Xmas Parcel Mailing For Soldiers Abroad **Begins September 15**

Mailing instructions have been issued by the war, navy and post office departments and the time is drawing near the thirty-day period for sending Christmas boxes to men overseas. Packages, without requests, may be sent to men in either the army, navy or marine corps from September 15 to October 15.

Packages must not exceed five pounds in weight and not be larger than 15 inches in length or 36 inches in length and girth combined. They must be wrapped securely with heavy paper and reinforced with twine. The box should be heavy corrugated cardboard or solid fiber board or similar strong material in order for it to undergo extensive and necessarily rough handling on

Postal authorities request that the complete name and address be typed or printed very plainly and the return address should be on the package, and both addresses should also be placed inside the

package. In writing addresses give the full name and no initials, nicknames or abbreviations. Each package must be marked "Christmas parcel" and perishable articles should not be included in the box. Only one parcel per week may be sent from the same person to any man in foreign service.

Tom Caudle, local postmaster, stated that every effort would be made here to handle the packages with care and speed. He asks the cooperation of the public in the preparation and addressing of the parcels and pointed out that the right kind of boxes should be saved for this purpose. It is very important to write the full address on the package and to write it so that postal clerks can read it with ease. The address of the service man and the sender inside the package is important when the parcel becomes damaged so it cannot be read.
