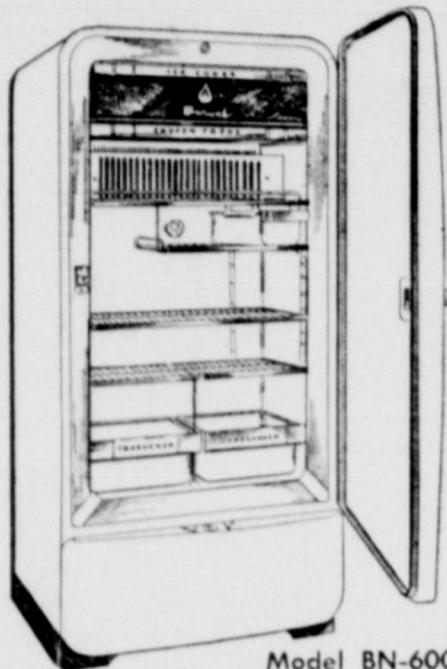

A lazy susan with mints in the bride-elect's chosen colors, pink and green, flanked by green candles in bronze hold-

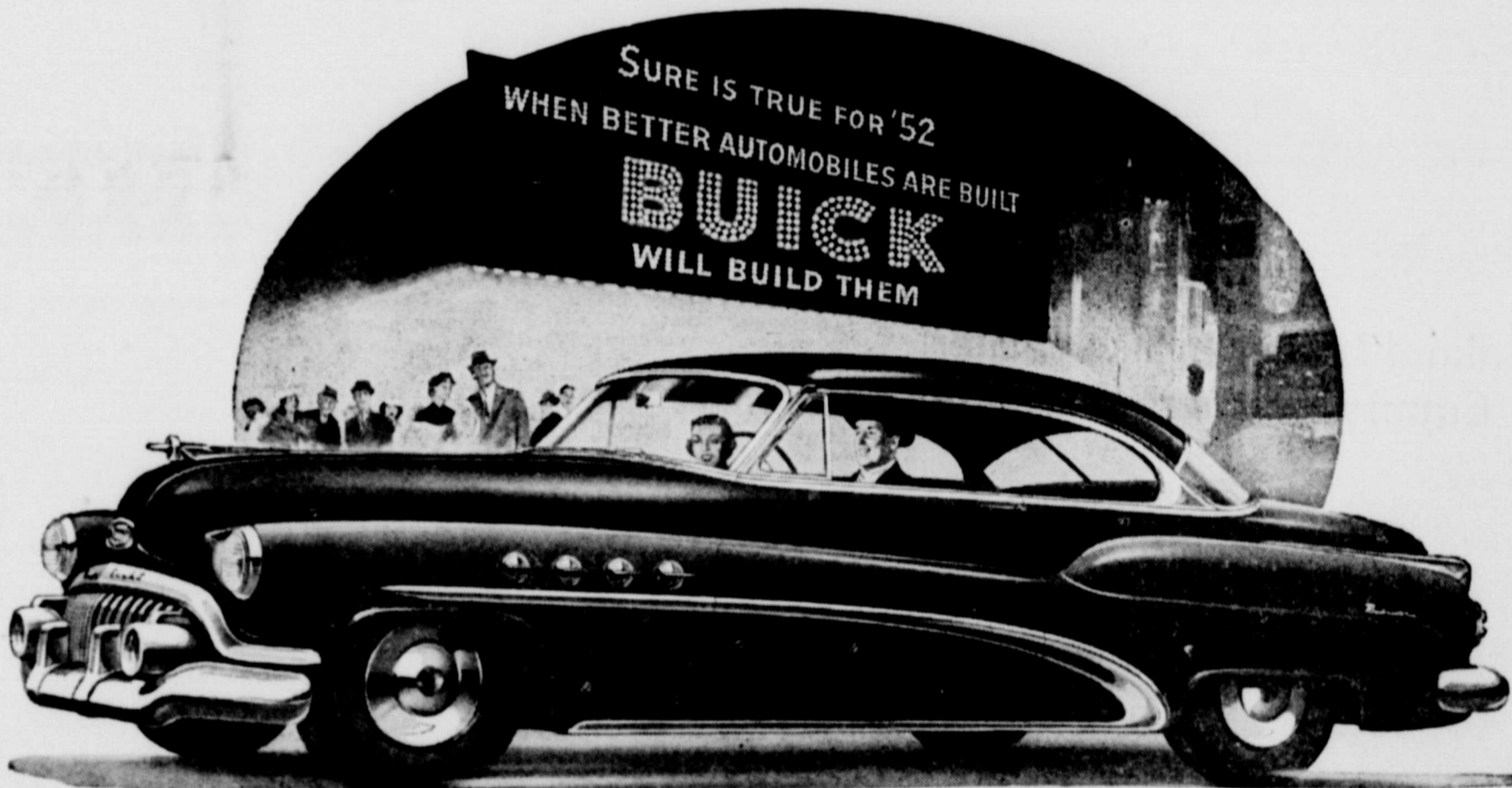

A large number of workers
launched the 1952 March of
Dimes Monday morning and
will devote the remainder of
January to the effort to raise
enough to meet requirements
of the county chapter. Teams
of men and women solicited
business houses in the opening
feature of the 1952 campaign
and first reports indicated the

results were not too good. The
Runnels county chapter of the
National Foundation for Infan-
tile Paralysis is already in debt
about \$1,300 and needs that
much plus enough to operate
on the next year and send its
pro rata to the national organ-
ization. During the past two
years the county chapter has
spent much money on cases
which developed in this county
and required hospitalization.
Money was borrowed from the
national foundation which has
not been repaid. During the
remainder of this month every
individual in Runnels county
is asked to contribute to the
March of Dimes and help in
the fight to curb polio.

January 27 to February 2 has
been designated as Highway
Week in Texas and people are

asked to inform themselves of
the accomplishments of the
state highway department.
Since the department was
established in 1917, a total of
\$1,400,000,000 has been spent
under its direction and a
44,000-mile network of roads
constructed. As soon as orga-
nized, the department was con-
cerned with building a state-
wide connected road system.
This was followed by a program
in which these traffic arteries
were paved. Now the arterial
system of highways measures
23,000 miles. At the end of
World War II, a farm-to-
market road program was
begun. Present plans call for
construction of 21,500 miles of
this kind of road and 16,000
miles have already been com-
pleted. In view of the com-
mendable record of the depart-
ment in the field of planning,
construction and financing, it
is fitting that tribute be paid
to the wisdom and vision of
the Texans who originated the
work 35 years ago.

The Winters fire department
will be host to the spring meet-
ing of the Hill Country Fire-
men's Association on February
12. Representative Harley Sad-

Supt. J. L. Carroll, of Bronte,

for that salary. Mr. Carroll
urged better attendance in the
hope that this would warrant
the adding of two teachers
next September.

Coleman city schools were

holiday and improve health
conditions. The closing was
announced Thursday morning
when 160 were absent because
of sickness. Supt. Terrell Graves
stated that classwork would be
resumed on Monday and urged

parents to assist by not letting
students become exposed to
influenza, which had reached
epidemic stage. Other schools
in Coleman county were open
but had poor attendance.
The Santa Anna school board
let a contract last week for
construction of a new grade
school at a cost of \$150,000.
Don Smith, of Sweetwater, was
given the contract. The new
school will have 15 classrooms
plus a combination auditorium
and cafeteria. The architecture
and material will match the
junior high school, located on
the same campus. Bonds were
approved in an election last
fall.

Eastland county peanut
growers were represented in a
recent important meeting at
Washington by Joe Bob Brown-
ing, of Gorman. The meeting
was sponsored by the Ameri-
can Farm Bureau Association
to consider the future of this
crop, find out the needs of the
growers and seek beneficial
legislation. Growers have asked
that the excess oil program be
repealed as soon as possible. A
second meeting will be held
with nine producers, nine pro-
cessors and nine consumers as
delegates.

Rex Jennings, former man-
ager of the Sulphur Springs
Chamber of Commerce, has
been employed by the Brown-
wood Chamber of Commerce.

On February 16 Jennings will
succeed Ray Hedges, who has
accepted the position of indus-
trial manager for the Beau-
mont Chamber of Commerce.
Jennings has been in chamber
of commerce work for a num-
ber of years and has made a
good record.

Comanche organizations are
conducting a "pay your poll
tax" campaign. Last week they
announced a total of 1,853
receipts issued and have set a
goal of 4,000 by the end of
January. In last general elec-
tion year 3,860 were issued in
the county and last year the
total was only 2,750. Efforts
will be made to get all men
and women of voting age to
pay their poll taxes and special
emphasis is being given to those
who are 21 years of age but
need exemption certificates.

Gustine, in Comanche county,
suffered a \$25,000 fire loss last
week when a two-story busi-
ness house burned and adjoin-
ing buildings were damaged.
The fire originated in the rear
of the Palace Theatre. The
theatre was not open at the
time and no cause can be given
for the blaze. A cafe and the
Masonic hall were damaged.

Ablene citizens in a mass
meeting last week pledged
purchase additional acreage
needed for the reactivation of
the Tye AFB. It was stated that
3,500 more acres would be
required for permanent reactiva-
tion of the base. The plan
now comprises 1,530 acres. The
kind of installation contem-
plated would station about
6,000 officers and men at the
base. The payroll was estimated
at \$1,500,000 per month.
Mathis Field, San Angelo, has
been selected as a site for 2,000
airmen during "Operation

Longhorn" to be conducted
during a six-weeks period in
March and April. Plans call for
basing 105 aircraft at San
Angelo, many of them various
types of jets. The contingent
for the San Angelo field will
come from Fort Bragg, North
Carolina.

About 100 employees were
on duty last week at the Brady
Aviation Corp. plant, located at
Curtis Field. Setting up of the
factory is continuing and a
number of smaller assemblies
will be operating within a
short time which will call for
additions to the personnel. The
