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Runnels county, through a petition to congressmen, will seek to do something about the child labor law as it affects agricultural workers. Much hardship has been caused in this section on account of this amendment and the latter part of the cotton harvest has been a trying ordeal for cotton growers and school patrons. In order to provide a loop-hole and keep a few pickers in this area, many schools were closed for harvest holidays. This action did not prove too successful as many of the large crews of Latin-American pickers headed for their homes, leaving much of the cotton in this region unpicked. Business men and farmers will ask that some change be made before

1951. Acreage restrictions have been removed on the 1951 crop and with enough moisture a big crop will be produced in this section and the harvesting will be a problem without importing large crews of pickers.

Ballinger business heads have formed a committee to study the Christmas program to be presented here. This group, of which Ewell Jones is chairman, is open to suggestions and will appreciate any plan which might add to the beauty of the city, entertainment features and anything that will attract more people to Ballinger during the shopping season. The local Christmas program was neglected during the war because of a shortage of decorative pieces and other essentials. This year the committee will seek to revive interest and especially asks the cooperation of all the merchants. A beautiful Christmas town will attract shoppers and will also create earlier shopping. Regardless of the features included in the 1950 program, it will require the full cooperation of every business firm to make it a success. One beautiful Christmas store with the next three undecorated does not make an appealing picture.

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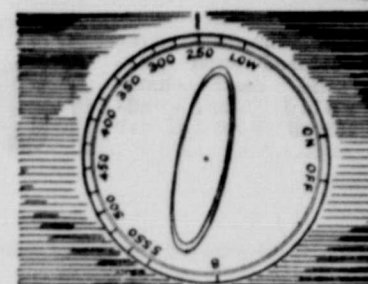
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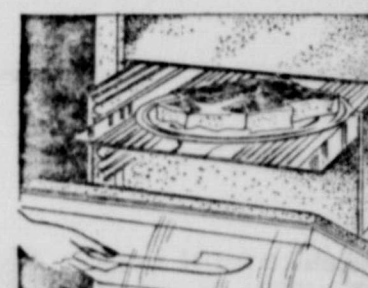

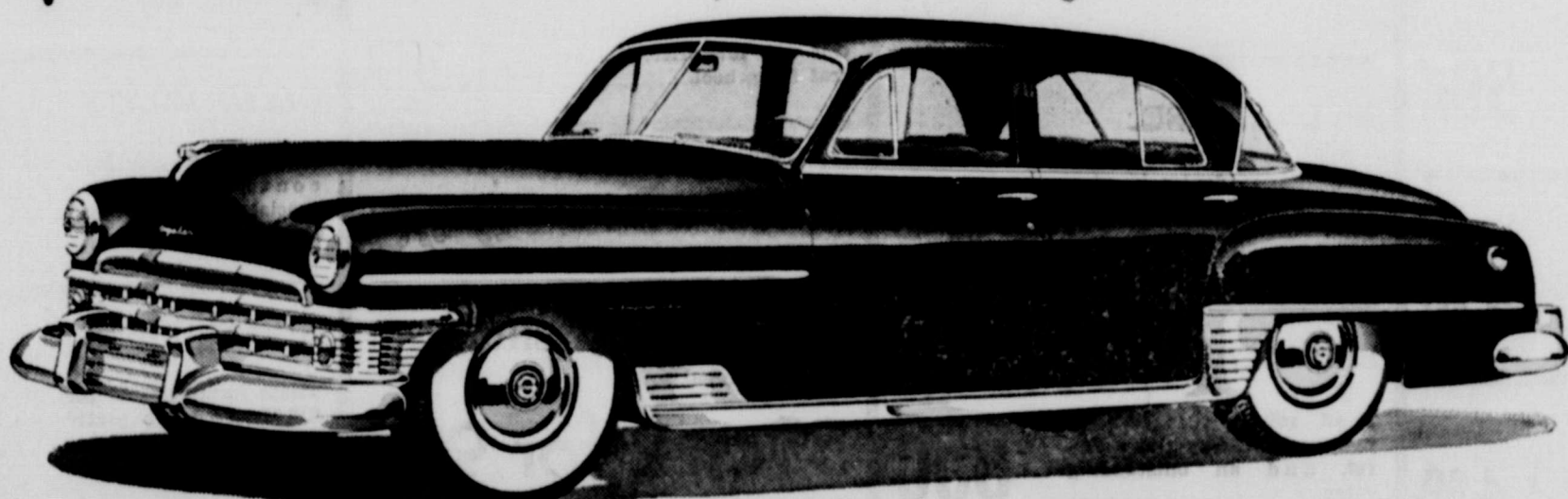
