CZECHO-SLOVAKIA SEEKS MARKET FOR MAMMOTHS

It is the plan of Dr. J. Stehlik, the Moravian paleontologist, who says there is a demand for the skeletons of extinct mammoths that can be greatly stimulated.

The Czecho-Slovak province of Mocavia is richer in the remains of mammoths than any other region in the world. This source of supply has barely been scratched. Thousands of heaps of bones in all parts of the province are still unexcavated.

Dr. Stehlik and his colleagues at the anthropological museum in Brno, capital of the province think that there would be a good and growing demand for complete skeletons of the prehistoric mon sters. They are arranging to reconstruct them from genuin boues and supply them to museums

The Ballinger city commission in special meeting Wednesday afternoon passed a resolution removing all penalties and interest on delinquent taxes for 1933 and previou years, to be effective until March 31, 1935. This is in accordance with the Polk bill relating to state taxes and the local city administration was one of the first to give property owners who owe delinquent taxes the benefit of the new

Those who have paid delinquent taxes, including penalty and interest will not be entitled to a rebate, however, as there would be not stopping place were this started, the commissioners pointed

The order became effective today November 15, and anyone owing taxes may settle the account for all years prior to 1934 without the payment of interest and penalty.







WEEDS GROWN WITH CARE IN GARDENS IN IRELAND

BELFAST Northern Ireland, Nov

14.-Weeds are encouraged to grow in a garden which is beautifully kept at an elementary school near Belfast. Under the guidance of the minister of education twenty-five teachers are being taught how to teach horticulture to the scholars in the rural area.

Every sort of weed is grown in orderly fashion. There are neat little rows of regular garden pests which drive the amateur gardener to despair. They are fostered and tended as if they were orchids. By careful examination of the specimens the students get to know a lot about weeds and there will be a great slaughter when they return to their own school
