**Wheat Improvement Association Favors Quannah Seed in 1951**

A meeting of the Runnels County Wheat Improvement Association was held at Winters Friday and plans were made for further improving the varieties in this county to meet requirements of the millers and grain dealers. In 1949 the Texas wheat improvement group listed Runnels county as having only 30% desirable varieties and in 1950 this same group raised the rating to 80% desirable.

The association is striving to make the county 100% and has made plans for securing a new seed to be used on a number of farms for the 1951 crop. In the meeting Friday a number of farmers signed to secure Quannah wheat for seed and will plant it in the fall or in the spring. Some of those signed up for the Quannah seed include: J. M. The wheat improvement association was organized in July, 1949, and within one year the desirable varieties rating was increased from 30% to 80% through its efforts.

The new Quannah wheat is a black rust-resistant variety and meets all requirements of millers and grain buyers. It has shown a good yield in this section in comparison with other wheat and will be given a thorough trial on a large number of farms in 1951.

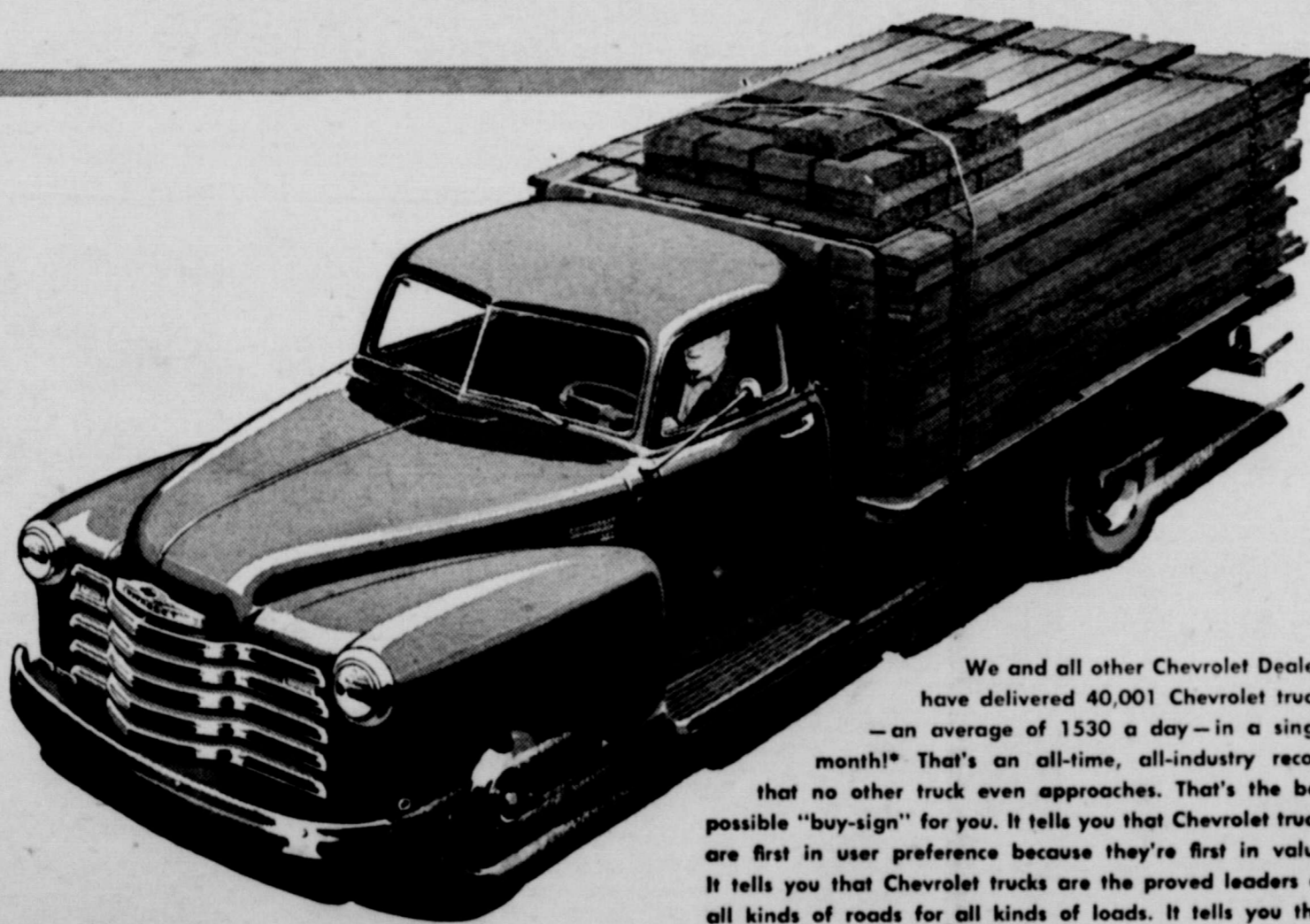
