

New Nerve Cell Theory Advanced By Physiologist

tionary theory of nerve or brain action, in which the nerve cells are thought of as like the transformers or condensers of a shortwave radio set, has been proposed by Prof. A. Leontovich, noted

physiologist. One difficulty of all present theories of how electric impulses pass along nerves is to explain how these impulses can jump from one nerve cell to another one. In radio sets impulses pass from one separate circuit to another through the transformers or con-

densers. Looking at animal nerve cells under the microscope, Professor Leontovich was struck by what seemed to be tiny coiled fibers or nerve wires, twisted together where nerve cells join each other like the interlocking coils of a radio transformer. He first measured these nerve coils and then calculated from radio formulas what kinds of current would pass most easily. These turn out to be currents corresponding to very short radio waves, only an inch or so in wave-length instead of the two or three yards for the shortest

Previous nerve experiments had uggested that precisely these very short wave lengths are the ones actually present. Professor Leontovich's theory also suggests an electric explanation of sense organs, the tuning of the condensers and transformers in the eye being altered by chemical effects of light, that of the units in touch nerves being aftered by pressure, and so on.

The sense messages sent to the brain then resemble the beatsignals of the most modern superheterodyne radio receivers.



In order to alleviate distress, the corporation proposes to resume operations on a reduced basis in plants not shut down as a result of these strikes.
