





# A Nudist Pinched Blames Sick Minds For Speed Mania

LONDON, February 12.-The strange mental disorders which psychologists call obsessions were indicted as common causes of automobile accidents in a recent address at King's College Hospital. London, by Dr. Millair Culpin, distinguished mental specialist.

One truck driver admitted to Dr. Culpin that he often felt an intense and almost irresistible desire to drive straight at another vehicle approaching on the road and crash into it, a mental symptom like the impulses which some people feel to throw themselves out of windows or off high places and which undoubtedly are responsible for many instances of what is really involuntary suicide. Such compulsions are rooted in

the unconscious mind, not well controlled either by consciousness or by the will. Another of Dr. Culpin's driver patients admitted that it was virtually impossible for him to follow another car on the road. No matter what might be the circumstances or the dangers, he felt irresistibly compelled to turn out and try to pass the car ahead.

Still another patient who rode a bicycle described a senseless but irresistible impulse to pedal rapidly down hill until the bicycle got completely out of control and caused an accident. 




