COLLEGE STATION, Dec. 7.—The feminine posture, popularized under the term "the debutante slouch," is a thing of the past, and has been replaced by an erect, graceful carriage that stresses health and self-confidence.

"You can't be smart and have a careless, haphazard posture," Mrs. Dora R. Barnes, clothing specialist of the Texas A & M College extension service, tells 4-H club girls and home demonstration club women.

The most expensive gowns are wasted when the posture is poor while a woman or girl blessed with erect carriage can lend grace to the simplest clothing, Mrs. Barnes points out.

The woman who slumps will never look well no matter how handsome she is groomed," she says. "Good figure and good posture are not questions of size, weight, or age, but of health and carriage."

"Round shoulders, hollow chests, protruding abdomen, and crooked feet furnish a poor foundation on which a woman must hang her clothes, so stand tall, walk tall,

think tall. We are most like the pictures we carry around in our minds."

Five or 10 minutes of daily exercise, Mrs. Barnes thinks, will do wonders to correct the posture caused by a neglected or misused spine. "Daily physical exercises designed to stretch and straighten the spine and the wearing of the correct kind of foundation garments and shoes will correct self-inflicted deformities and help in the regaining of a beautifully poised figure."

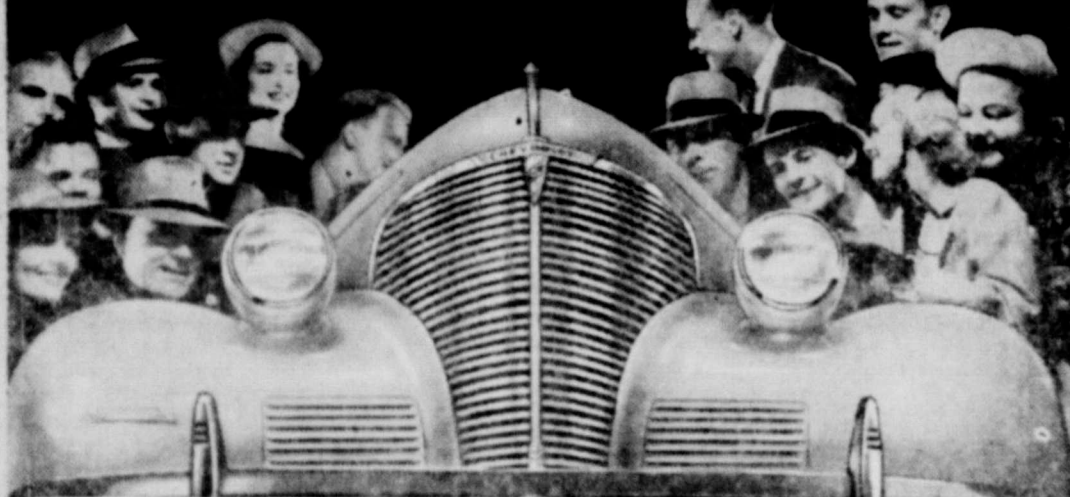

LOADS OF PORTERS IN TURKEY LIMITED

ISTANBUL, Dec. 7.—The new regulation that lays down that only luggage weighing less than 100 pounds is to be carried by porters is banishing from Istanbul street life the Turkish porter with impossible loads on his back.

The changes are causing much unemployment among the porters, who in former days formed powerful guilds that made them so indispensable. Nowadays, for example, it is forbidden to transport pianos and refrigerators otherwise than in carriages or trucks; the old method would have had them carried by two men.

The only exception in this connection is plate glass and window glass.

Eskimos Reduce Cost of Wooing

New Marriage Law Makes It Easier for Lads of St. Lawrence Isle.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—It wasn't the upkeep of a wife, but the initial cost that brought complaints from Eskimo youth on one of Uncle Sam's far-north island possessions. So St. Lawrence island, 100 miles off the Alaskan coast in the Bering sea, now has a new marriage law whereby suitors need work for prospective fathers-in-law only one year, instead of four, before claiming their brides.

Furthermore, selecting a mate is no longer to be a family affair, but one in which young people may make their own choice.

"Change comes slowly to the remote top shelf of American possessions," points out the National Geographic society. "Up near the Arctic sea, only 40 miles from the bleak shores of Eastern Siberia, St. Lawrence island is a spot of land seldom visited by residents of the outside world.

Uncle Sam Sends Teachers.

"As a government reservation, about 100 miles long and averaging 20 miles across, this island rates four school teachers and a nurse, provided by the U. S. bureau of Indian affairs in the interests of the A. B. C.'s of health and knowledge.

"Under a simple form of local rule, supervised by the U. S. coast guard and based on the primitive economy of the territory, native boards are elected in the main villages to run co-operative stores, set prices, give credit in bad times, and to arrange for the sale of local products.

"To the four or five hundred inhabitants of St. Lawrence, however, even such elementary community interests are considerably less vital than the individual problems of making a living—hunting, fishing, and trapping—under the harsh rules of the far north.

"Summer gales, plus fog and rain, turn the Eskimo equivalent of 'The Good Old Summer Time' into a melody for wind instruments, while winter weather is merely worse, with wilder storms and an Arctic ice pack that hems in the island for eight months of the year.

"During the long winter months, no ships visit the island. Even the warm season finds only half a dozen arriving, including coast guard and Indian bureau vessels, and perhaps one or two free-lance trading schooners with supplies for the co-operative stores.

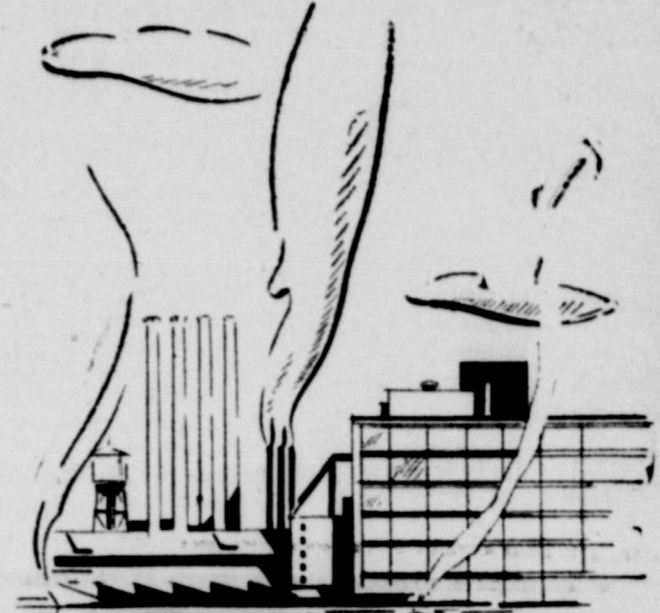
FREE DOCTORS URGED IN SOUTH AFRICA

CAPE TOWN, South Africa, Dec. 7.—South Africa will spend \$2,655,000 a year in providing medical and other similar benefits for its people if the plan of the department of public health is adopted.

In its report submitted to the department recommended a general medical practitioner service, including free drugs, medicines and curative appliances. Free specialists' service is also favored. The government would stand at least part of the cost of hospital treatment for employed persons and their dependents, who now would have to pay such costs to provincial hospitals.

The report also urges the government to pay a lump sum on confinement of an employed woman or the wife of an employed man. Government payment for burials and cash payments in times of sickness are also favored.

MIRROR FOR McDONALD OBSERVATORY FINISHED

AUSTIN, Dec. 7.—The polishing of the 82-inch mirror for the McDonald Observatory of the University of Texas has been completed and it "can be safely accepted," according to information received by President J. W. Calhoun from Dr. Otto Struve. Dr. Struve is joint director of the McDonald Observatory, situated on Mount Locke, in the Davis Mountains and the Yerkes Observatory of the University of Chicago.

Tests made on October 15 indicate that the great 82-inch mirror is finished. Dr. Struve wrote university officials. "The surface is a paraboloid of 319.66 inches focal length and the actual figure of the glass does not depart from the mathematical shape by more than about one-millionth of an inch. This extraordinary degree of perfection is the outcome of exactly four years of gruelling work of grinding and polishing on the part of C. R. Ludin, optician for the Warner & Swasey Company, of Cleveland, Ohio. During the past four years astronomers of the University of Chicago's Yerkes Observatory have made many accurate tests on the mirror. But only now are they fully satisfied that the new mirror will be as perfect as their investigations require.

The 82-inch mirror is at the present time the second largest finished astronomical mirror in the world. It is surpassed only by the 100-inch mirror at the Mount Wilson Observatory, Pasadena, California. After the completion of the 200-inch mirror of the California Institute of Technology, the Texas mirror will rank third in the entire world."

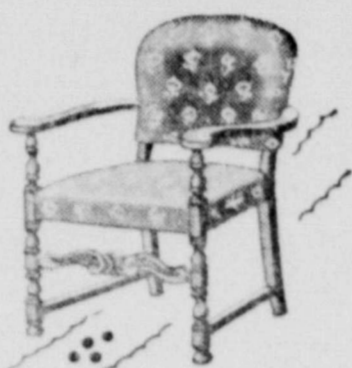

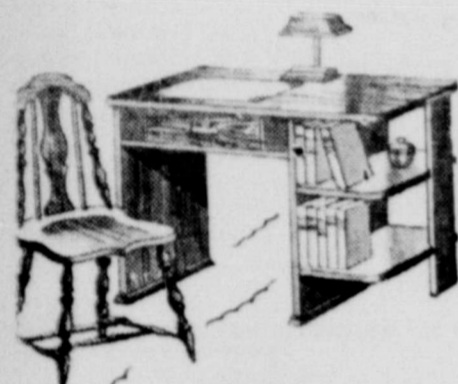

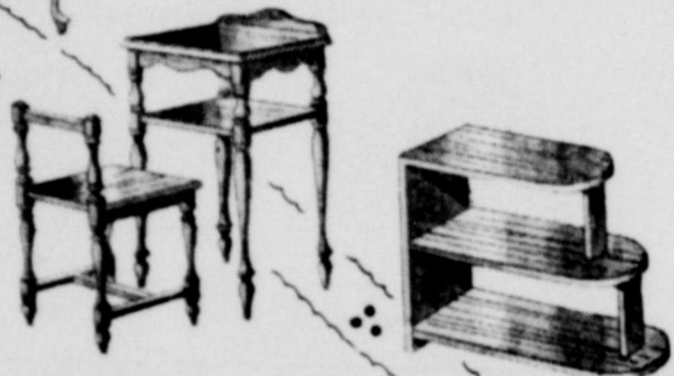
