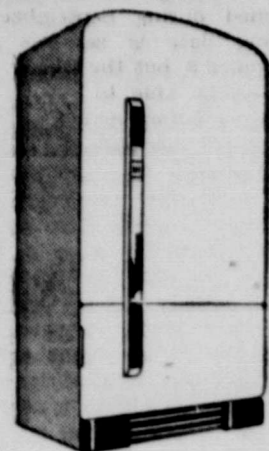

Efficient Pig Feeding Said Way to Profits

COLLEGE STATION, Sept. 7.—Efficient feeding and profitable pork production go together. About 80 per cent of the pork production costs are in feed bills, says Fred Hale, professor of animal husbandry, Texas agricultural experiment station, and one item that many swine producers overlook is vitamin A.

All of our farm grains and mill products are deficient in vitamin A, except yellow corn, says Hale, and hogs of all ages require vitamin A for maintaining their health. Breeding hogs need it for

normal development and reproduction. Brood sows produce less milk when their ration is lacking in vitamin A and hogs of any age maintain a greater resistance to flu and other diseases when their ration is well supplied with it, adds Hale.

Results of research work done at the Texas agricultural experiment station show that sows fed rations deficient in vitamin A farrowed pigs that were deformed; some even had no eyeballs, while others were born dead.

Vitamin A as such does not occur in green grass or other plants, but a substance called carotene is found in green grass, green alfalfa hay and yellow corn. This carotene is converted into

vitamin A within the animal's body, says Hale. Fish oils do contain the actual vitamin A.

Good green pastures will furnish hogs with the necessary vitamin A, and green pastures are about the best and cheapest source of the vitamin, continues Hale. But if green pasture is not available, the ration for fattening hogs should contain from 5 to 6 per cent of green leafy alfalfa meal, and brood sows and other breeding animals should have from 10 to 15 per cent of green alfalfa meal in their ration, says Hale. The efficient hog producer should plan to have green pasture for as many months of the year as is possible.

Hogs have the ability to store quantities of the vitamin in their bodies and they do this when there is an abundant supply of green pasture. Hogs that have been on green pasture during the summer can go for three or four months in a dry lot without showing vitamin A deficiency, but Hale adds, it is better to add to the ration green alfalfa meal during periods when green pasture is not available. There is much more profit in feeding

healthy hogs and it is often a slow process to nurse back to health a hog or a herd that has developed a vitamin deficiency. It is too easy to prevent in the first place, says Hale.

Thousands of Rural Kiddies off to School Now for First Time

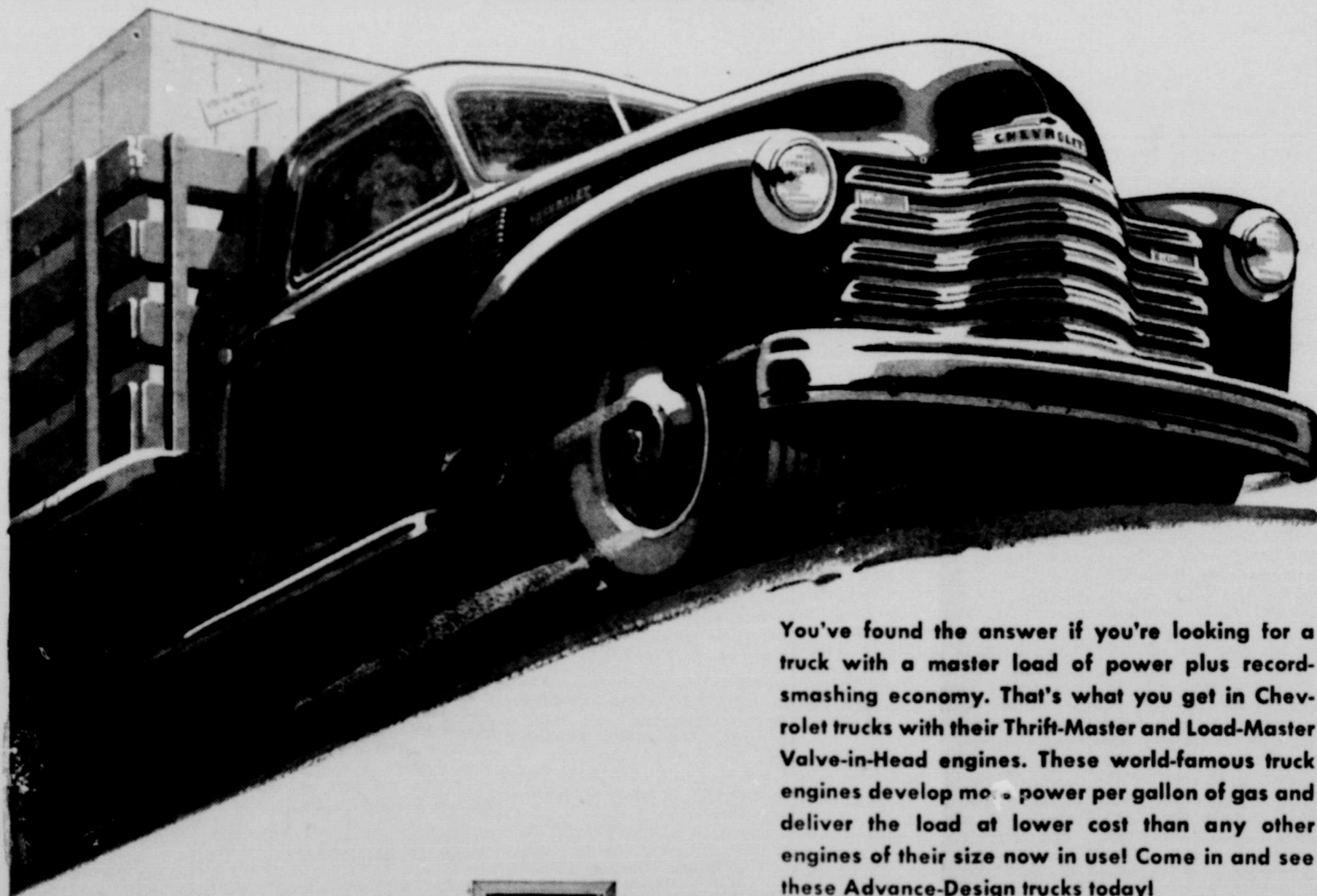
COLLEGE STATION, Sept. 7.—The ringing of school bells will soon start thousands of rural boys and girls back to school, and many will be leaving home for the first time. This first day at school will be long remembered not only by the pupil but probably by dad and mother as well. There is a lot more to getting Junior or Sister off to school these days than providing them with new shoes and a dinner pail, says Mrs. Eloise Johnson, extension family life specialist of Texas A. & M. College.

A complete physical check-up is in order, she says. Special attention should be given to the ears, eyes, teeth and throat. If it hasn't

already been done the child should be immunized against diphtheria and vaccinated against smallpox. A healthy child is a better student, will learn faster, and enter into the school activities, says Mrs. Johnson. The beginner should be able to take care of himself and above all he must be able to get along with other children. He must know something about safety. For there are automobiles to watch, streets and highways to cross and there will be new dangers on the playground that he may never have experienced at home. Mrs. Johnson suggests that you do a little pre-school teaching at home to familiarize the beginner with the new experiences that go with attendance at school. He should understand what discipline means and that his teacher is his friend. Parents should build up a desire in the child so he'll want to go to school.

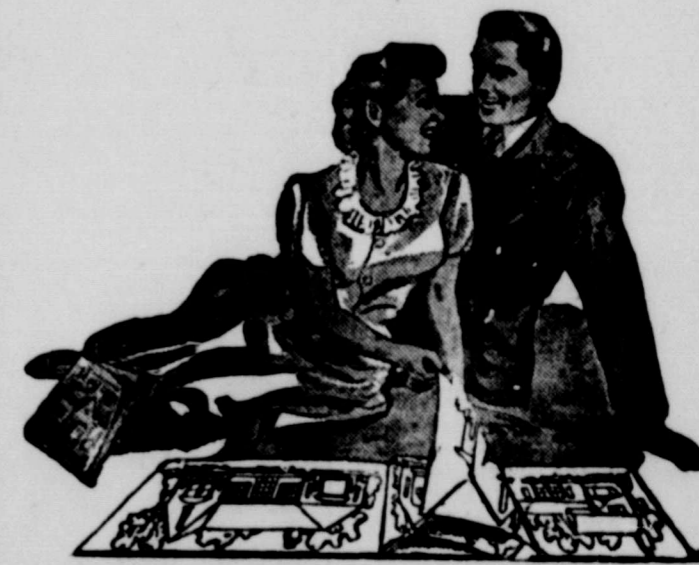

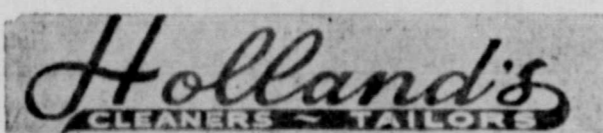

Coaches Wayman Wilson and Douglas Cox have been shifting a few of their lettermen and making other changes to fill a few gaps left by students graduating last spring.

Both coaches are fairly well pleased with the looks of the team and while they state replacements are not too numerous, they have a fair team to put in the 1949 conference race.

Seymour has one of the better class A outfits in this part of the state and for many years the

team has been in the post-season play for bi-district and regional championships. The Panthers will field a good team at Bearcat Field for the opening game and fans will see one of the best of the home schedule tomorrow evening.

The field is in excellent condition for the first game. Practice sessions have been held on the field in front of the junior high school in order to protect the fine turf on the regular field. All stands and other equipment have been painted and made ready for the 1949 season. Lights will be tested tonight to see that everything is in condition for the game tomorrow.

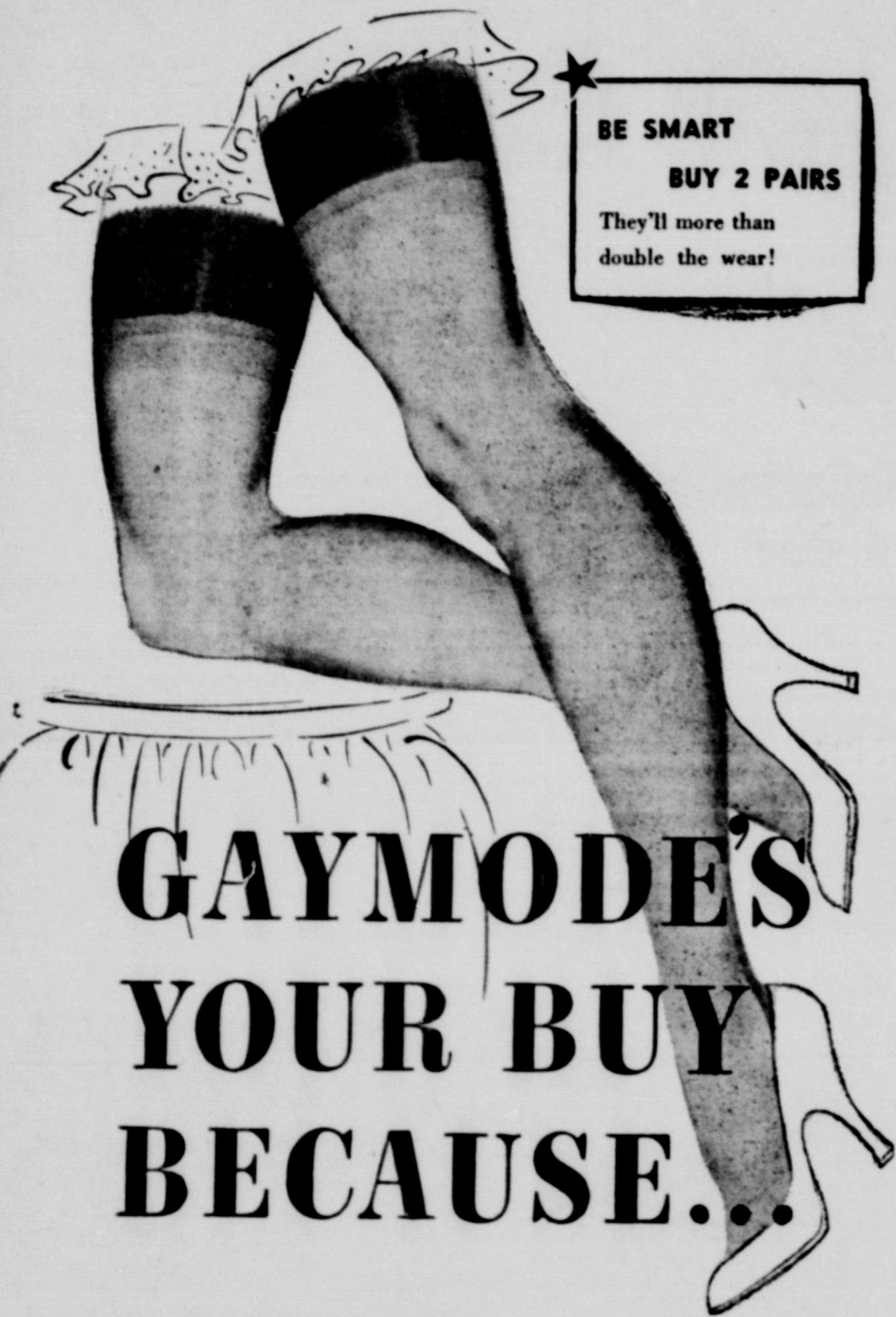
the five home games. The school will operate the concessions and will have eats and drinks on sale at each game. Pillows will also be available.

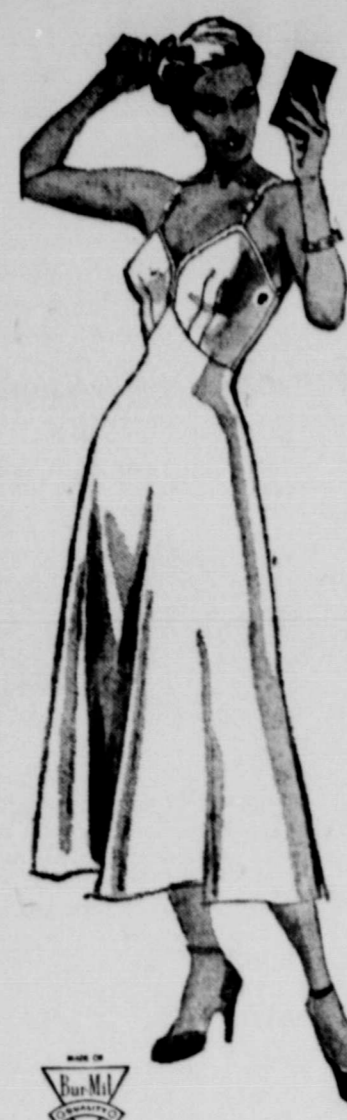

The baseball season is coming to a close for local fans and while the Cats were not in top division much of the time this year, fans saw much good baseball. With the end of the first season since the club ownership passed into the hands of a large number of business men, there is much work ahead to make 1950 all that it should be in baseball.

The Ballinger Bearcats are ready to start entertaining and will play a full five-game home schedule this year. While all conference games are away from home, the home schedule will bring some of the best class A teams of West Texas to Bearcat Field.

Ballinger coaches have a fair number of lettermen back this year but have had to move several into the backfield to fill holes. Most important of the shifts is the moving of Jimmy Davenport, all-district end, to the backfield. Davenport will play at quarterback, handle the pigskin under the T and do most of the passing and kicking for the Bearcats. He was the place kicker after touchdowns last winter and his educated toe made many points for the locals.

Opening tomorrow night at 8:00 p. m., the Bearcats will be hosts to the Seymour Panthers. Seymour has a team of veterans and a large reserve roster and will give the Bearcats a real test in the opener. The Ballinger lads are in fair physical condition and all players on the squad will be eligible for service if needed.

Coach Felton Wright's Howard Payne Yellow Jackets will open

the football season at Brownwood Saturday night, meeting the stiff North Texas State College eleven. The game is to be played at the high school stadium with kick-off time 8:15 p. m. Several former Ballinger stars will be in the Yellow Jacket line-up and a large number of local fans will witness the game.

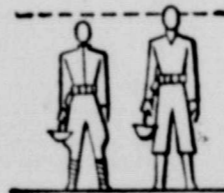

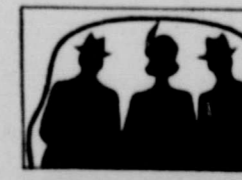

Treating of Winter Grain Seed Advised

COLLEGE STATION, Sept. 7.—Planting time for winter grain crops is just around the corner and now is the time to get the seed ready. It is important to plant good seed and of the right varieties. E. A. Miller, extension agronomist of Texas A & M. College, suggests that you check with your local county agent on the varieties that are best adapted to your particular section of the state.

If the seed you intend to plant are mixed with weed seed, they should be cleaned and then treated chemically as a safeguard against losses from grain smuts, seed rots and seedling blights, says Miller.

Stinking smut is the most serious wheat disease. If there are smut spores on the seed, they will germinate with the wheat seed—if conditions are favorable—and will grow up with the wheat plant. Stinking smut is hard to detect in the field, says Miller. If the infestation is severe, you may notice a foul odor and the heads will take on a darker green color. At heading time, the heads will have masses of smut spores where the kernels should be and during combining-operations these smut balls will break open and scatter millions of black spores over the healthy seed.

Oats and barley are often attacked by smut but here it is easily detected by the black barren stalks in the field.

An effective method of control for these smuts is to treat each bushel of seed with 1-2 ounce of new improved ceresan or with a like amount of the new chemical called ceresan M.

Loose smut is something else. It causes the grainless black heads that you have probably seen in your wheat field, says Miller. It cannot be controlled by chemical treatment—only by a difficult hot water treatment—and for that reason Miller says it is best to get seed from growers who do not have the disease in their fields.

The same chemical treatment can be used on oats and it will also help control the new disease called helminthosporium blight to which Victoria oat crosses including Fultex, Ranger, Rustler and Victor Grain are susceptible. One symptom of this disease is weakening of the stalks which causes lodging.

Miller says that treating grain seed is good insurance against losses in yields due to smuts and other seed borne diseases and against dockage losses when you sell. Your local county agent will be glad to supply you with additional information on seed treatment methods and he can also furnish plans for making the seed treating equipment, adds Miller.

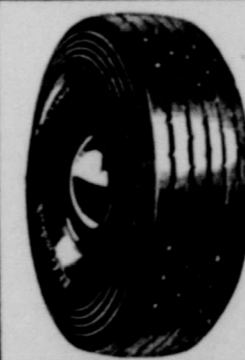

Ballinger has been fortunate the past two years and fire losses have been held low, thanks to our efficient firemen. Cooperation in Fire Prevention Weeks may save property and life.

Sports fans will have their attention divided this week between baseball and football. The first football game of the year is to be played tomorrow (Friday) night, just two days before the end of the baseball season. Bearcat Field has been made ready for the entertainment of local fans and the high school athletes will be on the ball this fall.



WEST TEXAS NOTES

The Miles rural school opened Monday morning for regular class work with a complete faculty on duty, according to Supt. L. M. Hays. Approximately \$9,000 was spent the past summer in reconditioning the buildings. The school also has a new gymnasium and homemaking cottage, constructed at a cost of \$51,000. A new football stadium is nearing completion and will be ready for night games shortly. Work on the gym will not be finished until about September 25.

The Melvin school has a number of improvements ready for the start of the fall term which will help take care of the increase in the student load. Three buildings have been moved to the campus and made ready for classrooms. These buildings were purchased by the board some time ago but were not moved to the campus until recently. A building housing the lunch room was completed the past summer.

Representatives of 13 Brady organizations and a number of interested individuals met last week to study the community chest plan. After consideration it was decided to adopt this method and a committee was appointed to prepare preliminary plans for forming an organization. At the same time it was asked that all organizations desiring to participate in the chest to make up their budgets and submit them before the quota for the first chest drive is set. Members of the various organizations decided it would be better to conduct one big drive for funds and eliminate many solicitations which take so much time of business men.

The Bronte school district now comprises about 240 square miles of territory and has property valuations of \$1,800,000. Added to the Bronte district last week were the Oak Creek, Brookshier and Mays districts. The term began Monday with a faculty of 15 and enrollment of about 390. Courses in

Three issues were submitted and each was defeated. 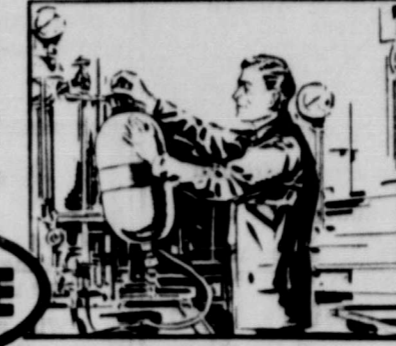

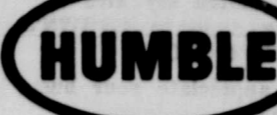
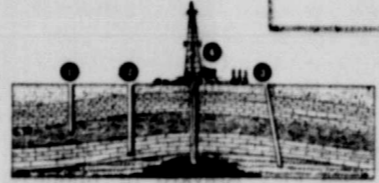

Cover Crop Keeps Soil Temperature Even Year 'Round
COLLEGE STATION, Sept. 7.—Can you remember how hot bare ground felt when you used to go barefooted? How you hunted grassy spots to walk on? That was just probably what you called a natural reaction, but the matter of soil temperature is a very

important item in a soil building program, says Roy L. Donahue, extension agronomist of Texas A. & M. College.
A summer cover crop keeps the soil cooler in hot weather and a winter cover crop helps to hold the temperature up in the winter time. This cover is important for Donahue says that for every 10 degree rise in temperature most chemical reactions are doubled and there are plenty of chemical reactions taking place in the soil. The rotting of organic matter is a chemical reaction.
So when the soil is allowed to go without summer cover, it gets very hot and this causes the organic matter to burn up faster. Soil low in organic matter doesn't take up moisture when it rains and is drier when the rains don't come often. In areas where wind erosion is a problem, it blows away easily, and in areas of heavy rainfall, it washes badly, says Donahue.
It may be too late to plant a summer legume or grass crop this year, but it is not too late to plan your cover crop for this winter, next summer or for that matter for each season over a five year period.
What can you expect from such a program? Donahue says averages from an extension service demonstration in 86 counties show that when corn followed a soil building legume, yields increased 41 per cent. When the soil building legume was fertilized, the corn produced an additional 8 bushels

per acre on the average.
Reports from 21 counties showed that grain sorghum following a fertilized legume made a 70 per cent increase in yield and cotton yields were increased 60 per cent, says Donahue.
He adds that if you are interested in getting a soil building program

started on your farm, visit the local county agent and talk the situation over with him. Chances are good that he can show you demonstrations where soil building crops are being used to increase crop yields and too, he can help you make that long time plan for your farm.

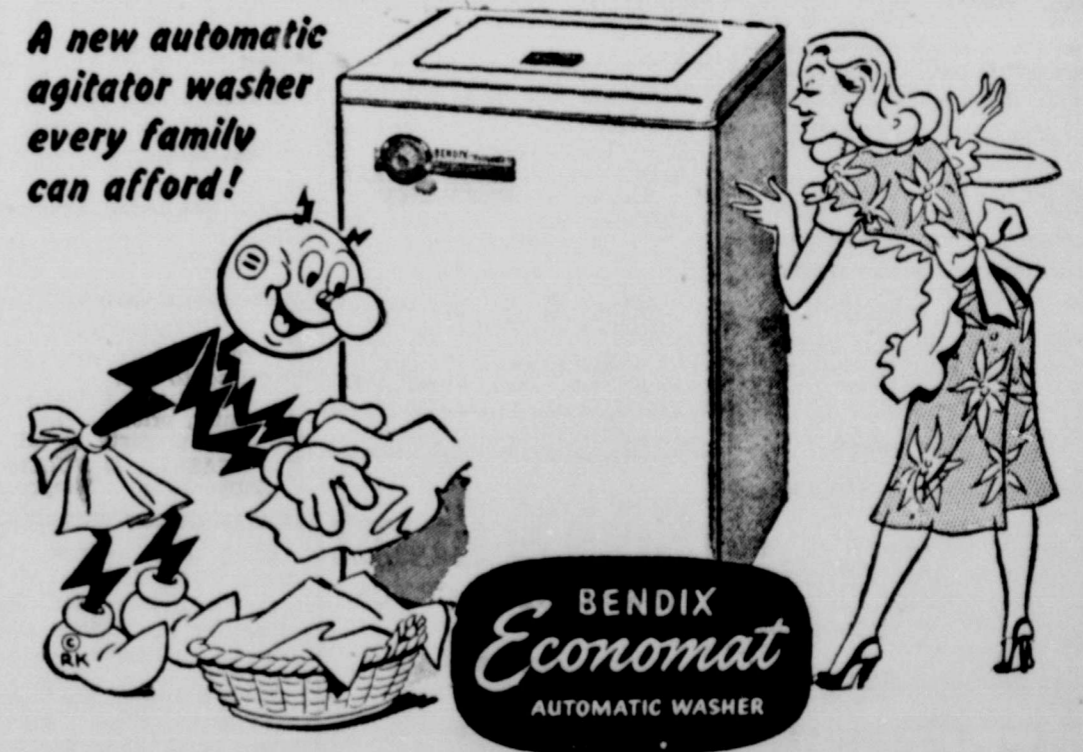
