Cotton ginned in Runnels county to December 1 totalled more than 16,500 bales and forecasts are that another 1,000 will be ginned before the end of the season, making approximately 18,000 bales for the 1939 production.

While ginning has been slow for several weeks, the amount of cotton still being handled is running the figure higher than anticipated two months ago. Most local cotton men estimated then that the county's crop would only slightly exceed 15,000 bales.

Farmers in this county will vote December 9 on whether marketing quotes are to be made effective for the 1940 cotton crop. Sample ballot to be used is shown above. American farmers have a market for around 12 million bales of cotton per year. Production during the last 3 years is shown in the chart: In 1937, without any marketing control measures available, producers planted a large acreage which, with high yields, resulted in a record crop of nearly 19 million bales. Cotton growers approved marketing quotas for handling their 1938 and 1939 crops, and production in each of these years was approximately 11,900,000 bales, yet the surplus produced in 1937 is still hanging over the market. Marketing quotas are provided in the farm program to forestall


