Mrs. Orr, Ballinger's Oldest Citizen Observes 98th Birthday

Mrs. C. A. Orr, 98 years old on Tuesday, June 6, is Ballinger's oldest citizen, and during the 31 years she has lived in this area her friendly smile and sparkling eyes have brought joy to many because she still finds life a pleasant experience.

Mrs. Orr was born on June 6, 1852, at Iuka, Mississippi. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Sanford Vandiver, her father having been born in Norway, and her mother in Alabama.

In fair health and with good eyesight, as she wears no glasses, Mrs. Orr retains a brilliant memory, possesses a keen intellect and displays a youthful and modern concern in community, state and national affairs.

As one who came out of the iron-hel age of Civil War Reconstruction days, who went the gamut of the life of frontiersmen with her husband, who served in the Confederate army for 4 years under Gen. N. B. Forest, and who later moved with her family to Hill county in Texas in 1895, Mrs. Orr has slipped down through the eventful years to become known as "Mother Orr," not only to her own children, but her grandchildren, her great grandchildren and her 3 great great grandchildren, and her friends.

As the shadows lengthen, Mother Orr talks of the past, lives in the present and dreams of the future—though, in so doing, she modestly

unfolds a mighty drama that reveals the sacrifices that people like her made that the present generation might enjoy its benefits.

In 1870, she was married to C. A. Orr, of South Carolina. Six children, all daughters, were born to the couple. Three are deceased. Those living are Mattie Lou, now Mrs. James Trumble, of Reno, Nevada; Carry, now Mrs. Ross Whisenant, of California; and Mrs. J. H. (Ruby) Carter, of Eldorado. She has 26 grandchildren, 23 great grandchildren and 3 great great grandchildren.

In 1919 when the Orr family came to Runnels county, they lived on a farm, where Mrs. Orr assisted her husband with the chores. She stated that at 70 years of age she could easily pick between 300 and 400 pounds of cotton in a day. After Mr. Orr passed away February 23, 1923, she reared two of her grandchildren, and assisted them in getting through high school.

Mrs. Orr says that she is very modern, that she would very gladly make her first plane ride. She made a trip by motor to California several years ago and stated she wasn't even tired when she got there. Just last week she spent several days in Odessa with her granddaughter and attended the graduation exercises of her great granddaughter, Yvonne West. Now she is planning a trip to Mississippi where she will see if some of her property might have oil.

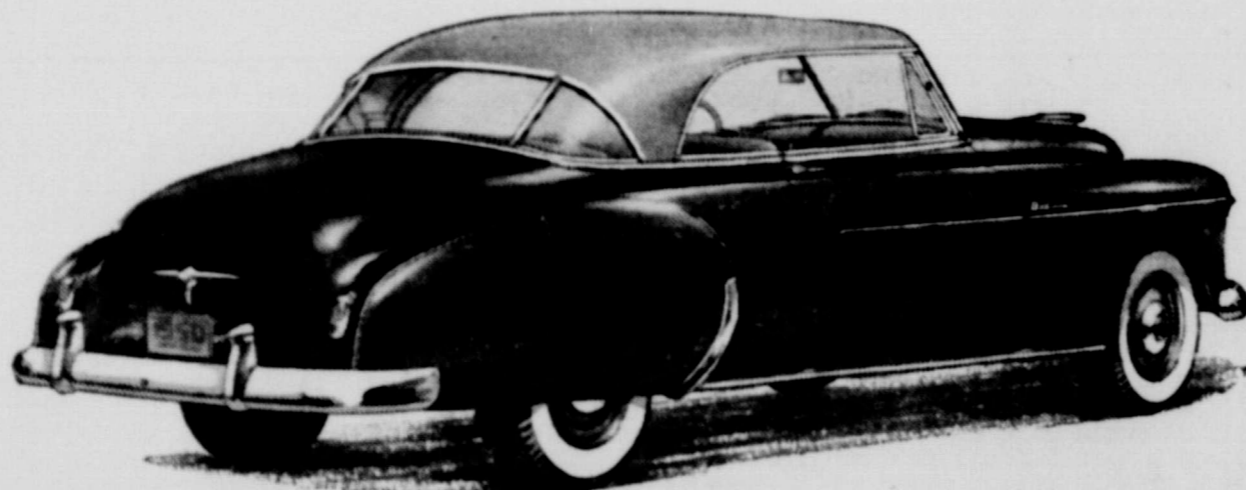

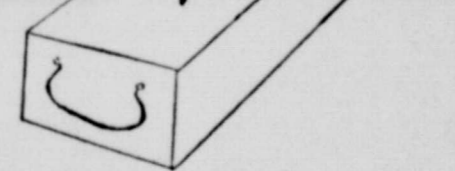

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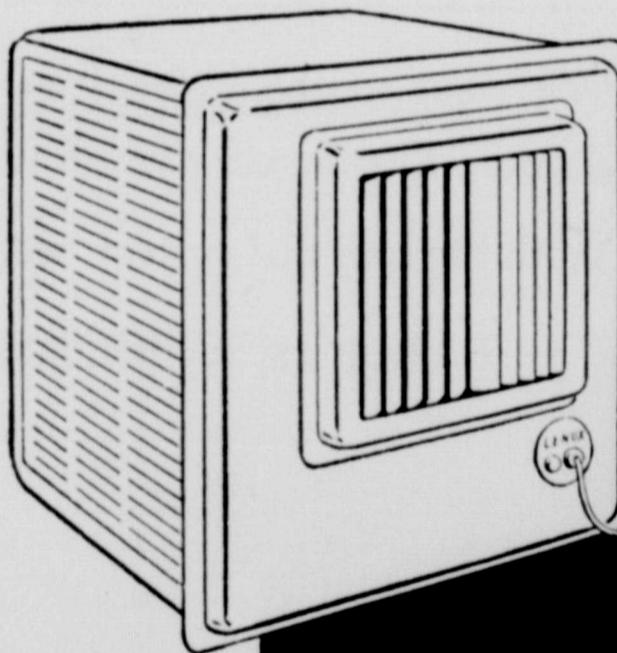

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Construction will be increased here soon with the extending of the city sewer system and the building of two new schools. Paper work has been completed on the authorized bonds and each issue has a buyer as soon as they are approved. The school board and the city commission intend to convert the bonds into cash very soon, advertise for bids and let contracts for the work which will total about \$350,000. New residences, improvement of homes and business houses are still underway, and there appears to be no let-up in the building spurt which was started more than a year ago.

The Ballinger Chamber of Commerce is faced with a greatly expanded program which involves heavier expenses than ever before required. For some time the organization has been trying to do business on a budget set up before World War II. Since there are greatly increased costs in salaries and office expenses, this is impossible. Merchants of the city want a live, wide-awake chamber and it must have funds to function properly. The progress and prosperity that has come to this section makes it imperative that the chamber do more work than ever before and in carrying out any project, money is needed. Directors and officers realize that it is not

good to be constantly making special drives for money for one thing at a time and are now asking business men to raise their monthly, quarterly or annual payments to the chamber so that all bills can be met as they are made without special calls.

June 17 is the last date for precinct and county office seekers to make announcements and be certified for places on the ballot in the first Democratic primary. To date announcements have been few and indications are that not many offices will be contested for by more than one candidate. The date is already passed for district and state officers to announce, but there will be full representation in most of these races.

Since the successful clean-up campaign here several weeks ago rains have caused a heavy growth of weeds and another campaign is in order soon. The rank weeds will cause a fire hazard later in the summer when dry weather causes them to die. Right now weeds offer good harborage for mosquitoes, flies and other disease-carrying insects.

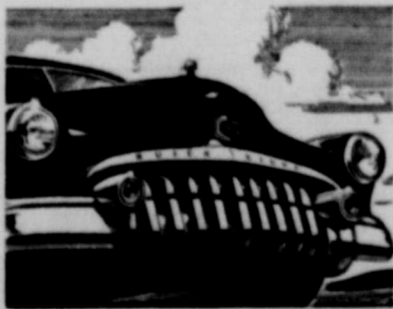

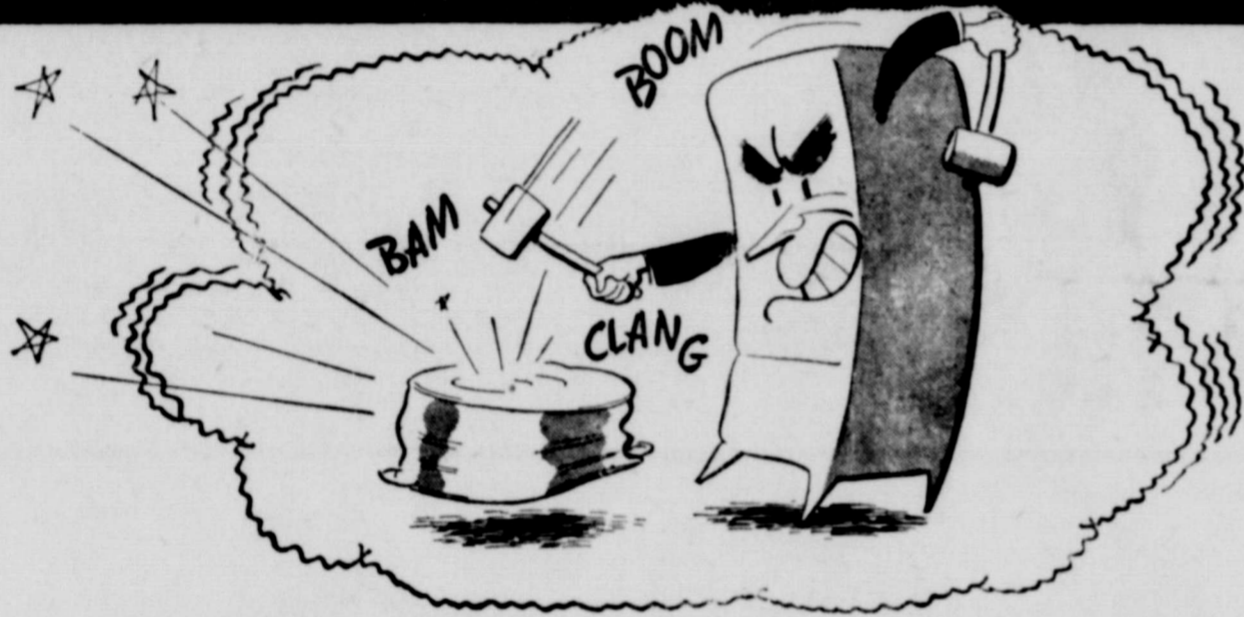

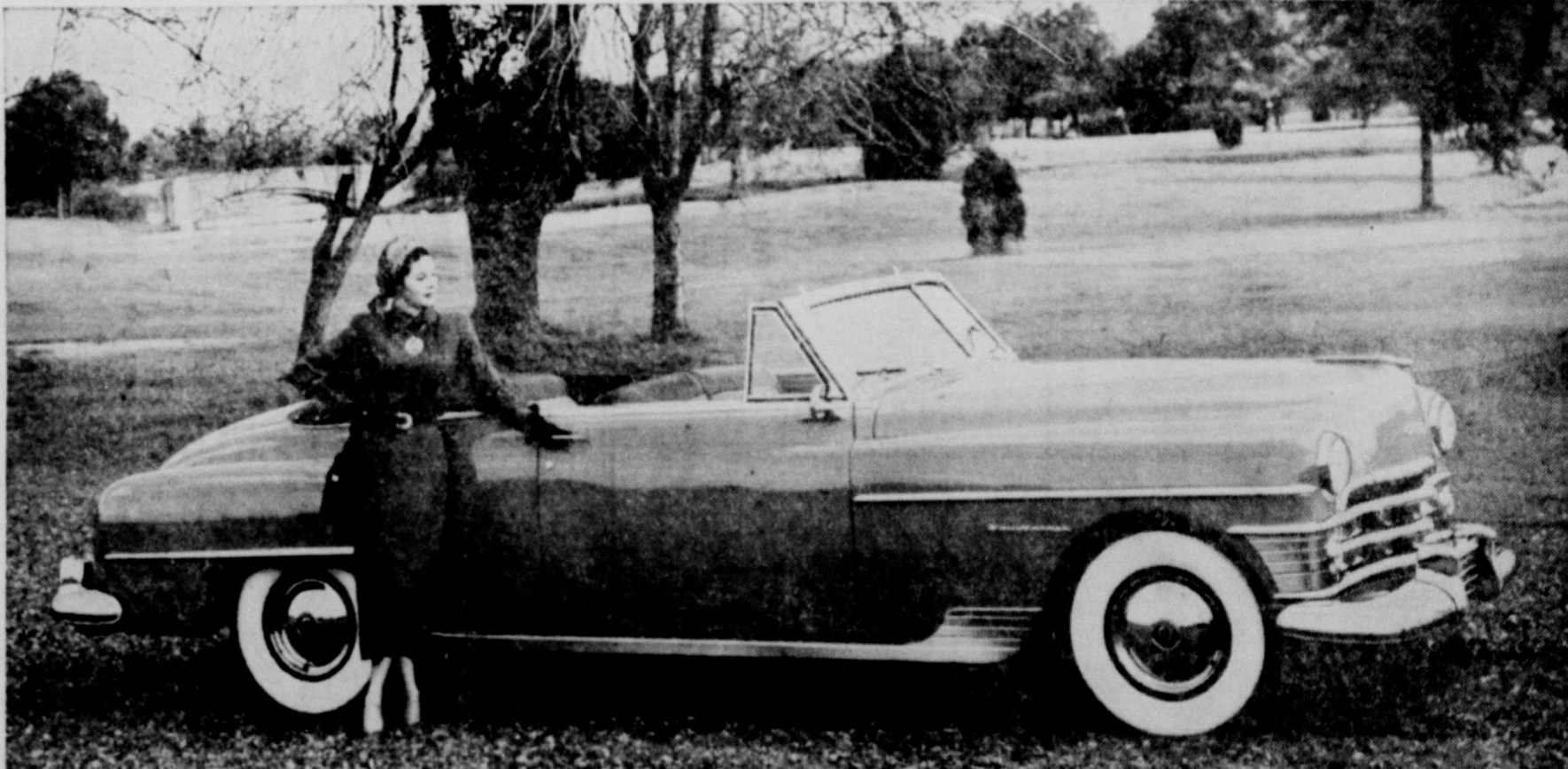

Daily Consumption Of Water Averaging Near 800,000 Gallons

R. E. Harris, city water superintendent, stated today that water consumption here was averaging approximately 800,000 gallons daily. The highest consumption in a single day was 820,000 gallons. A pump has been installed at the lake to handle 700 gallons per minute. This replaces a pump of 350 gallons a minute capacity and will make possible for the city to put about 1,500,000 gallons daily through the lines and settling basins with treatment. A report on the lake recently

revealed it had gone down about 5 feet since the beginning of the season. There is still ample water but recent rains have added very little to the lake.

Water consumption took a jump with the announcement of the summer irrigation rate on April 15. Since then many patrons have been using large quantities of water to keep their yards and gardens and for other purposes.
