

587.744 acres. The work went forward at a teady rate in 1937, the report reveals. During the past year 890,781 acres of crop land were terraced, 2,166,898 acres of erop and contoured but not terraced, and 232,632 acres of pasture land were terraced, contour listed, or

protected in a similar manner. Thus more than three million acres of crop land were added to the area previously terraced and contoured, while the 232,623 acres of pasture land protected against loss of soil and water compared very favorably with the 100,000

acres so treated in 1936. A major development during 1937 was the increased use of county road machinery in the construction of terraces, Bentley pointed out. Of the total acreage terraced in 1937, terraces were built on 373,009 acres by county machinery. The arrangement applied to 170 counties in 1936. while commissioners' courts in 189 counties made county equipment available for use in 1937.
