





San Angelo field office of the that thousands of men and women who served in the armed forces since the end of World war II are now insured unde old age and survivors insurance

All military and naval service ince September, 1940, is now overed by the social security act. Before the passage of the amendment, no credit could be given for service after July 24

Mr Clark explaned that the new rule means that each serviceman is credited, on h social security account, with \$160 for each month or part of month that he was on active iuty. The credits will not be posted on his account now o at any time in the future but redit will be established by presentation of the serviceman' lischarge, which must be other han dishonorable. Women who served in the armed forces are also eligible for this benefit.
