

## 2-Car Crash Near Miles Costs Lives of 4 People

A two-car collision Sunday at 6:50 p. m. on highway 67 a short distance east of Miles snuffed out the lives of four people. Mrs. Henry Harkey and two daughters, Nancy Ruth 3, and Carolyn Brown, 8, were killed instantly, and the driver of the other car involved, J. V. Daniels, died in the Ballinger Clinic-Hospital Monday morning.

The bodies of Mrs. Harkey and two little girls were brought to the Newby-Davis Funeral Home and prepared for interment. They were taken to Merton Monday afternoon for burial following last rites at the Merton Church of Christ at 4 p. m.

Graveside services for Mr. Daniels will be held this afternoon in Evergreen Cemetery.

Mrs. Harkey and daughters, in a 194 Mercury, were returning to their home from Fort Worth, where they had visited Mrs. Harkey's twin sister, Daniels, a coupon salesman for Wallace Studios, was returning to Abilene after spending Sunday at San Angelo.

Witnesses to the crash said Daniels' car began weaving and crossed the highway in front of the Harkey car. Both vehicles were demolished.

Mrs. Harkey remained in the car behind the steering wheel, one child was caught in a door and the other was thrown from the car to the pavement.

These deaths bring the number of traffic fatalities in Runnels county this year to six.

## Hambrick Named To Commission In Muni Election

Charles Hambrick, write-in candidate for city street commissioner, was elected to the position in Tuesday's municipal election, defeating J. R. Lusk and L. J. ("Red") Campbell. Nearly 300 votes were cast and all other candidates were rejected.

Mayor J. W. Moore was returned to his office, receiving a total of 252 votes. Others given votes for the mayor's office were Arthur Giesecke, 52; Charles Hambrick, 4; and Gay Edwards, 2.

Raymond Berryhill remains in the office of water commissioner, polling 295 votes. Others receiving votes for the same office were Charles Hambrick, 2; and L. J. Campbell, 1.

The count in the street commissioner's race was: Hambrick 135, Lusk 109 and Campbell 75.

The new commission will be in session soon to take over for two-year terms.

### Drivers of Scooters Warned by Sheriff

Sheriff Don Atkins stated Monday that his office recently received numerous complaints in regard to children riding motor scooters. The complaints have been of such nature that officers have been instructed to keep a close watch on local streets and highways.

He added that any child caught driving a motor scooter without a driver's license will be subject to a fine and that such fine will be imposed against the parents, who are responsible.

The sheriff's department is not taking this action to be rude but as a means of preserving lives and to protect the children.

The officers request the full cooperation of parents in the problem and any who have not secured driver's licenses should do so at once and stay off the scooters until they obtain them. Parents are also asked to give their children instructions in regard to driving a scooter and to impress on them not to be reckless in driving these vehicles on streets, highways and places where traffic is dense.

Oil activities moved forward the past week with about the usual number of producers and new locations announced. Other deals are pending that will put wells in wildcat territory.

Three locations have been staked by Davis & King in the Elm Creek field which will be north outposts. All are slated to explore to 4,200 feet with rotary equipment. The trio will be Davis & King Nos. 1-, 2- and 3- W. W. Parramore.

Franklin Love & Co. No. 3-Joe Willeke was finished on a pump for a 24-hour gauge of 120 barrels of 42 gravity oil.

Dallas Consolidated Petroleum Co. No. 3-W H. Pape, in the Vander-Laan-Freedman field, has been staked and will go to 4,000 feet.

Mid-Continent No. 7-Albert Sykes, in the Morris sand Sykes field, will be drilled to 4,300 feet.

Humble No. 4-Mrs. M. J. Arnold, in the Jim Adams field, will go to 4,500 feet.

Saxon Oil Co., of Abilene, has staked a location for a 2,500-foot well in the Florence field to offset its No. 4-Beddo.

Currie, Wyle No. 4-Mrs. J. F. Currie was completed the past week-end for a daily flow of 431 barrels of 46 gravity oil.

Humble No. 19-Sallie Odom, in the Fort Chadbourne field, was completed the past week-end for a 24-hour production of 410.94 barrels of 47.4 gravity. C-B Drilling Co. No. 1-Mrs. J. C. Cook, near Old Runnels, was finished last week for a daily gauge of 105 barrels of 44.2 gravity.

Thomas D. Humphrey No. 4-C. B. Spill was completed last week for 90 barrels of 40.8 gravity oil. It is located in the Elm Creek field.

Murray Petroleum No. 1C-William Stevens, in the Jim Adams field, made 209.68 barrels of 44.8 gravity oil in 24 hours after completion the past week-end.

N. P. Powell No. 8A-Sallie Odom, Fort Chadbourne field, was good for 204 barrels upon completion from a depth of 5,280 feet.

T. W. Murray No. 1-P. M. Davis has been staked for 4,500 feet drilling in the Davis (Palo Pinto) field.

T. W. Murray No. 6-Sallie Odom, in the Fort Chadbourne field, will be drilled to 5,400 feet.

The W. C. (Bill) Ester No. 1-W. H. Gross crew has been trying to free a drillstem at a depth of 4,011 feet in the Palo Pinto lime.

## Air Force Inspectors Visit Ballinger Field

An air force inspection team was in Ballinger Tuesday morning to take a look at Bruce Field and consider possible reactivation of the training school. The team, headed by Gen. Kenneth McNaughton and some half a dozen other high ranking air force officers, arrived here at 10:30 a. m.

They were met here by Fred Harman and "Toots" Womack, of Dallas, and also greeted at the field by members of the city commission and County Judge E. C. Grindstaff. They made a trip through all buildings, viewed the grounds, and asked numerous questions of Mr. Harman, bidder for the civilian operated school.

No comment was made in regard to reactivation, but Gen. McNaughton stated that local authorities would be informed of the team's decision in the near future after study was given the plan and the bids.

The group left here in a special plane to make other inspections in West Texas. Mr. Harman and party returned to Dallas in their plane Tuesday afternoon.

A large group of local citizens was at the field when the inspection team arrived.

## Final Inspection for New Sewer Lines Set This Week

Roy F. Davis, engineer on the city sewer extensions, spent the past week-end here to check up on the work and will return the first of next week to inspect the completed project.

A test was made Friday on the trunk line which will provide service to the eastern part of the city. Within a few days service will be available through this line and many have run yard lines and are ready to tie in as soon as city officials give the word. Those living west of Broadway are making connections at the present time.

Only a few extra lines are being laid this week to complete the job. One is being finished on Thirteenth and Fourteenth streets and a second two-block extension will be run to the area where the federal housing project is to be constructed. Some extra work is being done on the 400 block between Broadway and Seventh Street.

Monday the city has paid out a total of \$115,303.71 to the contractor and retained 10 per cent of material costs which it will owe when the job is accepted. This will make a total of \$128,115.23 for work and materials plus the final estimate for the extensions being made at this time.

## New Members Production Credit Guests at Banquet

New members of the Runnels county chapter of the Coleman Production Credit Corporation were guests at a banquet served last Thursday evening at the Acapulco Cafe. Along with the new members, were several special guests.

Following the Mexican dinner a program was presented to better acquaint the new members with the work of the corporation, its origin, its needs and numerous functions which are performed for members.

J. M. Pyburn, in charge of the Ballinger office, opened the meeting, reciting the history of the organization. He gave the reason for creating a credit agency to meet the needs of farmers and ranchmen. He recalled 80 years ago when land was given to those who would settle on it, live there and work the land for a period of years. At that time taxes were small, there were no cars or mechanical equipment and people raised enough for their needs.

With the era of high priced land, cars and other increased expenses came the need for credit that would fit the requirements and cover the time needed for buying, improving and operating. The first of these was the Federal Land Bank and others sprang in operation until finally the Production Credit Corporation in 1933.

J. C. Marshall, secretary-treasurer of the Coleman Production Credit Association, conducted a round-table discussion in which all guests took part. One item was what would promote material for approval of a loan application. This brought out many features of interest in considering a loan from the organization.

L. D. Campbell, assistant vice-president of the Production Credit Corp., Houston, told the audience just how the money is made available after a loan is approved by the director of the PCC. He pointed out that the Coleman office, operating in six West Texas counties, has loaned \$40,000,000 during the past 17 years with a loss of only \$6,000. He also stated that Texas farmers and ranchmen have borrowed through the agency a total of \$1,400,000,000 since the first units were established.

Young men who enlist in the national guard before reaching the age of 18½ years are given a deferment from the draft under the selective service act of 1948. Men who enlist after reaching the age of 18½ years and before receiving notice to report for pre-induction physicals, are deferred from the draft under an agreement worked out between the secretary of defense and the director of selective service. A man is not eligible to enlist in the national guard after receiving his notice for physical examination.

Company I had an extra drill Sunday, during which the indoor rifle range was used for the second time. Pfc. Victor E. Matschek fired the high score for the day and the highest score made to date, 153. The previous high was 145, shot by Cpl. John Meenen. Pvt. Clay C. Anglin fired the second best score, 138, and Pfc. NOTES**

Three contracts, totalling \$158,628, were let last week for a new junior high school building at Coleman. Work is to begin within ten days and be completed before next September. The contracts covered the construction of the building, electrical and plumbing installations. Bonds in the sum of \$180,000 were recently voted.

Small grain is gone and it is now time to start planting row crops. Rain within the next few weeks is nearly a must in this county.

At this time a number of important wildcat oil wells are being drilled in Runnels county. These wells, if producers, will open new territory and cause expanded operations. So far little production has been found south of the Colorado River. Several holes are now exploring territory near Miles and Rowena and on the Gross ranch. If these hit it will mean new fields, additional leasing and a flurry of royalty buying. Practically all land east and north of the Colorado is now in proven territory with steady development underway.

Saturday is school trustee election day. These elections usually attract little interest and as a result only a few persons take the time to visit the polling places. These positions are very important and good business men submit their names to the public to give free service. They deserve a majority vote of the people to show confidence in their ability to look after the interests of the school system. In Ballinger seven trustees are to be elected and there are only seven names on the ballot. They will manage the affairs of a greatly enlarged district because of several consolidations within the past two years. Take time off Saturday to go to the school board office and cast a ballot.
