

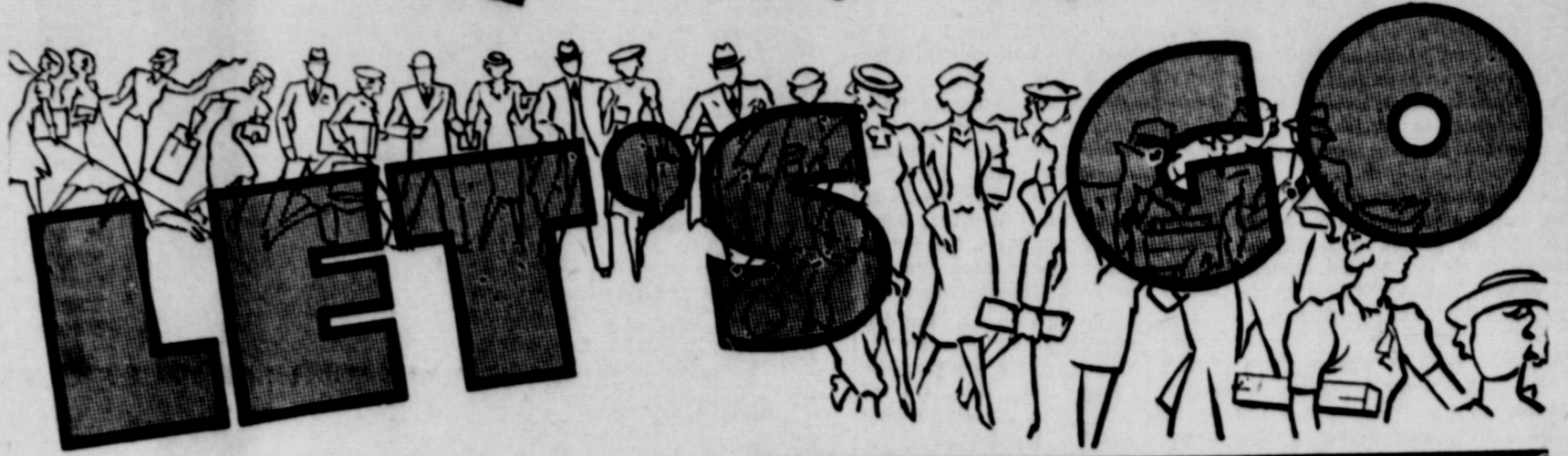

NEW PLASTIC MADE FROM COTTON BURRS

LUBBOCK, May 24.—A composition plastic, new by-product of cotton, has been developed at Texas Technological College by Dr. R. C. Goodwin, head professor of chemistry and chemical engineering.

Made from the burr from which the staple has been removed, a part of the cotton plant hitherto considered practically worthless, the composition appears suitable for wall boards, cafe counters, soda fountain tops and bridge table tops. Being fireproof, waterproof and a low conductor of heat, it may also be used for insulation.

National Cotton Week

National Cotton Week has been set aside for the stimulation of a wider and greater consumption of cotton, the one great crop of the entire South. It is well that the uses of cotton be considered when the nation has at this time the greatest surplus in its history. Runnels county people are especially interested in the problems of cotton as from 65 to 70 per cent of their income is derived from the sale of cotton and seed.

Texas at one time stood about the top in growing the kind of cotton the spinners of the world wanted. Cotton that came from Texas was A No. 1. This record has sadly declined and now two bales out of every three grown in the state are not satisfactory to the needs and requirements of the spinners, and as a result the farmers are selling less and less every year.

All classes of people in Runnels county are interested in this cotton problem. Probably the ones most concerned are the cotton farmer, the ginner, cotton handlers, compresses, oil mills and those whose living depends upon cotton production.

At the present rate the trend of less cotton each year will mean only about 8,000,000 bales in 1947 which will mean a still greater reduction of cotton acreage in this county.

The location of Texas and the high cost of transportation means that around 90 per cent of her cotton must be exported and this means 100 per cent for Runnels county. In the five-year period from 1928 to 1932, Texas on the average exported 5,400,000 bales. Since that date, beginning in 1933, exports of the state have declined to an average of 3,400,000 bales. Even this year the figures will show a big decrease over the last marketing year.

Twenty-five years ago Texas

and the United States had almost a monopoly on the world's cotton trade, but not so now. Foreign competition is strong at this time and is getting stronger every year. Texas and Runnels county farmers must "streamline" their plans of cotton production and merchandise on a more efficient system.

Our most expert authorities have given much study to cotton problems and tell us we have lost our foreign trade through a number of causes such as short, inferior staple, mixed, irregular, weak and wasty lint, poorly ginned, poorly wrapped and in some instances "plated" bales.

They also tell us that we must correct these faults if we are to make a start in regaining our lost foreign trade. This means a job for all concerned in cotton production. The farmer must find out through his own experience and that of the experiment stations the kind of cotton that will grow and produce the type wanted by the spinners of the world. The ginner must work out a plan of ginning and properly wrapping and the buyer must work out a system to not cut bales all to pieces to get an idea of the grade and staple.

National Cotton Week is a good time to start talking ways and means of cotton improvement in Runnels county. Everybody interested in handling cotton must cooperate in the movement and bring back the demand for Texas grown cotton.

NEGRO SCHOOL GRADUATION EXERCISES HELD MONDAY; HIGH GRADES ANNOUNCED

The graduation exercises of the Ballinger negro school were held Monday evening at the A. M. E. Church, a large number of people attending. A special section for white friends was well filled and the entire church was beautifully decorated.

Nathaniel Fisher was the honor graduate with an average grade of 92.5 for the year. The other graduates were Mabel Elizabeth Jackson and Lillie Mae Washington, each of whom had a grade of above 90.

Each graduate appeared on the program in declamation and song and each presented new thoughts in a very impressive manner. Their singing as a trio and with other schoolmates as a choral club were outstanding numbers.

Principal O. L. Price, of the Taylor colored school, delivered the class address, interspersing modern educational logic with humor. He named the place of service for the negro and urged white people to see that negro schools were equipped to permit teaching the things negro boys and girls needed to fill their places in the community.

George Stowe, acting superintendent of the Ballinger schools, presented the diplomas to the graduates and honor certificates to a number of other pupils.

Cottonseed Oil Products Theme Of Talk for Club

In a vocational talk at a meeting of the Ballinger Rotary Club Tuesday H. W. Lynn told the inside workings of the cottonseed crushing business. The speaker said cotton was first known in 1500 A. D. and previously was grown by the Chinese.

In 1790 cotton exports from the United States totalled 250 bales, and after the invention of the cotton gin in 1793 the industry began a speedy development. In 1930 this nation's production was almost 19,000,000 bales and after that reduction programs were initiated which have greatly curtailed production.

Today cottonseed ranks as the fourth cash crop in the United States. It was in 1901 that the first cottonseed oil mill was built in this country and the peak was reached in 1925 when there were approximately 600 mills in operation. About 100 of these have been closed, leaving about 500.

The Ballinger mill was built in 1903 and Mr. Lynn became connected with it in 1905 and has served continuously for 34 years.

The speaker took the Rotarians on a tour through the mill in his talk, explaining every movement from the time seed are placed in the seed house until the products are sold. The cleaning of seed in shakers, the work of two sets of linkers, the hollers, meats to rollers into forms, and finally into the presses. The Ballinger manager stated that he had seen cottonseed oil sell for from \$1,250 per carload to as high as \$10,500 per car.

The food value of these products for livestock was explained and it was estimated that ranchmen in the West Texas region from Abilene to El Paso, down the Rio Grande, back by Menard to Abi-

lene, used annually \$1,500,000 worth of cottonseed products.

THREE METEOR SECTIONS PLACED IN TECH MUSEUM

LUBBOCK, May 24.—Three polished sections of meteors have been added to the collection of the West Texas Museum, located on Texas Tech campus.

Two stony type fragments, one found near Hale Center and another at Roy, New Mexico, were presented by Floyd Seaman, of Plainview, who has loaned between 15 and 20 pieces of meteors to the museum. The third, an iron

segment, was obtained from the American Meteorite Laboratory, and is from the famous Diablo Canyon, Arizona, meteor, found in 1891.

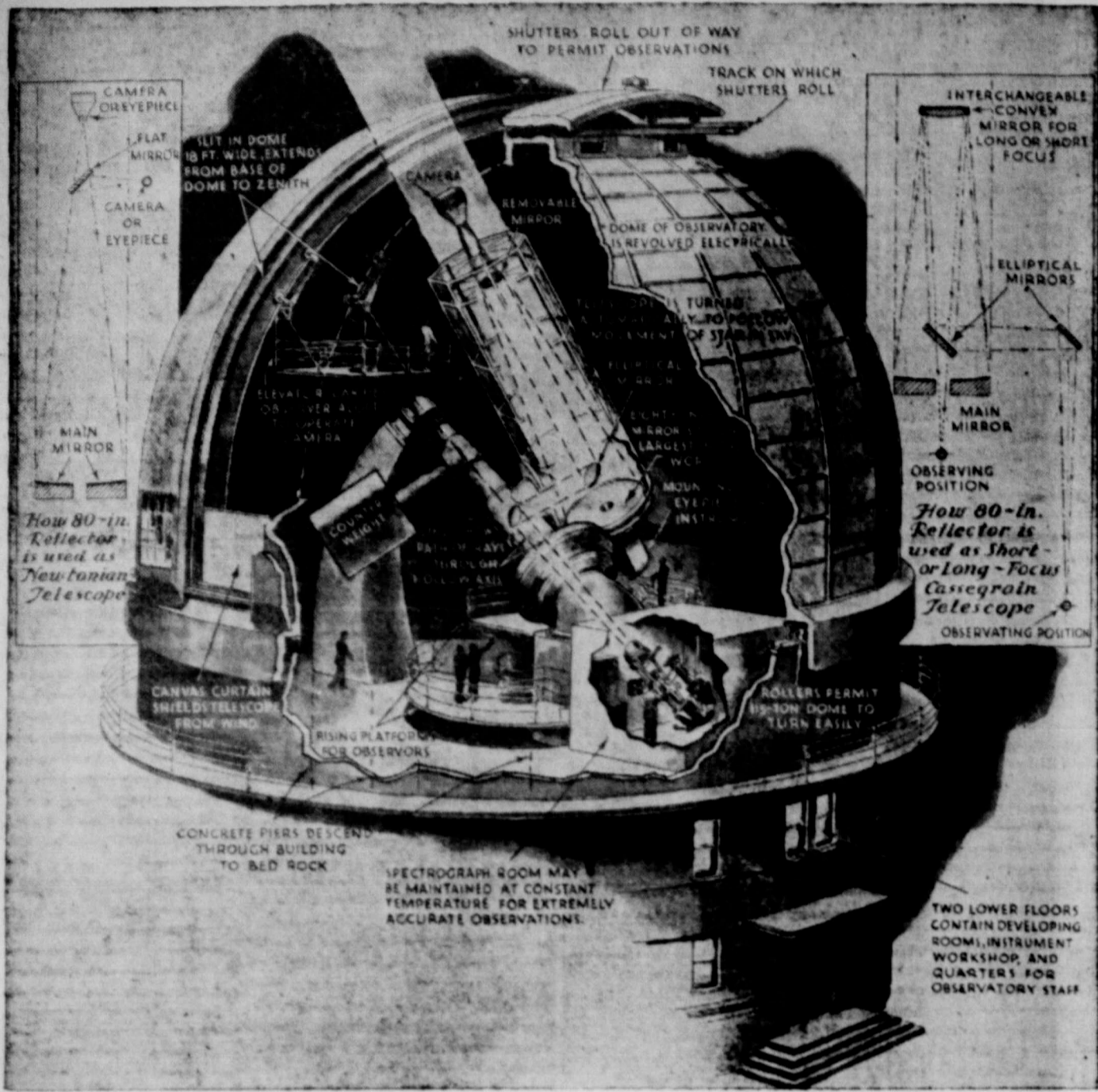

Here's an X-ray view of the world's second largest telescope in action at McDonald Observatory. As shown in the sketch, the observer may choose one of three vantage points under the great revolving dome. One (prime focus) is directly under the telescope; a second (cassegrain focus) on the bridge or elevator near the top of the dome. The third (conduit focus) is inside the constant temperature booth. Light from the star under observation enters the aperture in

the revolving dome and goes down the throat of the 26-foot telescope. At the base it is "funneled in" by the great 82-inch mirror and shunted back up the barrel of the instrument to a second mirror. From there, auxiliary mirrors carry the light to the desired observing position as shown in the sketch.

'Freezes' Gasoline as Preventive Against Fire

NEW YORK.—Assen Jordanoff, transport flier and engineer, announced a new and sensational method of reducing the fire hazard of aviation. Jordanoff "freezes" aviation gasoline at a temperature of 100 degrees below zero centigrade in a dry ice and alcohol cooling mechanism built around a plane's gasoline tanks. As it passes into the motor it is heated to normal temperature by another special mechanism.

Jordanoff said the "frozen gasoline," which remains liquid, loses its "flash" because of low temperature. He aimed a flaming blow torch into a pail of it and it merely extinguished the fire. Holding the flame above the gasoline it required 15 seconds before the gas caught on fire.

"Frozen gasoline," he said, would eliminate explosions in the crash of planes or the ignition of fuel tanks by incendiary bullets in military aircraft. He said it would be an advantage in airplanes flying through electrical storms or in cases where it became necessary to dump gasoline.

Jordanoff conducted his tests in a fledgling biplane with a special license from the Civil Aeronautics authority. The added mechanical equipment weighs about 100 pounds and could be installed easily in any plane, he said.

Clover Seed From Italy Swells Dairy Profits

AMHERST, MASS.—Ladino clover, imported from Italy, is increasing profits of Massachusetts dairymen, according to Ralph W. Donaldson, Massachusetts State college soils specialist.

This succulent crop grows so thick and fast, he says, that "12 cows get abundant feed where one cow starved before."

Ladino seeds first were brought into Massachusetts in 1923 by John Ellis. His first crop was so successful that neighboring dairymen experimented. Since then plantings have increased each season, and last year 1,200 acres were devoted to this crop cultivation.

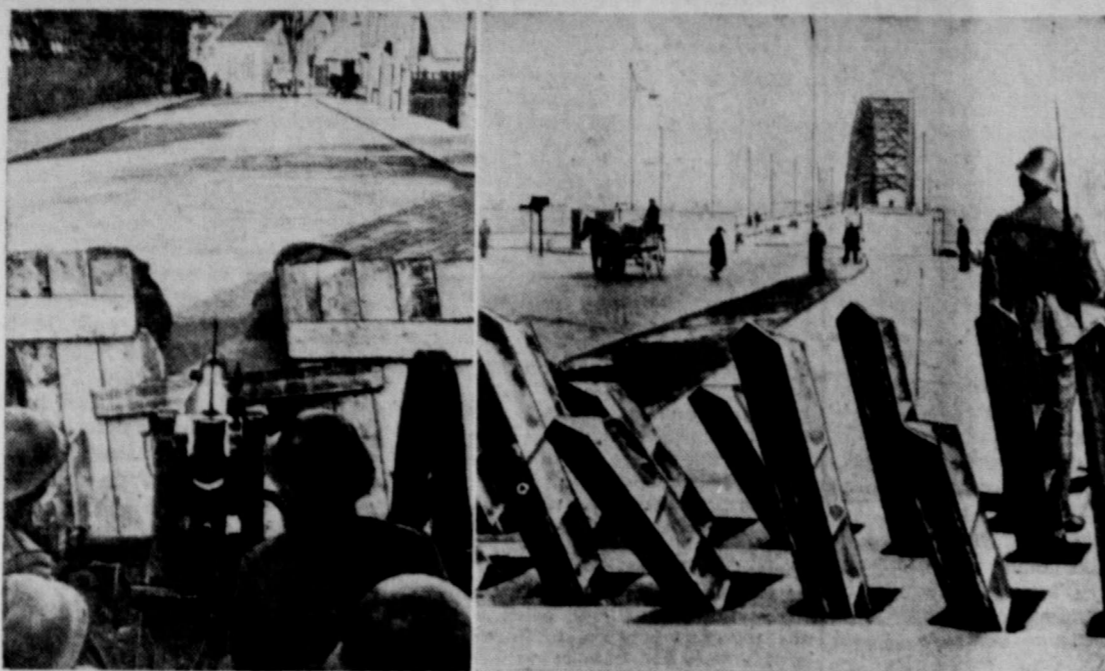

ROBERT LEE YOUTH SHEARS TECH SHEEP

LUBBOCK, May 24.—The entire flock of 112 sheep on the Texas Technological College farm were sheared this year by Tom Peays, junior agricultural student from Robert Lee, using a one-man power machine. Mexican shearers have been employed for this work heretofore.

For the eighth consecutive year, two-year-old ewes were selected from each group with a view to attaining data on shrinkage of fleeces. Each fleece is graded for class and grade of wool, and photographs of the ewe are taken before and after shearing. By this study, continued improvement of the college flock is possible, said W. L. Stangel, head professor of animal husbandry.

Local Postoffice Is Ranked High In Sale of Bonds

The Ballinger postoffice made a remarkable record in the sale of United States savings bonds to March 31, 1939. The grand total for the Ballinger office was \$48,243.75, \$45,993.75 being sold at the window and \$2,250 coming in by mail.

The local office ranked No. 50 in second class postoffices in Texas in the sale of these bonds.

Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau announced today that the total sales of savings bonds through March 31, 1939, aggregated in maturity value, more than \$2,437,108,850, and that purchases have been made by approximately 1,564,608 investors. The total represents average purchases of \$1,957,525 for each business day since March 1, 1935, when these bonds were first placed on sale.

The total maturity value of purchases for the calendar year 1938 was \$707,291,650, an average purchase for each business day of last year of \$2,334,300.

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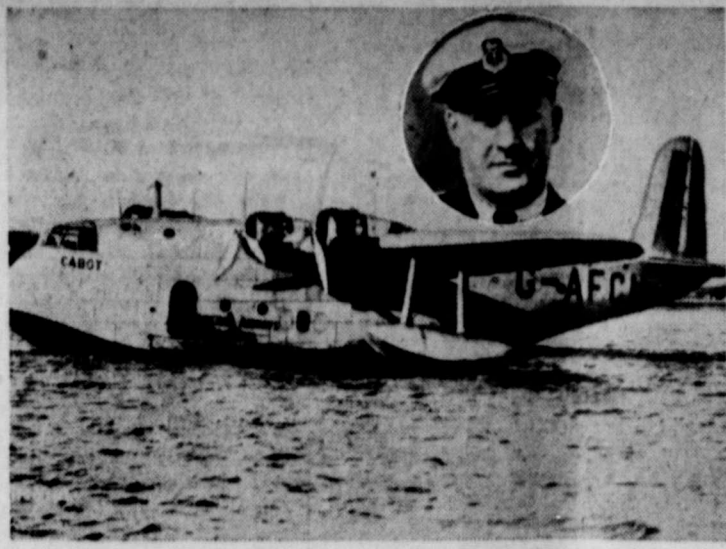
LOCAL FISHING PARTY HAS EXTRA GOOD LUCK
