And second, the best operating speed for the rotary hoe is between six and eight miles an hour-at least four and a half mph., running in third gear.

By keeping the bed flat, you'll avoid throwing seed and grass around the cotton seedlings. It's a good idea to delay "dirting" the cotton until it gets a good start. Elliott concludes.


