A card, to be returned as soon as the test is made, will show the germination and make necessary recommendations about changing seed. Those who intend to put seed on sale in stores should have their

Those who desire can test their seed at home, according to John A. Barton, county agent. Take a small box or pan, place apout two inches of sand in the bottom and cover this with a cloth. Place about 100 of any kind of seed on the cloth, place another cloth and about one inch of sand over the warm place where the temperature is about 70 to 80 degrees F After four or five days remove the top cloth and sand and count the







Texas harvested an average of 14.7 million acres of cotton each year during the years 1930-31-32, and in the years 1933-34-35, the harvested acreage was cut to an average of 10.6 million acres, a decrease in acreage of 28 per cent.
