

This picture was taken at the Cargray "stripping plant" near White Deer, Texas when the Congressional Oil Inquiry Committee, headed by Congressman William P. Cole, Jr., of Maryland, visited the Pan-handle of Texas to investigate the waste of natural gas in the Panhandle oil fields. Declaring Panhandle gas wastage is "staggering to the imagination," Secretary of Interior Harold Ickes told the A.P.I. convention in Dallas that this must stop. The two pipes in the picture above daily allow wastage of 200,000,000 cubic feet of natural gas, approximately twice the daily consumption of the entire State of Texas.
