Winters Blizzards Win District Championship

The Winters Blizzards became champions of district 9AA Friday night when they handed the Ballinger Bearcats the most severe drubbing in recent years in this annual football classic.

The game was witnessed by a crowd of more than 4,000 fans who crammed every available space in the park to get a view of the gridiron.

The game was not long in getting underway. Ballinger won the toss and received at the north end of the field. The kickoff was fumbled and Winters recovered on the Ballinger 28-yard line. Four plays later Lee Wood went over from the 3 for the first touchdown and Bill Buchanan added the extra point.

The Bearcats got back into the game quickly. They received and carried to the Winters 40 where Jerry Bell spotted Bobby Bird and hit him with a 39-yard pass, good for a touchdown. Buddy Clark added the extra point and the game was all even.

The fumbling hazard was with the Bearcats and after an exchange of kicks, they fumbled on their own 32-yard line with Winters covering. Wood turned in three good runs and went over for the touchdown from the three-yard line. Buchanan's kick was partially blocked and no good.

Ballinger received and the big break of the game occurred. The locals let the ball roll free and a Winters man dived on it to gain possession on the Ballinger 17-yard line. Two running plays gained slight yardage and Jones pitched a short pass to Holland in the end zone for the counter. Buchanan again kicked the extra point.

Ballinger again went to the air. Bell chucking a 40-yard

heave to Buddy Clark who took it on the goal line for the second and final score for the Bearcats. Clark's kick was to the left of the uprights.

Winters sent players into pay dirt three more times to run up the huge score. A pass Jonas to Wood, put the ball on the Ballinger 3 and Wood carried over on the next play. Buchanan kicked.

Brevard took a Winters kick, gave ground to his own 30 and fumbled as he was hit hard by a swarm of tacklers. Jonas again passed to Holland for the score. The kick was low.

The final score came in the last few minutes of play when J. T. Craig broke into the clear and raced 22 yards for a score and Buchanan added the extra point from placement.

The Blizzards were right in all departments of the game. Their hard running backs piled up a total of 312 yards rushing to only 105 for the Bearcats. Winters attempted 4 passes and completed 4 for a total of 47 yards and two of them 50 touchdowns. Ballinger threw 23 passes, completed 9 for 154 yards. Winters intercepted one Ballinger pass. First down showed Winters 20, Ballinger 1.

Winters was penalized 16 time for 80 yards. Most of these, however, came in the closing minutes as substitutes were sent into the game, causing too much time out. Ballinger received 4 penalties for 39 yards.



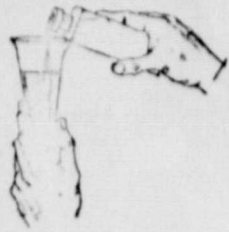
ATNIPP TO GO ON SPECIAL TRIP WITH STUDENT GROUP
