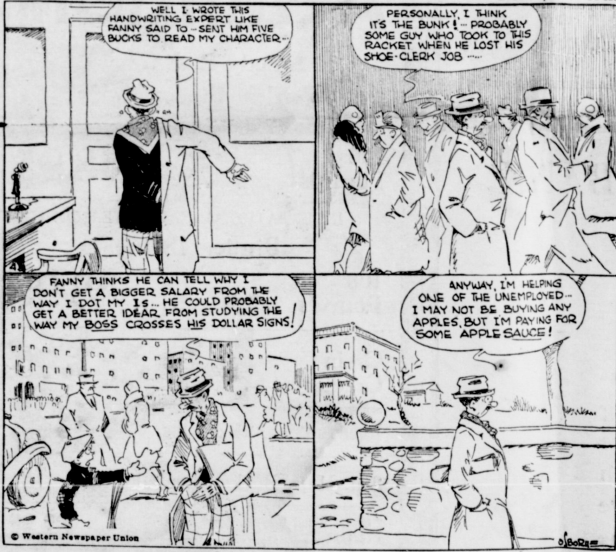

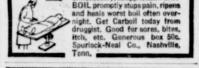
