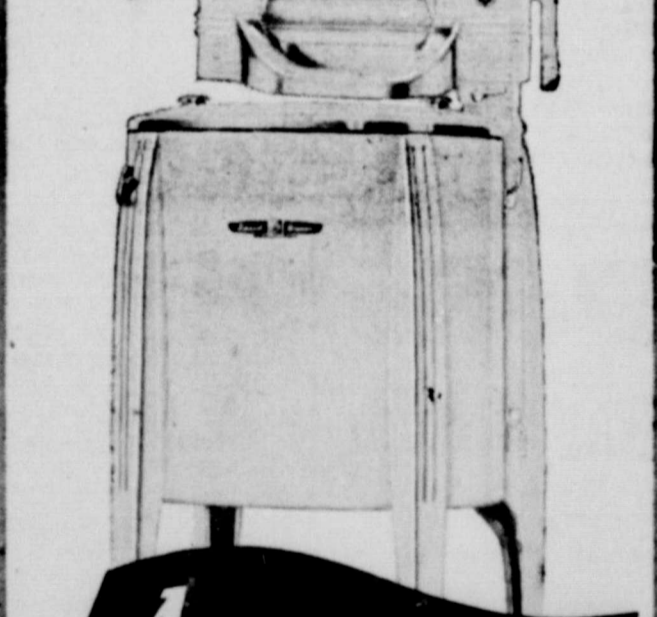
TOMORROW LAST DAY TO REGISTER DOGS

Miss Lange Wins Scholarship

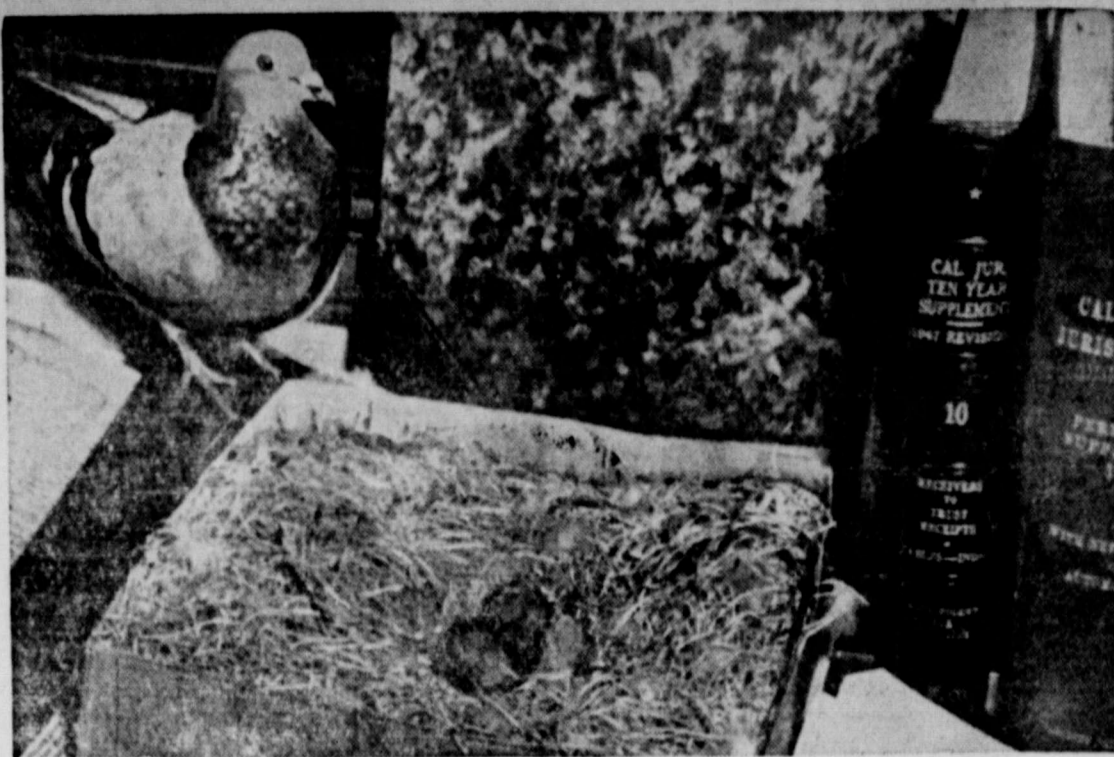

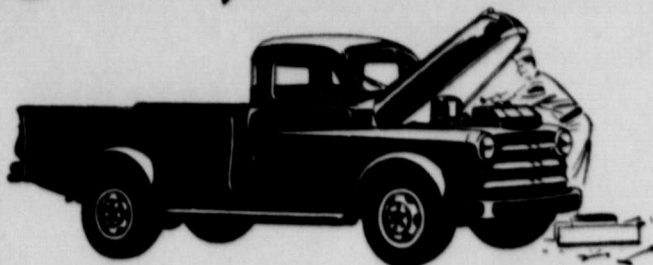

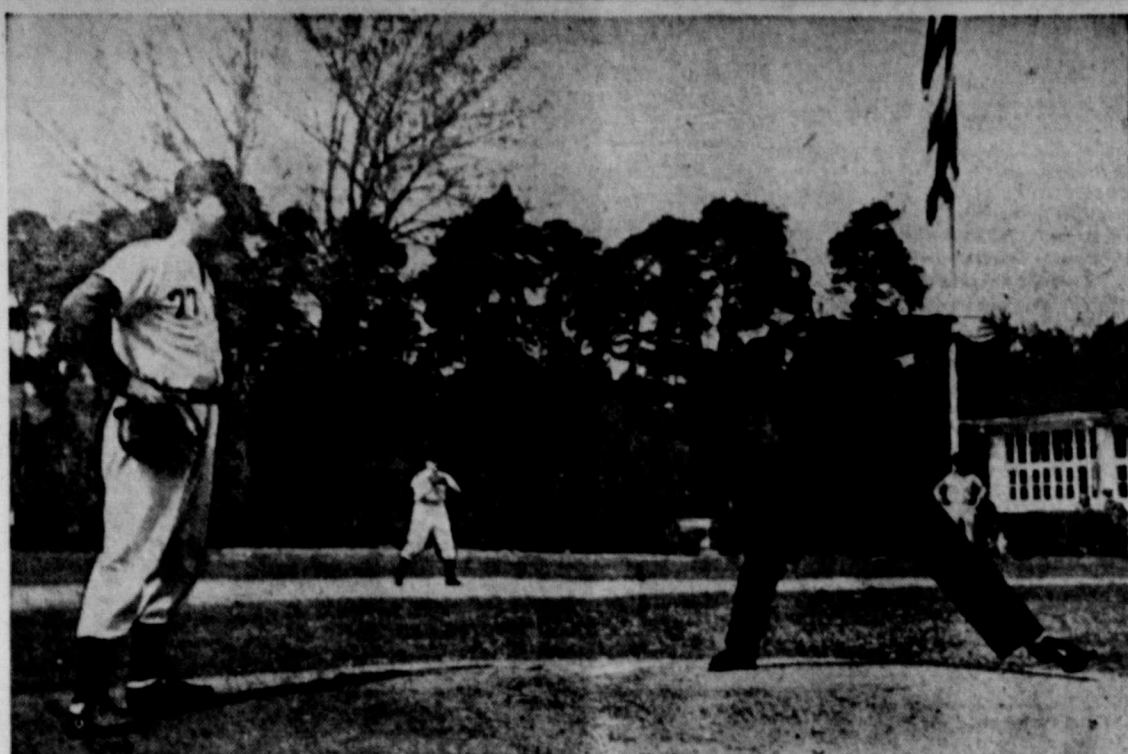

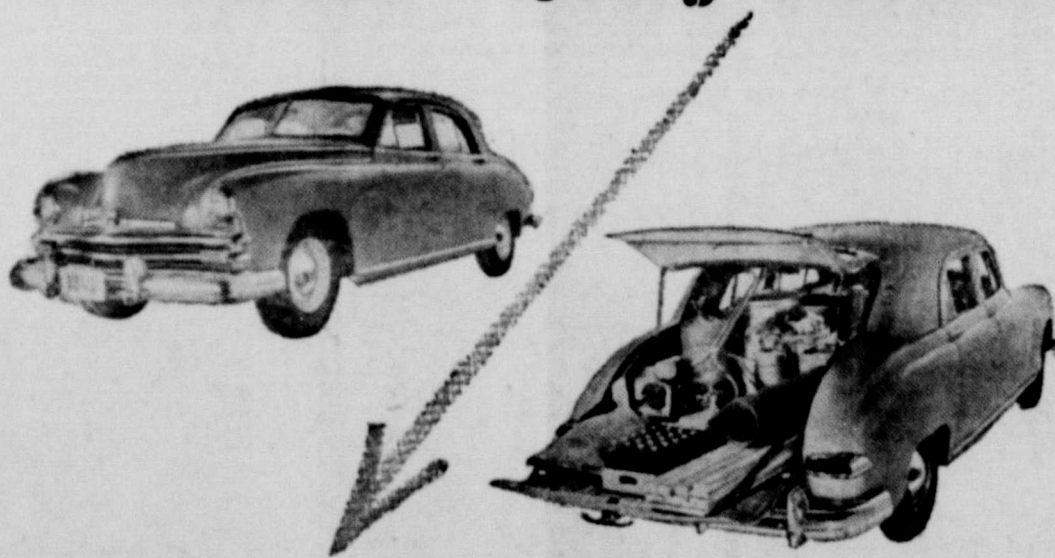

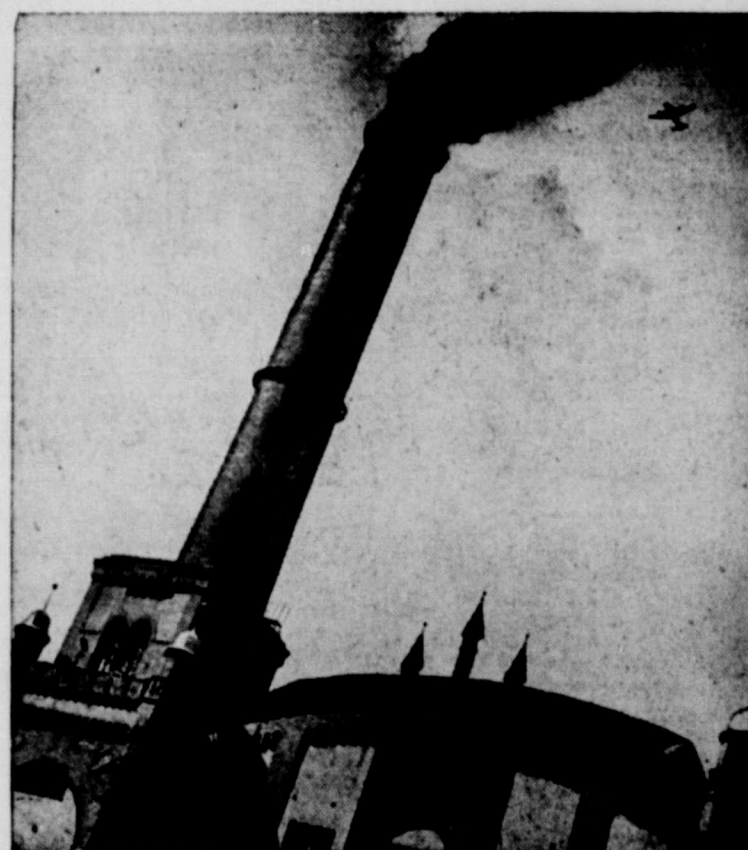

AN EMERGENCY CLEAN-UP

With infantile paralysis striking in all parts of Texas, members of the health committee of the Ballinger Chamber of Commerce, the Ballinger fire department, civic clubs and many mothers have become alarmed about conditions here and are urging an immediate clean-up which would include the eradication of rank weeds in most sections of Ballinger.

Efforts are underway for facilities to spray the entire city in an effort to eliminate health hazards. Plans were discussed at the Ballinger Lions Club meeting Friday and every member was asked to help in an immediate campaign.

Drs. Sam Hall and O. H. Chandler both made statements in which they endorsed spraying but added that they hoped citizens would not feel a false sense of security that spraying alone would prevent the spread of polio.

Dr. Chandler, city health officer, spoke frankly in outlining health needs in Ballinger. He said this could not be a clean town until public opinion favored making sewerage available and compulsory all over the city. He pointed to the large number of pit toilets and cess pools, inadequate facilities at slaughter houses, the faulty way of handling garbage and trash which provide breeding places for flies.

He said the city had a sewage disposal plant which would take care of 25,000 inhabitants but had so few connections that it would not operate properly. He said: "If you live on 'Knob Hill' with all modern sanitary facilities you are no safer than the people living 'across the tracks' where pit toilets and uncovered garbage cans are breeding flies and germs."

In a meeting with health committees of various groups Friday afternoon, the health officer declared he favored any immediate work that could be done but reminded that the community would remain filthy until a long-range program was put over that would provide sewerage for every dwelling in the corporate limits, downtown removal of garbage from covered containers twice a day and hauling of trash and garbage from the remainder of the city at least twice weekly, and the proper disposal of garbage.

Many became alarmed when it was disclosed that 42 polio-stricken victims were receiving treatment at San Angelo and theatres, churches, schools and other indoor public meeting places were closed for a week.

This campaign is declared an emergency and those who own property will be asked by neighbors and friends to clean up at once.

WEST TEXAS NOTES

Practically every town in West Texas started war against polio last week. Most places had one or more cases and city governments ordered clean-up campaigns, DDT spraying and other measures recommended by health authorities to prevent spread of the disease. In several towns summer schools were called for the entire vacation period and other public indoor meetings were cancelled.

An oil rig for the first test in the corporate limits of Bronte was erected last week and regular tours were to be started at once. The location is in block 42 on property owned by L. T. Youngblood and the well may be drilled more than 5,000 feet deep. Five other wells were being drilled in the Bronte field last week, two below the 6,000-foot level.

Winters Jaycees, city councilmen and Charlie Syster, engineer for the Lone Star Gas Co., met last week to make an inspection tour of the site for the municipal park and swimming pool. Plans were made for water line extensions, electric lights and numerous other improvements. There are two reservoirs at the old lake site which can be converted into swimming pools. One would be used as a shallow pool for children and the other for adult swimming and diving at several depths. Playground equipment and other park features will be added.

Comanche school trustees have reelected the entire faculty for another year, but one resignation has been received. The school has just closed a very successful year, a large class graduating. During the term just closed the teaching force was complete in all departments. Pop Peters, assistant athletic coach, has resigned to accept another position.

A lighted athletic field is being installed in Williams Memorial Park at Rising Star. Last week

poles were set and part of the lights installed, but postponement of use of the field is necessary until additional reflectors are received. A formal opening has been planned as soon as the work is completed and the night softball season will begin then.

The first small grain of the 1949 season was marketed at Coleman last week, wheat bringing \$1.67, oats 50 cents and barley \$1. Production probably will be above normal for the county but the yield will be smaller than first anticipated. Practically all grain had some leaf rust and recent rains and winds left damage which reduced the yield, especially in oats.

An election has been called in Erath county at which voters will be asked to give the county commissioners the right to redistribute funds from various accounts to do emergency repair on bridges damaged by floods. The commissioners turned down a proposal for a straight bond issue which carried a tax raise of 15 cents on the \$100 and asked for the redistribution authority. It was estimated that \$5,000 is required to take care of work needed at once. More than 70 bridges were damaged in recent floods.

A drastic clean-up campaign was started at Menard last week at the suggestion of the health officer. The city sprayed with DDT all alleys, garbage containers, the disposal plant, the irrigation ditch, creeks and the river. All property owners received a request from the city government to cooperate in the clean-up and civic groups were calling on each home owner, asking that arrangements be made for spraying property to eliminate flies and other insects.

The Melvin Parent-Teacher Association and Lions Club are

jointly sponsoring a summer recreation program for youths of the community. The P-T-A. will provide electric lights for the softball field and for tennis courts and the Lions will provide the softball equipment. A number of teams have been organized for the summer schedule. Grady White is general chairman of the program which calls for a number of special events for the boys and girls as well as entertainment of the public.

Ranch Day will be held at the Sonora experiment station on June 11. It has been announced that the morning program will cover range management and a talk will be given by Vernon A. Young, A. & M. College specialist. In the afternoon an over-all picture will be presented of the range management study. Livestock men from a number of West Texas counties are expected to attend.

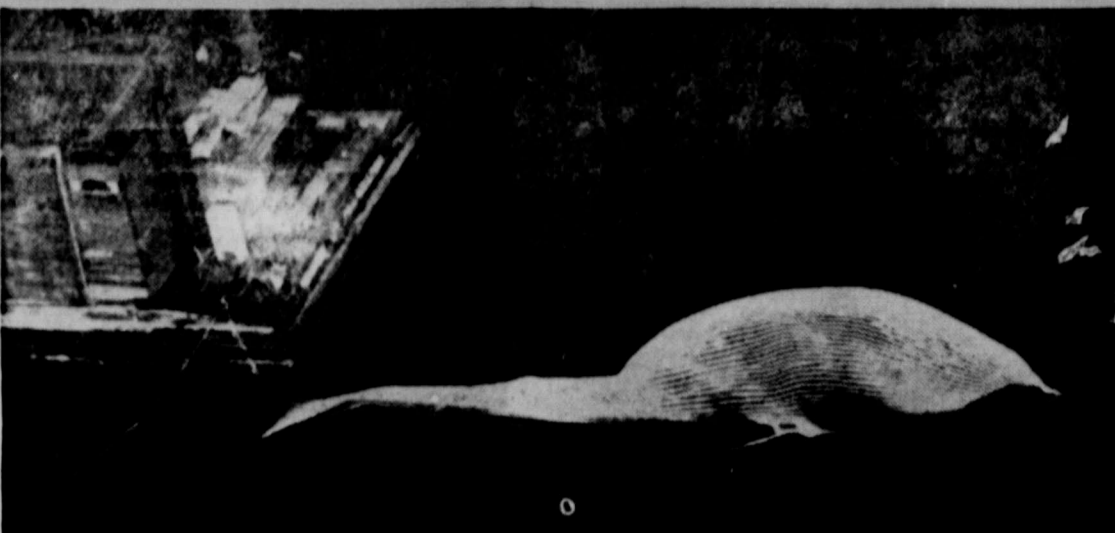

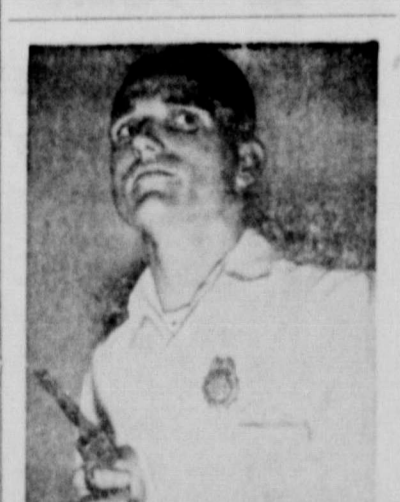

Rotary Hoe Does Cotton Chopping In Speedy Manner

COLLEGE STATION, June 8.—The rotary hoe is doing a speed-up job of cotton cultivation, especially in West Texas and the Plains region.

Fred C. Elliott, extension cotton work specialist of Texas A. & M. College, says it works best on the young cotton seedlings in

getting rid of the grass and weeds early, the cheapest time to do it.

The main advantage to the rotary hoe is that it speeds up cultivation of early growing cotton. Later on, as the cotton gets taller, this weeding machine does not work so well because the plants outgrow it. So the cotton farmer turns to other methods of hoeing.

With all the spring rains farmers got the past months, they're growing a pretty good crop of weeds right along with their cotton. Hand hoeing costs quite a bit, but the rotary hoe cuts hoeing costs down, Elliott says. A common mistake with rotary hoe owners is not operating fast enough. Most of the time a farmer figures he's tearing the seedlings up if he goes too fast. Not so with the rotary hoe.

There are a couple of things to remember when using this machine, Elliott reminds. First, don't set it any deeper than enough to break the crust of the soil. The shallow picking action of the picks pulls up the tender weeds and grass, leaving them to dry out in the wind and sun. The best time to do the job is about a week after a rain.

And second, the best operating speed for the rotary hoe is between six and eight miles an hour—at least four and a half mph, running in third gear.

By keeping the bed flat, you'll avoid throwing seed and grass around the cotton seedlings. It's a good idea to delay "dirting" the cotton until it gets a good start, Elliott concludes.

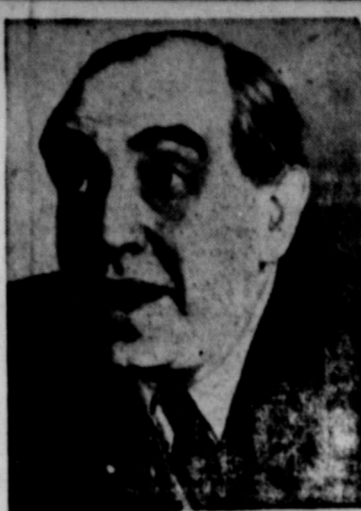

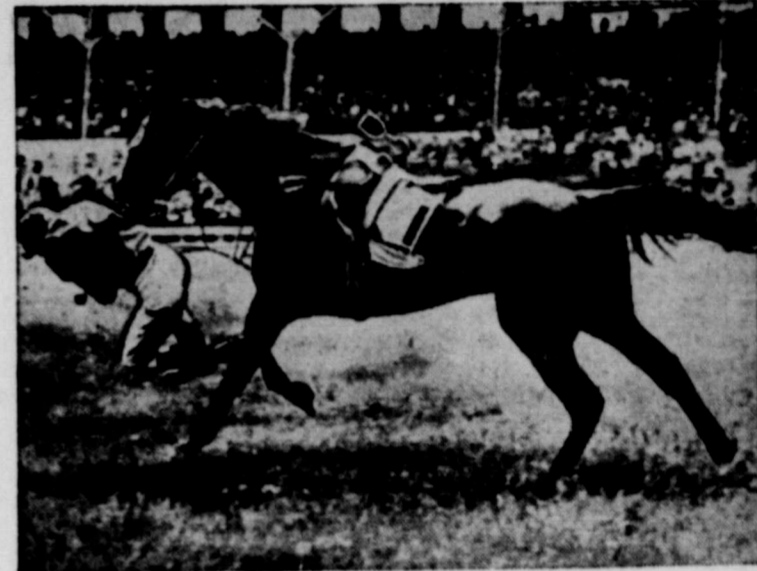
