## Only Half of County's Red Cross Quota Given

Red Cross workers in Runnels county have raised about half of the 1952 quota, according to reports received here. There are a large number of communities from which no reports have come and probably will not turn in any money until they have completed the drive.

Ballinger, with a quota of \$3,000, had contributed \$1,674 Tuesday morning. J. G. Tuckey, city chairman, stated that women making door-to-door canvass had done excellent work and had been responsible for much of the money received to date.

Workers in the downtown blocks will be asked to cover their territories again and see those who were missed on the first solicitation. The campaign is dragging far behind the

amount needed if the quota is to be reached.

Since last week the Brookshier community went over the top on its quota.

Hagan-Barnett turned in \$97 to over-subscribe its quota of \$75.

Norton has turned in a donation of \$208 to exceed its quota of \$200.

Tuesday morning cash turned in here and at Winters totalled about \$3,100, to apply on the quota of \$6,000.

Leaders probably will meet this week-end to make plans for additional work. Every effort will be made to reach the 1952 quota of \$6,000 and any person who has been missed by solicitors and who will make a contribution is asked to mail a check to the Red Cross chapter at Ballinger or leave it at one of the local banks.

with a dance last Saturday night. The entire week was a success and provided some real fun for the entire student body.

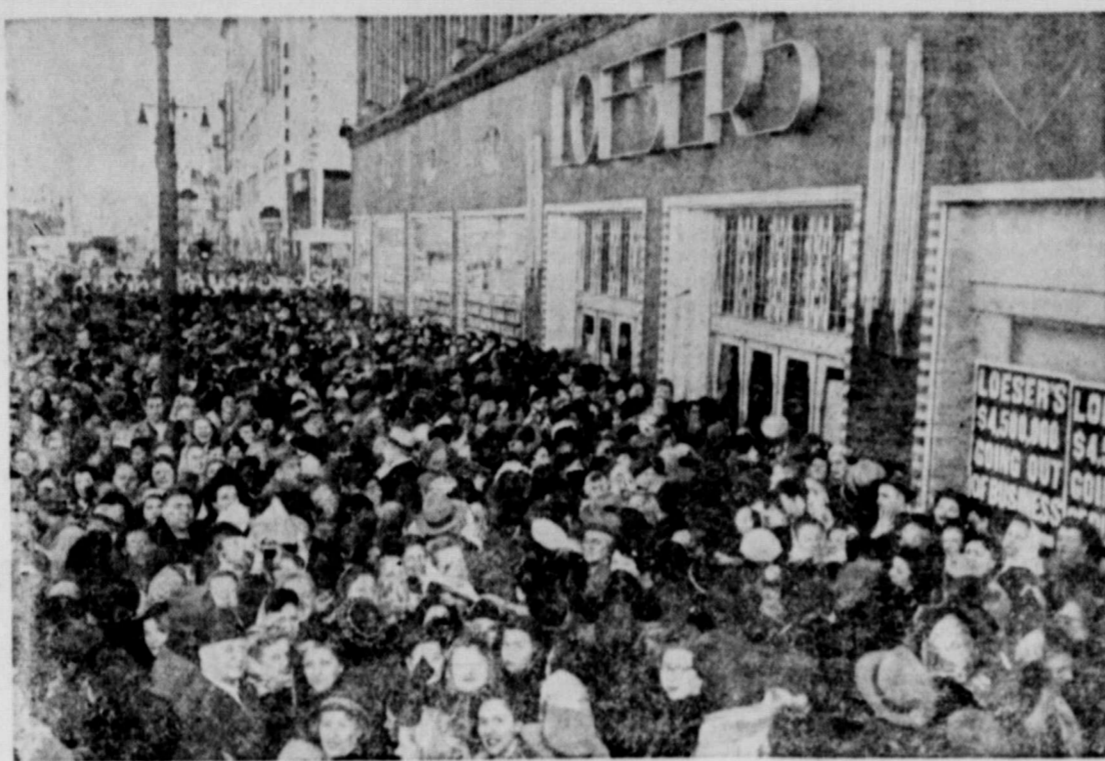
## Baptist Church Youth Director Coming April 7

Runnels county 4-H club boys have attended or were interested in six livestock shows held in the state during 1952. They included the Runnels county show, the Houston, Fort Worth, San Antonio, San Angelo and Abilene shows. Total sales and winnings were \$2,931.

At the Houston show, Obie Dee Bradford sold two capons for \$20.96.

At Fort Worth, Robert Pruser placed and sold a Short-horn calf for \$465.50. Obie Dee Bradford received \$10.25 in premiums on his breeding chickens.

Charles Hoelscher showed the champion Hampshire barrow and Alpheus Hill showed the reserve champion pen of 3 Hampshire barrows in the San Antonio show. Runnels county club boys brought back \$1,257.50 in sales and premiums from San Antonio. Their winnings were:

## Herring Home and Contents Entirely Destroyed by Fire

The home of Mr. and Mrs. Loyd Herring, 1309 Eighth Street, was completely destroyed by fire about 4 o'clock Saturday morning. Neighbors were awakened by the fire when the entire front of the house and roof were discovered in flames.

Mr. and Mrs. Herring and children left the house through a bedroom window and were unable to save anything from the burning structure.

Firemen got the alarm and all equipment was rushed to the scene. The fire siren failed to function for about 15 minutes after the alarm was turned in and firemen were called by telephone and were on hand when the pumps arrived to take care of connections and put water on the flames.

Police cars with sirens blowing made a trip over most of the city to awaken firemen who had not received phone calls.

The blaze had gained much headway when it was discovered and there was no chance to save any portion of the building. The destruction was so complete that it was impossible to tell how the fire originated other than it started in the front part of the house.

## HOSPITAL-SURGICAL PLAN IS ANNOUNCED

The company was incorporated under the laws of Texas in 1908. Its policies have liberal coverage for hospital, hospital expenses and surgical bills. Many families have received benefits for hospitalization and surgical fees.

Accredited enrollment representatives direct from the division office will interview residents of Ballinger and other towns in the county and give those who qualify the opportunity to enroll.

Workmen are digging the pipes from the concrete floors and a complete new system will be installed.

## Six Producers Reported In County During Week

Oil activities moved along in Runnels county the past week with a number of completions and several wells started.

Geochemical Surveys No. 1-G. M. Wood, in the eastern part of the county, has been completed for a daily rating of 322.66 barrels of 44 gravity oil. Top of pay was encountered at 3,838 feet.

Miami Operating Co. No. 1-C. L. James flowed at the rate of 25 barrels of 43 gravity oil on a 30-minute drillstem test. The well is located in the McMillan sand field and pay was topped at 2,458 feet.

Murray Petroleum Co. No. 2-M. Hunter, in the Jim Adams field, was finalized for a daily potential of 76.49 barrels of 43.4 gravity oil.

Pan-American No. 1-N. L. Stevens has been gauged at 171 barrels of 44.3 gravity oil. The location is in the Ballinger Palo Pinto field.

B. F. Phillips, Jr., No. 2-Burrus is a one-location western extension of the Cree-Sykes field. When completed the daily flow was 585.06 barrels of 43 gravity oil. Production is in the upper Gardner and top of pay is 3,874 feet.

Humble No. 1-G. W. Poe flowed at the rate of 744 barrels of 44.8 gravity oil when completed in the Goens lime of the Strawn at 4,442 feet.

G. W. Strake and others No. 1-Curry and David has been staked and will be drilled to 5,200 feet. The location is in the northwestern part of the county.

Union Sulphur No. 2B-A. S. Bright, 1 3/4 miles east of the Cree-Sykes field, is projected for 4,500 feet.

C. U. Bay No. 1-O. O. McWilliams has been approved for 3,970 feet. The location is 2 1/4 miles east and slightly south of Crews.

Giddens & Shriver, of Dallas, No. 1-Ed Kasberg is a central Runnels county wildcat, a short distance southwest of Ballinger.

S. C. Herring Drilling Co. No. 1-D. Cook, in the Hull-Dobbe field, will be drilled to 4,500 feet.

Mid-Continent No. 8-J. A. Blackwell is projected for 4,500 feet. It is a 3/4-mile northwestern extension of the Cree-Sykes field.

## COUNTY RECEIVES SPOTTED SHOWERS

Spotted showers fell in Runnels county Monday night and were immediately followed by a dust storm. The heaviest rain was reported from the Valley Creek area, where the gauge at the Dan Woodroof place showed three-quarters of an inch and water stood in fields.

A quarter of an inch fell at Rowena and other communities reported showers.

### Biggest Bomber Subject of Talk For Rotary Club

Walter S. Lindsey representative of Consolidated-Vultee Aircraft Corp., Fort Worth, was guest speaker at the Ballinger Rotary Club meeting Tuesday and also presented a recent picture made by the March of Time.

Mr. Lindsey, a former General Motors Corp. official, is now with the contract department of the plant making the biggest bomber in the world, the B-36. He assists in purchasing needed materials and also serves between the contractor and the government.

The speaker gave some facts about the giant bomber from the time it was started on paper in 1941 until the present when an unnamed number are stationed at airfields all over the country and in foreign countries, and briefed so that it can drop a bomb load on any target city in the world and return to its base non-stop.

### Mrs. Sturges Reviews Cronin New Book

"Adventures in Two Worlds," by A. J. Cronin, was reviewed by Mrs. J. C. Sturges, Jr. of San Angelo, at 4:30 o'clock Wednesday afternoon at the Ballinger High School auditorium. The review was sponsored by the Fannie Stephens Study Club.

A. J. Cronin describes in this new book how he became a novelist by an act of God in the form of gastric disturbances. He was a fashionable London physician, complete with Saville Row clothes and West End practice, when he developed the duodenal ulcer. He took stock of himself and told his wife that he was going to sell his practice and write a book.

After sweating over his manuscript in the Scottish Highlands, he hopelessly sent it to the publishers. The novel was "Hatter's Castle," one of the best-sellers, and Cronin was on his way, undoubtedly convinced of the salutary effect of a chronic ulcer on a man's career.

The journey was not easy. Cronin was a poor man when he graduated from medical school of the University of Glasgow.

Cronin touches the heart effectively in the latter pages of his narrative, when he tells how he found, at the pinnacle of success, that his life contained the same emptiness it did when he was prescribing pills in Eaton Square. He was born a Catholic, and had always observed the outward practice of his faith, but had drifted to where religion was something entirely outside his inner experience. With a winning humility, he relates how he took stock of his spiritual life and came to the conclusion that the greatest achievements are not found in worldly goods and temporal fame, but in the victories of the soul. He returned, step by step, to the faith of his childhood, and, in doing so, found a happiness he did not believe existed.

"Adventures in Two Worlds"

is entertaining throughout, but in the last pages it becomes a very human, moving document.

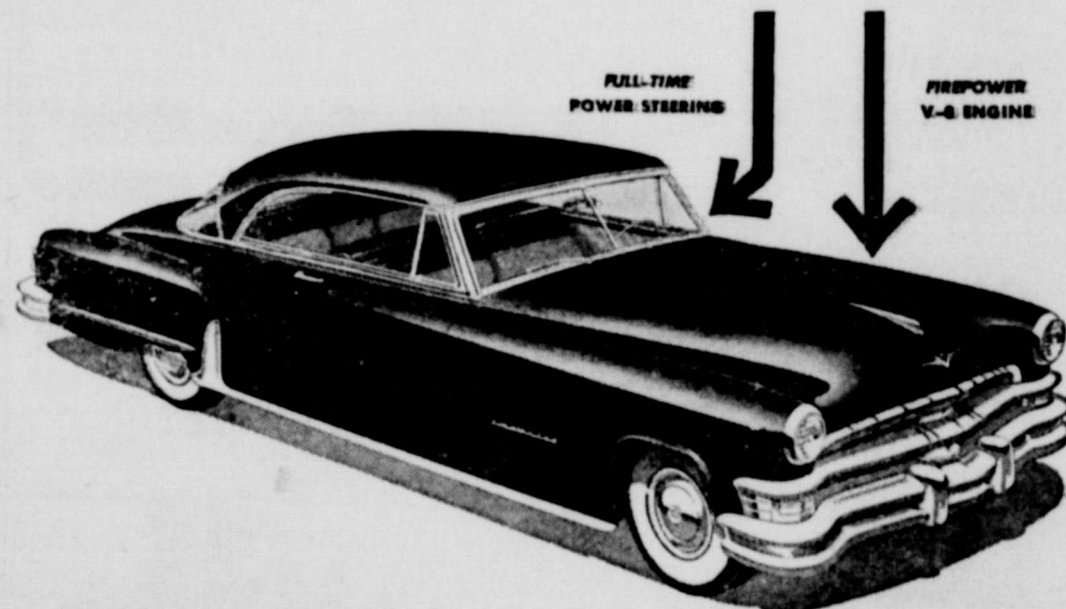

This region has been getting more than its share of dirt lately. Dust storms are an every-other-day occurrence and probably will continue until rains come. The dry weather is being reflected in all businesses and a definite retrenchment in spending is reported by local retailers. Most farmers of the county have their land ready for 1952 crops but no planting has been done because of the lack of moisture. A long wet spell with some heavy downpours for stock water would be most welcome.

They are joining in an effort to make highways and streets safer and reduce the large number of traffic accidents.

The commissioners' court is pushing the plan to beautify the courthouse lawn and at a meeting last week authorized more water lines to make it possible to get water in sufficient amount at all parts of the grounds. If present plans are carried out the park will be a beauty spot in the summer with grass, flowers and shrubs amid the many large trees. Much work has already been accomplished in trimming trees, removing dead ones, building flower beds and in breaking the ground for planting grass. Some kind of grass that will grow under the shade trees and stay green the year round will be planted. All citizens are asked to cooperate and walk on the sidewalks instead of wearing paths across the planted area.
