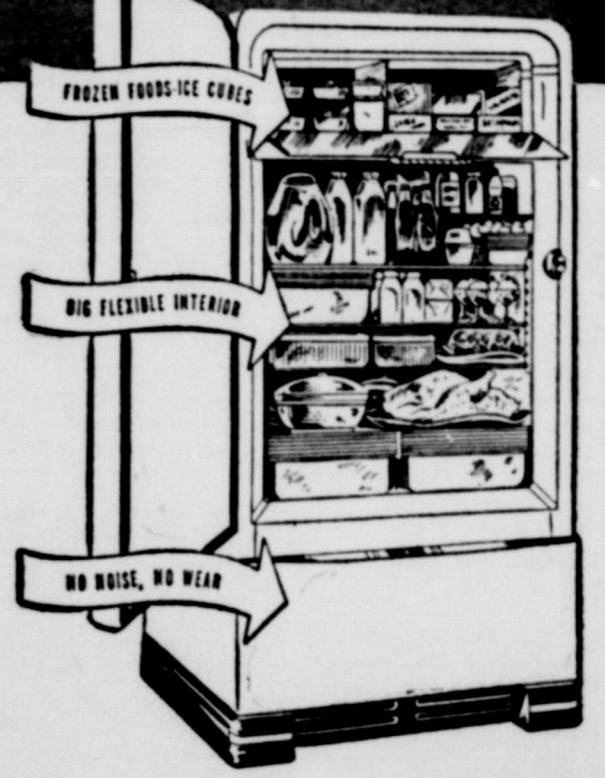
The next meeting will be held June 24, in the home of Mrs. John Duke, with Mrs. Merle Taff as hostess.

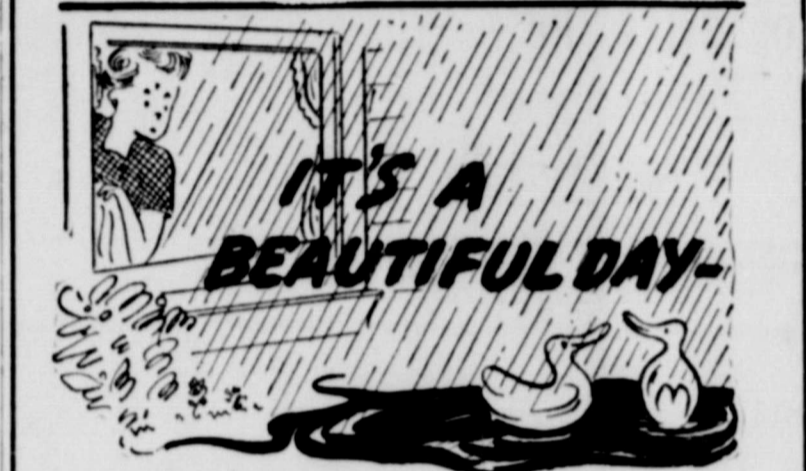
BALLINGER GUARDSMEN FIND NEW WAY TO SLEEP ON JOB

NORTH CAMP HOOD, June 15.—Two Ballinger guardsmen with company I, 142nd Infantry, have found a new way to sleep on the job and not be discovered. Lt. Henry B. Edmondson took a squad of men out in the field for camouflage training at the national guard summer encampment. Before the troops arrived for the demonstration, Lt. A search then began which lasted for two hours. Finally after covering every square inch of the area, the two men were uncovered. They were found sleeping in two hidden foxholes.

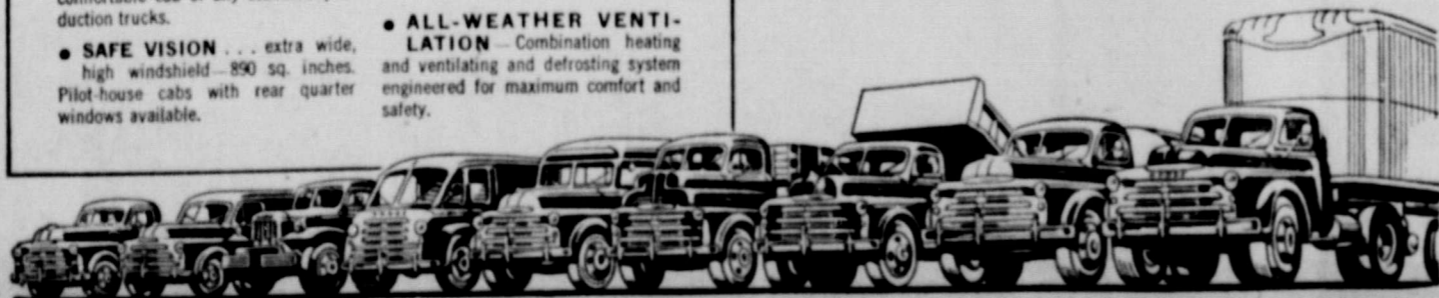

NINTH COTTON RESEARCH CONGRESS

at Dallas, Texas, 1948
By DR. H. G. JOHNSON, Department of Entomology, A. & M. College of Texas

Quote:

"It should be borne in mind, however, that these new insecticides should not be considered as miraculous "cure-alls." Although they are superior in many respects to the older insecticides, they must still be used at the right time and at regular intervals if profitable control is to be obtained. All applications for boll weevil and boll worm should be made at 5-day intervals as long as the infestation persists. Control of the boll worm is particularly dependent upon the proper timing of insecticide applications because the small worms feed on the small squares in the terminal buds and are comparatively easy to kill. When the worms are larger and enter the bolls to feed they are much more difficult to kill.

"It has been evident for a number of years that our cotton insect control recommendations were too complicated for most cotton farmers to follow successfully. This was due to the extremely variable nature of the insect pests attacking cotton and the fact that several different insecticides and combinations must be used for their control. As a result our recommendations have read something like this—If this happens, do that; if that happens, do this; and if both happen, do something else. The average cotton farmer was never too certain about what was happening and as a result was always guessing whether he should do anything; and if so, what? Consequently, he usually did nothing, or if he did anything he usually did it too late. Results obtained were very erratic and often disappointing. In spite of twenty-five years of intensive educational programs, conditions have improved but little so far as a majority of the cotton farmers are concerned."

End of Quote

AN ORDINANCE
Be it Ordained by the City Commission of the City of Ballinger, Texas:

Section 1. This ordinance shall be known as the "Garbage Ordinance" of the City of Ballinger, Texas. The word "premises," as used in this ordinance shall mean business houses, boarding houses,

offices, theaters, hotels, restaurants, cafes, eating houses, tourist camps and courts, apartments, sanatoriums, rooming houses, schools, private residences, all buildings and other structures, vacant lots, yards, and all other places where garbage, trash, refuse, animal and dead fowls, from any premises within the city limits.

Section 2. The various kinds of garbage shall be defined as follows:

(a) "Kitchen garbage" means a dry kitchen refuse, all meat, vegetable and fruit refuse, small dead animals and dead fowls, from any premises within the city limits.

(b) "Dry kitchen refuse" means solids after the liquid or slop has been drained off.

(c) "Trash" means paper of all kinds, rags, old clothing, paper containers, old rubber, pieces of wood, boxes, barrels, crates, feathers, weeds, grass, tree limbs from any premises in the city limits.

(d) "Rubbish" means tin cans, bottles, glass, scraps of iron, tin, wire, or any metals from premises in the city limits.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of every person, firm or corporation owning, occupying, leasing, operating or renting any premises, or place where "kitchen garbage" accumulates, to provide a manufactured portable garbage can constructed of galvanized iron, tin or other suitable metal, with two handles on same and a tight fitting lid fastened to the can by metal chains of a capacity of not less than five gallons and not more than thirty gallons and the daily accumulation of kitchen garbage and dry kitchen refuse shall be placed in the can or other receptacles as herein provided.

Section 4. The places of wholesale accumulations, such as killing and dressing plants for fowls and animals, wholesale fruit and vegetable houses, storage and other places where the daily accumulation of kitchen garbage, trash and rubbish is more than the ordinary quantities, are not included in the service furnished by the City Garbage Department and such places are required to remove same daily from their premises to the city dump ground at their own expense, in the manner and method and by the means directed by the official designated by the governing body of the city.

Section 5. Heavy dead animals, such as cows, horses and mules, shall be delivered to the city dump ground at the expense of the owner or person having same in charge in the manner and by

the method directed by the designated officials.

Section 6. Manure from cowlots, horse stables, poultry yards, pigeon lofts and other animal excreta shall be disposed of at the expense of the person on whose premises same may be found under the direction of the designated official.

Section 7. No pit toilet or surface toilet shall hereafter be erected in the city limits. All sewerage disposal places hereafter erected shall be septic tanks constructed under the direction of the designated official where the premises are not located on the city sewer line. Where the premises are located on the city sewer line, the only way the sewerage may be disposed of is through and into such line.

Section 8. All gut toilets and all surface toilets now in use in said city shall be thoroughly cleaned and sprayed with a solution of not less than 3% DDT not less than twice each week and treated with lime at all times. It shall be the duty of each and every person eighteen years old or over living on any premises where any pit toilet is located to see that each such toilet on such premises is cleaned and sprayed as herein provided, and breach of such duty shall constitute violation of this ordinance and each day of such violation shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 9. No person shall place any garbage in any street or alley except in the can or other receptacles as herein provided. No person except a city employee or some person placing garbage in a garbage can shall open any such can or open any other receptacle containing rubbish or garbage, nor shall any person tamper with any such can or receptacle.

Section 10. The owner, lessee, renter, operator or other person in charge of any vacant lot shall keep such lot cleaned off and free of all garbage and rubbish. Failure to obey this provision shall constitute a violation of this ordinance and each day on which a violation shall occur shall be a separate offense.

Section 11. The City Garbage Department shall pick up all garbage in residential areas not less than twice each week and in the

business area not less than twice each day.

Section 12. Any person who shall violate any provision of this ordinance shall upon conviction be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and be fined not more than \$100.00 and each day on which any violation occurs shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 13. The City of Ballinger shall be entitled to temporary restraining orders, temporary injunctions and permanent injunctions to restrain any person, firm or corporation from violating any provision of this ordinance. It shall be no defense to suit for such orders and injunctions that the defendant has been guilty of a crime in the violation of this ordinance or has been convicted therefor. The City Commission hereby finds as a fact that the delay inherent in criminal prosecution will prevent such prosecutions from being a wholly adequate remedy to enforce this ordinance and to properly safeguard the health of the inhabitants of the city and that the threat of polio and other serious diseases resulting from lack of sanitation makes it imperative that this Section of this ordinance be adopted.

Section 14. The office of City Sanitary Inspector is hereby created. Such official shall be appointed by the City Commission not less than ten days after passage of this ordinance. He is hereby authorized, and it is hereby made his duty, to arrest with or without warrant or arrest all persons violating any provision of this ordinance or any other sanitation law in effect in the city. The sum of \$1.50 shall be paid to the City of Ballinger each month for hauling garbage and rubbish from each garbage can at each private residence, house or other structure in the residential area. It shall be the duty of each person eighteen years old or over living at each such private residence, house or other structure to see that such sum is paid each month on each premises. The sum of \$3.00 to \$10.00 shall be paid for collecting and hauling off garbage and rubbish from each garbage can at each business house, building or structure in the business area, to said City, and such payment shall be paid by the owner, occupant, lessee, or renter in each such business house, building or structure. Personal judgment may be taken by the City of Ballinger against all persons, jointly and severally, for all amounts for which they may be liable hereunder. It is hereby made the duty of the City Commission of the City of Ballinger to purchase any and all equipment that may be necessary to carry out the terms of this ordinance.

Section 15. This ordinance is cumulative of all other sanitary laws and none of such laws is hereby repealed except where conflicting with this ordinance and in case of any such conflict, the terms of this ordinance shall prevail.

Section 16. If any sentence, section, paragraph, provision or part of this ordinance shall be held by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such invalidity shall not affect the remaining parts of this ordinance and all parts of this ordinance not so held invalid shall remain in full force the same as if the invalid part hereof had not been adopted.

Section 17. The fact that the inhabitants of the city are threatened with an immediate and imminent epidemic of polio and other dreadful diseases resulting from lack of sanitation requires the governing body of the city to immediately pass this ordinance for the safety of such inhabitants and requires that this ordinance be made effective immediately upon passage and the first publication thereof, and it is so ordered.

Unanimously passed and approved this 14 day of June, 1949.

SIDE LIGHTS ON THE CLEAN UP

Thursday afternoon of last week was a "holiday" in Ballinger. The "holiday" was called for work and the cooperation was fine, but a few took advantage of the occasion for an afternoon nap or other relaxation.

A total of 55 trucks and pickups and upwards of 200 men turned out at the city hall at 1

p. m. Thursday and during the afternoon moved approximately 700 loads of garbage and filth to the city dump grounds.

One crew working the alleys found that one man had gone home, parked his pick-up in the back yard and was taking the afternoon off. Instead of moving all the trash from that home they loaded part of it in the man's own vehicle and left it there.

Still another crew left a pick-up load of trash when the "head of the house" got up from a cool place on the sleeping porch and came out to watch them load.

Proving that assembling of trash was far behind in some sections of the city, "Tubby" Hem-bree and crew came in with a Christmas tree and cast off decorations on their first load.

One man stated that enough filth was moved from the alleys to start an epidemic of cholera in China.

Much has been said in the past 50 years about punching holes in cans, buckets and other containers so that water would not catch and make breeding places for mosquitoes. Hundreds of such hazards were found filled with water that must have been there since the snows last winter. Included were old automobile tires half filled with stagnant water.

Merchants working in the alleys along "Knob Hill" were shocked at the large number of privies in use at homes where there are servants' quarters.

Covered garbage cans were few and far between and most of the kitchen scraps, left-overs from dressed chickens and a number of dead animals were in oil drums used for garbage containers and for trash burners.

Those who worked have a sincere understanding for the regular city employees. It has always been specified that trash and garbage must be on containers which can be loaded by two men. All along the route Thursday the 50-gallon oil drums were full and trash was usually in large piles which would require special forks or other loading equipment to handle. Some of the large containers were filled with dirt and rocks which would weigh more than 500 pounds.

The 55 trucks and 200 workers did not nearly get through, so figure out how often one city truck can get around.

The dump ground is not a very pleasant place to spend an afternoon, but every man and woman

in Ballinger should drive through and see it.

Streets leading through the section of town south of the tracks are not for pleasure riding. The bar ditches along the side were filled with "green" water Thursday and are an ideal breeding place for mosquitoes. Practically all of these need opening for better drainage.

As the work progressed Thursday afternoon, the spirit of the clean-up became contagious and hundreds of people were piling their trash at the curbs to be picked up. At some places in the "flat" there was a bigger trash pile than the house.

Sam Malone, Jr., chairman of the health committee drove a truck Thursday and gathered enough information on conditions to keep his committee busy the rest of this year, and it might be a good thing to hold Sam for another year.

Mrs. Hill Hampton and Mrs. T. A. Parrish, other members of the health committee, have given all their time for the past two weeks to getting results on the clean-up and polio campaign here. They enlisted many women and more than \$2,000 was raised.

Bill May, president of the chamber of commerce and ex-officio member of all committees, earned his pay since the campaign began. Bill has led the attack, met with workers and city officials, became a radio announcer and program director, and Thursday donned his work clothes and loaded trucks.

The city got its first DDT fogging Thursday night. The weather was ideal and the chemical cloud rolled over the entire community to kill many germs. Many people reported their porches covered with dead flies Friday morning.

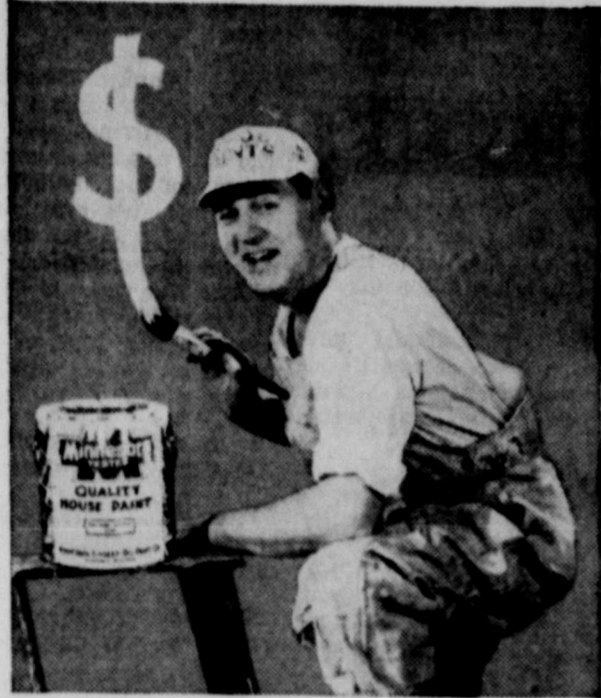

Two trucks were hired and put on the job Friday to continue the hauling until the city was covered. Those in charge of the campaign urge that workers keep on until every yard, alley and vacant lot is cleaned.

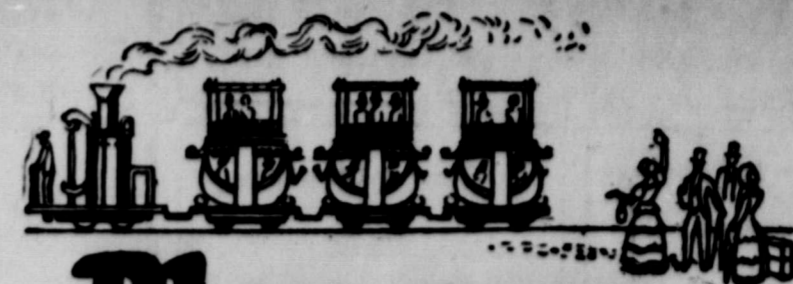

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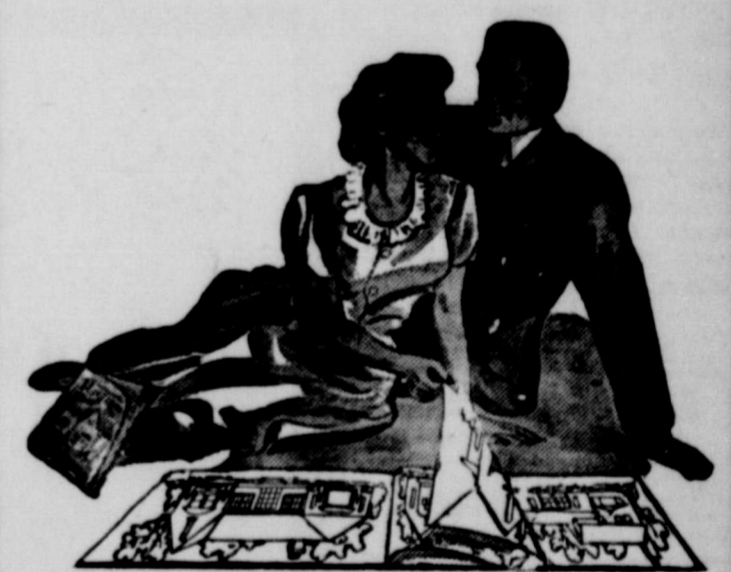
