STEEL SHORTAGE FACES

NEW BRITISH LINER

LONDON, April 28 - Lack of steel may cause delay in launching No. 552, sister ship of the Queen Mary. It is under construction at John Brown's Shipyard at Clydebank, Scotland. No. 552 is scheduled for launching in the fall of 1938, but this may not be accomplished until the spring of

The launch can take place only when tides are high in spring or fall. The shortage of steel is expected to be intensified when work begins on the new \$35,000,-000 battleship which Brown's will built for the British admiralty. The order for the battleship has not been given officially, but steel has been ordered for it and some already has reached the Clydebank yards.
