Four Ballinger High School students and their sponsor, Miss Maryvatt Smith, will attend the meeting of the Texas Association of Student Councils at Lubbock, March 28-29. These students are Howard Hamner, Jerry Bell, Angie Stasney and Pat Tisdale. They will have charge of a discussion group on common problems and exchange ideas.

These four represent the entire student body. The local Student Council was organized at Ballinger High School in 1949. Starting with a small group of representatives, it has grown to be a substantial part of the school body.

According to its constitution, it was organized to provide opportunity for student cooperation and participation in school government to provide a forum for the exchange of student opinion, to act as a representative body for the students to sponsor school activities for the general welfare of the school, to aid in promoting better school policies, to develop proper school spirit, to develop respect for school property, to aid in promoting recreational activities for all students and to better understand the rights and duties of good citizenship.

Council members carry out this multi-purpose program in five ways:

duced from their land.

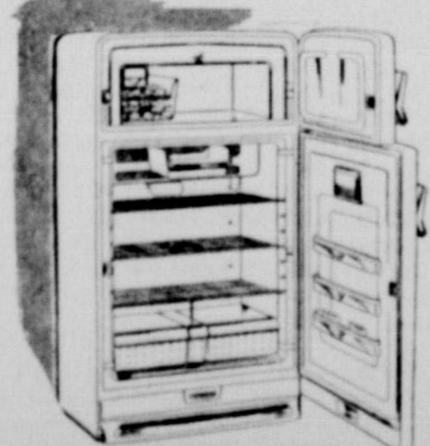

### WEST TEXAS NOTES

That long hoped-for spring rain has finally come to Runnels county and everybody is happy. Farmers and ranchmen received the relief they had been needing and can start making plans for grazing livestock, planning spring planting and many other activities. The moisture hit during the lambing season for most sheepmen and grass and weeds will soon provide enough feed for ewes to help them give sufficient milk for the young lambs. The quickest results were seen in small grain. Most farmers have fairly large acreages of wheat and oats and while they have grazed heavily, grain is still in fair condition and will grow rapidly since the warm rain. Heavy showers to fill streams, surface tanks and lakes would climax the present situation.

Citizens who hold poll tax receipts will have the opportunity to use them twice in April. School trustees will be elected in all districts on April 4. In Ballinger the election has been called and two men will be named for three-year terms. On the following Tuesday, April 7, city officials will be named. This voting is to select a mayor and two commissioners who will look after the city's business the next two years. Civic organizations are urging that all eligible go to the polls on these two dates and cast ballots.

A celebration should be held on the date of the opening of the municipal swimming pool. This has been a sought-after project for many years and with one of the largest and most modern pools in this section finished a big program would be appropriate. Ballinger Lions are also working on a project to provide a large concrete slab for dancing and games near the pool. These features and other improvements already made will bring large crowds and at times there will be a parking problem. City officials are giving this study and probably will soon evolve a plan for car parking during the summer. The park is well equipped with picnic tables and seats, barbecue pits and playground equipment, and when swimming, dancing, games and a kiddie wading pool are added, crowds will be larger and parking must be solved.
