Many New Texas Laws Have Become Effective

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, June 13.—Some of the most important acts passed by the regular session of the legislature become effective today—90 days after adjournment of the session. The list includes all bills that did not receive the necessary two-thirds vote in both houses and were not approved until after adjournment.

The Quinn sulphur tax bill is among the acts which take effect today. It was one of the few revenue measures passed during the regular session and places a 2 per cent gross production tax on all sulphur produced in the state. A similar act, carrying penalties which were omitted from the first bill, was passed by the session just closing. It is estimated the sulphur bill will net the state \$500,000 annually.

A partial list of important measures which became operative today follows:

Amendments to workmen's compensation act; county school unit bill; state educational survey bill; medical practice act; abolishing so-called "three per cent" loan companies; county auditors' act; increasing salaries; sheriff's fee bill; nurses' license act and county commissioners' act.

The Rogers bill amending the workmen's compensation act increases minimum benefits under the act from \$5 to \$7 weekly, and maximum benefits from \$15 to \$20.

Although the \$50,000 appropriated by the educational survey act for conducting an investigation of all schools, including public and higher educational institutions, is not available until September 1st, the governor is required to call a meeting of the directing committee within 30 days after the act becomes effective. This committee, consisting of the governor and school officials, will select a commission of experts from outside the state to conduct the survey.

The medical practice act is probably one of the most important bills passed at the regular session. It completely revises medical requirements of state laws, and places stringent regulations on all those practicing or seeking to practice medicine. It requires all physicians and doctors to go before the state medical board and obtain thru examination license to practice. One of the points of friction while the act was under consideration was the question of exempting chiropractors and Christian Science practitioners from provisions of the act. Amendments to this effect were defeated and such persons come under the act if they charge compensation for their services.

All "3 per cent" loan companies are given until May, 1925, to dispose of their holdings and transfer to other concerns under terms of the Holbrook act, effective today.

Sheriffs, county auditors' and county commissioners' salaries are

HARVEST CALLS 50,000 HANDS

KANSAS CITY, June 13.—The wheat harvest will require the labor of fifty thousand extra men as the harvest movement swings Northward embracing Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas and Nebraska. George Tucker, field director of the United States Labor Bureau, announced today. Tucker said that this estimate was not an unusual demand at this season of the year.

Director Tucker said that the demand for extra help would probably begin first in the Texas Panhandle and the Western counties of Texas between June 20th and 25th, and would move Northward as rapidly as the harvest work could be carried on.

FRENCH SAILORS DEMAND WINE

NEW YORK, June 13.—Nearly half the crew on the French liner France served notice on the captain of the vessel as it sailed today that they would refuse to make another trip to America, unless arrangements were made so they could get two daily rations of wine as provided for by French law. Despite this warning from the crew the captain of the ship declared that the France would return on schedule time if it had to recruit a new crew from the merchant marine college.

SEEKING TO SEARCH SHIPS

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, June 13.—Informal negotiations have been initiated by the state department with various maritime powers contemplating a solution on a reciprocal basis of the ship liquor controversy and rum smuggling fleet problem through the exercise of the treaty making power.

American officials revealed today that they see in this method an opportunity to eliminate inconveniences to foreign ships within the three mile limit due to the prohibition enforcement regulations, while at the same time the fleet and rum smugglers off the United States coast may be broken up through the extension of treaty agreements the right of search for this specific purpose up to a twelve mile limit.

HALF MILLION DOLLAR FLOOD SWEEPS TULSA

(By Associated Press)
TULSA, Okla., June 13.—The flood waters of the Arkansas River fastened its hold on Tulsa and vicinity today. It is the most disastrous flood in the history of the city.

The waterworks plant here this morning was forced to shut down leaving Tulsa virtually unprotected against fire. Desperate efforts were made by the employees of the Oklahoma Power Company to keep the plant from being flooded. The Texas Company refinery was shut down early this morning on account of the water approaching the boilers.

There are between three and four thousand homeless most of whom are in West Tulsa and Sand Springs. Up to a late hour only one death had been reported and that was that of a negro, who was killed when he dived from a bridge, his head striking a sharp object in the water.

The Arkansas River was this morning nineteen feet above normal and it is expected that the river will continue rising through the next thirty-six hours. The amount of property damage in and around Tulsa is expected to exceed a half million dollars.

WAR BREAKS OUT IN BULGARIA

(By Associated Press)
BELGRADE, June 13.—Dispatches to Jugo-Slav newspapers today report the existence of civil war throughout the greater part of Bulgaria.

Former cabinet ministers, Oborff and Douparinoff are said to have been killed during an engagement with the revolutionary troops. Former Premier Stamboulsky, accompanied by a friend, is reported to be fleeing on horseback through the mountains of central Bulgaria and Director Pirdop is being pursued by a squadron of revolutionary horsemen.

REGRETS ACTION NEW YORK WETS

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, June 13.—The House today adopted a resolution deploring the action of the New York legislature in repealing the state prohibition act. The vote was 60 to 29. An amendment previously presented to the House seeking to commend the stand that the New York lawmaking body took on the enforcement of prohibition was floored by a vote of 78 to 8.

Commissioner L. A. Curry will have his road crew at work on the Ballinger-Maverick road within three weeks, according to a statement made before a mass meeting of citizens of Maverick and other towns at Maverick Tuesday night.

Mr. Curry's statement came as the closing discussion of the road question at the Maverick meeting and following a band concert by the Ballinger band which accompanied a large delegation from Ballinger to Maverick.

At the request of the Maverick Community Club about twenty-five or thirty cars loaded with people motored to Maverick Tuesday evening to attend the good roads meeting. J. M. Slaughter called the meeting to order, and after a few remarks asked Stuart L. Williams, secretary of the Ballinger Y. M. B. L., to preside.

Mr. Williams called on different ones present to make short talks in discussing the good roads problem. The road from Maverick to Ballinger is about the worst piece of road in the county, and the citizens met to devise ways and means of improving the road.

As talks were made by various citizens present the meeting developed considerable enthusiasm. Scott H. Mack was the first speaker called on, and others responded to the call of the chairman in the following order: Bob Knierim, of Bronte; J. McGregor, J. E. Pirie, Judge A. K. Doss, County Judge Trimmier, and a de-

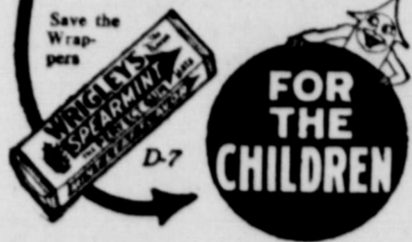

STOCK BROKERS GET SENTENCE

 NEW YORK, June 13.—Edward M. Miller and W. Frank McGee, two stock brokers involved in New York's most sensational bucket shop case, plead guilty to the charge of bucketing an order from Franklin Link, West Moreland, Tennessee, today, and were remanded for sentence Friday. The firm failed several months ago for four million dollars.

NEGRO WOMAN PLEADS GUILTY TO SHOOTING

Bessie Jones, a negro, plead guilty to disturbing the peace, and was released from jail Wednesday morning after friends had arranged her fine.

The negro was arrested Saturday night following a disturbance in a negro rooming house operated by Alice Vernon, where it was alleged she took a shot with a pistol at a negro man by the name of "Pomp" who was paying her some attentions. "Pomp's" life was probably saved by Jerry Early, another negro, who knocked the gun up just as the negro woman pulled the trigger and sent the bullet intended for "Pomp," wild.

According to the story told the officers by the witnesses in the case, Bessie was "ailing" and "Pomp" was applying ice water to her aching brow when the love affair developed into a quarrel, and slipping a pistol from under her pillow, the negro woman took shot at "Pomp."

increased varying degrees, depending upon size of the county, under terms of other acts. Commissioners' fees in sixty-eight counties are increased, ranging from \$200 to 50 per cent annually. Sheriffs are allowed additional fees, which, it is said, will increase their salaries as high as 50 per cent in some counties. Auditors of larger counties receive increases under the Ridgeway act.

Registered nurses are required to obtain new licenses within 30 days, under the Dudley act. All other nurses who charge fees and make nursing a profession are required to obtain licenses under the bill, subject to examination and fees.

Numerous other bills of minor importance are effective today and many local bills were approved by the governor before the session adjourned and already are in effect. The reclamation act and Texas Technological College act are among the most important bills which became effective immediately on signature by the governor.

AGREE ON RURAL SCHOOL AID BILL

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, June 13.—The McMillin bill prohibiting the carrying of firearms while possessing narcotics and fixing a heavy penalty, was passed by the House today.

The Senate defeated the proposal to establish an illiteracy commission when Senator Clark held the floor for more than an hour preventing further consideration of the measure under the forty-eight hour rule.

The conference committee came to an agreement on the rural school aid bill, placing the appropriation at \$1,500,000.

Work to Begin on Maverick Road in Near Future

fense of his administration was made by Commissioner Curry after the statement had been made that a petition had been circulated and numerous signed asking the Commissioners' Court to get busy and repair the road, and after a motion had been adopted providing for the appointment of a committee to meet and confer with Mr. Curry. Mr. Curry denied the report and resented the insinuation that he had been impartial in dealing with the people of his precinct. He told the citizens assembled that they were wasting time in presenting petitions to him, and declared that he would ignore such petitions and that he was already doing the best he could with the money available, and that it had always been his policy to deal fairly and squarely with all the people of his precinct.

It had been hinted around that Mr. Curry was neglecting the roads North of the Colorado river in his precinct and spending most of the money on roads South of the river, or those which lead into his home town of Miles. County Judge Trimmer also defended Commissioner Curry against such charges and told how the road money was being expended and quoted figures to show that the annual revenue for the upkeep of roads in Commissioner Curry's precinct was only a little more than \$6,000 per mile.

All the Ballinger speakers assured the Maverick people that Ballinger was ready to back them

in any program which they might adopt for building a good road from Maverick to Ballinger, or from the Coke county capital to the capital of Rannels county. The road between the two points carries a heavy travel, yet it is one of the worst in this part of the county.

Engineer Pirie spoke in behalf of the good roads amendment which the people will either adopt or reject on July 28th. He briefly outlined that the amendment was one which should be all means be adopted, as it would take off the hands of the commissioners' courts the main highways and place them under the supervision and financial support of the federal and state governments, and make it possible for the state to get federal road aid and at the same time leave the commissioners' courts free to look after other county roads with all county road money to spend on the county roads while the state highway department would finance the building and maintenance of the main intra-county highways. J. McGregor, who stated that he had said that he would never vote for another amendment to the constitution, declared that he would retract his statement and vote for the good roads amendment and urged every man and woman to go to the polls and help to put it over.

Judge Doss briefly discussed the irrigation question and appealed to the farmers to post themselves before going on record as opposing the proposition. He stated he believed that every farmer would be heartily in favor of the irrigation proposition if they would turn on the light and compare what their land would be worth under irrigation with what it is now, and he referred to other successful irrigation projects in the country as examples. "It would be greater than any oil boom," said Judge Doss, "as it would be more permanent in its benefit and would bring a better class of people to our county."

After Commissioner Curry had declared that work would begin on the Maverick-Ballinger road within three weeks, the meeting adjourned with those who attended feeling that much good had been accomplished and the good roads question in this county scoring another victory.

A large crowd of Maverick, Bronte and Norton citizens attended the mass meeting, the old school building being filled to overflow, many standing on the outside and hearing the discussions through the open windows.

MANY HEAR TALK SOUTH AMERICA

A large congregation filled the tent on 9th Street last night to hear Missionary Brown's interesting lecture on Brazil, South America. Many interesting curios shown, some of which were wooden shoes, a long knife carried by the people of the farm, hand-made flowers, lace made of banana leaf fiber, vessels made of horn, walking sticks made from fine woods, etc.

The speaker gave a graphic description of the voyage from New York, of flying fish, of natives in the port of Recife who would dive into the ocean after coins tossed overboard by passengers, of rubber and coffee trees and other tropical fruits. He said, "It is very dry in Northern Brazil, in the states of Ceara, Pernambuco, etc., and to get water the people dig holes in the front yard, which are kind of a cistern. Trenches are dug leading to their cisterns on top of the ground. During the dry time these trenches are filled with filth from the animals and when the rain comes it carries all into the cistern, thus spreading disease. Missionaries must carry water with them."

"There is no bed, chair, nor table in the farmer's home," said Mr. Brown. "He sleeps on the ground and eats raw corn meal and beans. The corn is beaten with an ingenious machine run by water and allowed to sour for three or four days in water; then dried over a slow fire and eaten raw with beans. The smell of this meal is intolerable to the uninitiated."

"The farmer," the speaker said, "uses no plow. There is no hammer, wrench or nail on a Brazilian farm. He clears the land with an axe and brush knife and punches holes among the logs and stumps and drops in the corn and beans."

"There is no divorce law. There is a law to divide the property, but it does not permit remarriage. For this reason about thirty-five per cent of the people are living together without being married. "Courtship is a serious business in Brazil," said Mr. Brown.
