COLLEGE STATION, June 12.-There is a big surplus of protein Texas this spring in spite of he shortage of protein concenrates on the market, according o E. A. Miller, agronomist, Texas A. & M. College extension service

A recent USDA Bureau of Agricultural Economics study on the sources and uses of protein, he says, show that 60 per cent of all protein used by livestock in the United States comes from pasture hay and silage. Grain supplies only 25 per cent of the total protein livestock eat. Commercial, concentrates such

as cottonseed meal and soybean meal account for less than 8 per cent of the nation's protein. Skim milk, buttermilk, fish meal, brewed's meal and legume seeds in cluding peanuts, cowpeas and velvet beans are some of the many
