

Rotarians Witness Program on Health In Public Schools

Health work in Runnels county was presented in a specially written playlet at the Ballinger Rotary Club meeting Tuesday noon, Mrs. Carl Black, committee chairman, and Miss Beulah White, county nurse, portraying the principal characters.

The setting was in any rural school of the county, the time any day about 9:30 a. m. Teacher and pupils were getting ready for a visit, the third of the year, from the county health nurse. The teacher had received a letter from the nurse asking that problem children be listed for discussion

on this visit. In the first lesson one little girl could not hear the teacher well and was moved to the front row. Boys Class A-Ballinger, a little boy could not see the blackboard or card work and was continually making errors, and another girl had been absen

During the recess period the nurse told the teacher she would visit the homes of the problem pupils, see what could be done to relieve the hearing of one and the vision of another, and that tubercular tests would be made of the sick mother.

Following presentation of playlet Miss White explained the home visitation work of the public health service and how results could be obtained in this manner. She said the skit represented just an average day's work in the life of any public health nurse.
