### Mrs. Egan Given 51-County Award for Best Home-Maker

Annual awards will be made in Ballinger on May 23 for the winners in soil conservation for 51 counties in the eastern and southwestern sections of Texas.

Mrs. Tom Egan, who lives near Ballinger, will be awarded a plaque as the best home-maker of the year.

Other awards will go to contestants making the best progress in soil conservation, the best farmer, the best comeback farmer, the most unselfish service by a non-farmer, and a group of prizes for the best essays on soil conservation.

Porter Henderson, of San Angelo, a one-time resident of Ballinger, won the non-farmer service award.

Mrs. Egan's story, which won her the honor in region 2, is as follows:

"The Tom Egan place is located ten miles from Ballinger and has been owned by them for the past six years. The farm has 350 acres, with 150 acres in pasture land.

"To conserve water, one of the draws in the pasture near the house has been made into a farm tank. A large underground cistern is used to store

water for home use. An electric pump insures ease in getting the water to the house.

"The house is a six-room structure with an attic used for bedrooms for the boys. This year a new concrete porch was added on the front to make the entrance more attractive and safer.

"Entrance to the place is now over a modern cattle guard,

built to replace a gate. This spring the yard was levelled and fenced to provide space for a lawn and flower garden. A white picket fence was built with shrubs planted to screen the undesirable part of the ground.

"In preparing the lawn and vegetable garden, fertilizer was used to make the soil more productive. A metal fence is used

to protect the ground from the parking area.

"Water for the garden and barnyard is supplied from a well and windmill. This well is located in the pasture 150 yards from the yard with drainage away from the well. The house is located on the crest of a small hill with unbroken pasture land on three sides. Pines have been made to rebuild the

tool shed and re-locate the chicken house.

"A driveway passes the front of the yard and circles to the garage at the rear of the house. Two pecan trees have been planted and native mesquite trees have been left for background and wind breaks.

"With the assistance of the county home demonstration agent a landscape plan was made and shrubs have been set out to make the house and grounds more attractive. Evergreen shrubs are located around the house and scarlet running roses will be planted along one side of the fence. Other varieties of roses and flowers are planned for the garden.

"Between the driveway and barn is a basketball court for use of the 15-year-old twin boys. The eldest boy is 21 and he and his father have converted one of the barns into a grade A dairy. This building also has gutters and rainwater storage. Drainage from the dairy barn is ditched down the hill into a nearby field.

"The family is made up of father, mother and four boys. About 70 acres is planted in cotton each year and the rest of the farm is devoted to feed to take care of the 20 head of dairy cattle. The fields are terraced and 60 per cent may be irrigated. For irrigation purposes a butane pump brings water from the Colorado River.

"The second boy in the family is 20 years of age and delivers milk to San Angelo each morning, attends San Angelo College the rest of the morning and works there in the afternoon. He also has six head of registered sheep. The twin boys have one ewe and lamb and have recently purchased a Hampshire gilt for their F. F. A. project.

"The family usually keeps about 150 Austria-White hens which are taken care of by the twins. Water is piped from the well to the dairy barn, sheep corral, chicken house and brooder house.

"For heating purposes, butane is used in the house, the barn and brooder house. The farm is on an REA line which supplies lights and one electric pump. The home and all out-buildings have electric lights. A septic tank takes care of all waste water from the house.

"The family is making plans to continue conservation practices, to increase the prosperity of the family and to make their place more attractive and a better place to live."

Under the scorecard, Mrs. Egan made a total of 4480 out of a possible 5000.
