They are asked not to use cars any more than is necessary, to stay off highways and save rubber and gasoline. Another warning is that powder is too badly needed to fight the Axis to be burned up in fireworks that only make a noise. Those engaged in any type of wartime production are urged not to take the day but to remain on their jobs. In all, leaders of the nation believe it is no time to take the usual holiday trips and celebrations. All these cost money and the biggest sale of bonds and stamps undertaken so far in the war offers a fine outlet for any surplus cash a person may have at this time, and there could be no better way to celebrate the independence of this nation than to invest money in it and thereby help to carry on the war.

Runnels county crops are in fine condition but the last week of hot weather began hurting some feed, causing it to wilt in the afternoons. Most farmers say cotton is doing all right to date but a good rain would be beneficial to feed and pastures. Insects have bothered in only a few places and poisoning was done.

It will soon be one year since ground was broken to start construction at Bruce Field and bring to Ballinger cadets to receive aviation training. Plans are being made now for official dedication of the field on the first anniversary of the ground breaking, July 26. Before the end of the week these plans will be perfected and a program arranged for that Sunday afternoon when people of this section will be invited to attend

and see the accomplishments of one year. Part of these achievements will be visible in buildings, runways and planes, but the most important is in the cadets themselves, some now officers in every section of the country on active duty and others probably in foreign lands by now. At the lake the committee has improved the swimming section, placing many floats in the lake and one large raft. This will be a popular place Saturday as the members, and especially the children, enjoy the cool water. It will also be cadet day for swimming and many soldiers from Bruce Field are expected in the afternoon to swim and dive.

The golf tournament will start at seven o'clock Saturday morning with the eight men in the championship flight teeing off first. The bridge tournament will start in the morning and will be concluded after noon. There will also be 42 for those who wish to play.

Golf favorites this year are H. G. Agnew and Alden Thorp. Club champion Chas. Thorp is now with the field artillery in Alabama and will not be here to defend his crown. WEST TEXAS NOTES

Rowena filling stations reported the past week-end that approximately 18,000 pounds had been collected and many had still not made deliveries of rubber collected for the government. Station operators also reported that a number were not accepting cash for their rubber but were asking that the money go to some war agency. Efforts were underway for a general last minute drive to go in all the small pieces before the end of the campaign.

Three men and two women entered a filling station at Coleman last week and hi-jacked the operator of \$475 in cash and made their get-away. Officers in a number of West Texas towns have been asked to assist in finding and arrested the quintet. They were unmasked and a good description was given of all five by the station operator. As he made change following purchase of drinks and gas, a gun was used to relieve him of cash in the register.

Many people will visit Brownwood July 4 to see units of the 31st (Dixie) division parade in one of the biggest military programs scheduled in West Texas. The parade will include infantry units, tank units, artillery units with small and large guns, numerous bands, cavalry and other units, thousands of soldiers taking part. Several units will travel from Camp Bowie to other towns to assist in Independence Day celebrations.

The North Llano River near Junction is being seeded by game wardens and crews from the fish hatchery at Mountain Home to save fish caught in shallow holes. The dry weather has caused the stream to begin drying up and many fish are trapped and will soon die unless transferred to other water. Most of the fish taken by the crews are being placed in the South Llano.

Those in charge of the rubber collecting at Rising Star shipped their first car last week. The shipment amounted to about 20 tons and was received from filling stations there that bought the scrap. Practically all the shipment was tires and tubes with a fair amount of oil well supplies being listed in the collection.

Mr. and Mrs. M. E. Harrell, pioneers of the Winters community, have given practically their entire family to the armed services of the nation. In the first World War, a son served overseas. One son has been reported missing in fighting in the Manila Bay area; another son is somewhere in the Pacific with the marines and a daughter, is a graduate nurse and awaiting her

call in the naval reserve nurses' corps. They have a grandson who is with the U. S. coast guard.

A group of Coke county 4-H club boys were heavy winners in the fifth annual 4-H club wool show at Sonora last week. The boys were from Bronte and Robert Lee and took seven places in the competition. LeDrew Arrott was at the show for the fourth time and was the big winner from Coke county.

Fort Stockton welcomed the first unit of aviation cadets last week when a special training brought them to that city for forming the first training unit at Miller Field. The class was quartered in the recreation hall at Rooney Park and meals will be served at a hotel dining room until buildings are completed at the field.

Concho county reached their quota in the sale of war bonds and stamps last week with a number of days to spare. The tabulations were made at Eden on June 20 showing the quota reached and that the full \$14,600 asked of the citizens of that county had been purchased. J. M. Patton, of Paint Rock, is chairman of the war board in that county.

Mr. and Mrs. L. A. Applewhite, of Paint Rock, received a letter from their son, Corporal Granvel Applewhite last week written from Ireland. It was the first message from him since he left the United States and he gave interesting information of his trip across and his impressions of Ireland.

D. B. Collingsworth, vocational teacher at Miles, has returned from New Braunfels, where he attended the state F. F. A. convention. While there he served on a committee which worked out a program for the conservation of human and natural resources. He was present when several Runnels county boys received wards for outstanding project work of the past year.

County Agent R. B. Tate, of Nolan county, has received reports from many farmers of serious grasshopper damage in that section. Last week he made inspections of fields where hoppers had damaged as far as 300 yards from the fences leading from pastures. Poison mixtures were announced for farmers to use in destroying the hoppers when they were discovered in numbers to do damage.
