## Pancake-Sausage Meal and Jury Brings Indictments and Bonds Set for All At Legion Hall Monday

The American Legion and Auxiliary are ready for their pancake and sausage supper Monday evening in the club-house at Bruce Field. The serving will start at 6:00 p. m. and be continued until everyone has been fed. The bingo games will be continued until all prizes are awarded.

A large number of Legionnaires will be on the job Saturday afternoon and Sunday getting everything ready for the big party. Tables and chairs will be arranged to take care of 400 customers at a time. Equipment will be set up in the big kitchen to cook about 400 hotcakes at a time and the hot army stove will be made ready to cook the sausages and keep them hot until served. Coffee makers will be ready for action, the bingo stand built and seated and approximately 100 Legionnaires and Auxiliary members will report for work Monday.

J. K. (Jake) Canada, representative of Pillsbury Flour Co. will arrive early Monday and be ready to mix the batter for the hot cakes.

A representative of the Duncan Coffee Co. will also be on the job with two large percolators to make and serve Maryland Club coffee to all diners.

Harold Huesner will be present to dispense Domino sugar and will have individually wrapped soft a. hard sugar. It will not be limited but is

wrapped to better take the product.

Gandy's Dairy will supply milk and cream.

Mrs. Tucker's Cloverleaf will be used for each table.

Pennick & Ford will represent Vermont Maid maple.

Mayfield Paper Co. will furnish napkins and plates.

China plates will be used for regular service. A full dishwashing crew will be on the job to keep the stacks for the cooks.

Those who have purchased tickets in advance will find a ticket box near the entrance door of dining room. With each get goes a free package of bury pancake mix.

Each customer will receive a full one-pound of pure pork con. sausage. Those who can't eat additional hot cakes may have them and as many as they want. Girls will be on duty the time to keep the coffee cups filled.

Bingo prizes have been contributed by merchants and every one of considerable value. A chest of silver containing eight of each item, an electric steam iron, a rocking chair, beautiful blankets and many other beautiful gifts are to be awarded.

The price of each ticket is 75 cents.

## Postmasters Thank All Who Helped in Convention Here

Postmasters of the 21st Texas district were here Saturday for their annual convention, approximately 75 being present for the opening of the morning program.

Sessions opened at the court house at 10:00 a. m. with welcome from Mayor Charles Hambrick and Joe McCauley, chamber of commerce manager. County Judge W. H. Rumpy delivered the main talk at the morning period.

The noon lunch was served at the junior high school cafeteria and this was followed by a program there.

E. E. English, postal inspector, in the principal address of the day gave postmasters much information. He said the post office department was doing its best to streamline operations and continue to render the best of service. He also told the postmasters that their full cooperation was needed and would be expected.

At the business session Pat Warren, Coleman postmaster, was elected president of the organization for the ensuing year. No town extended an invitation for the next convention and the place will be decided by the president later.

A resolution passed extended the thanks of the association to Ballinger and a number of organizations here for their fine cooperation in holding the 1953 convention. The formal statement thanked city officials, the chamber of commerce, Judge Rumpy, Mrs. W. E. Elkins, school officials, merchants for door prizes and the local postmaster.

Special appreciation was expressed to Miss Sue Underwood for readings and to Jimmy Hamner for piano numbers.

## Various Violations Occupy Attention Of Law Enforcers

Runnels county law enforcement officers were kept busy all day Monday and part of Tuesday investigating violations of the past week-end.

Four Runnels county boys were charged with stealing watermelons from a field west of Ballinger, piling them along the side of the road and running over them with a car. Three paid fines of \$20 each for property damage and must pay the farmer for the value of the melons. Two of the boys were out-of-the-county residents and will be tried later.

George McNeely was arrested at Coleman for officers here and paid a fine of \$28.80 for "hot" checking.

Three drunks were arrested the past week-end and fines were assessed Monday.

Lonnie Robbin was turned over to the Dallas county sheriff on a charge of car theft there. He was arrested here last week.

Joe Franklin Crane, of Coleman, was fined and remanded to jail for three days on a charge of driving while intoxicated.

Florence Bennie Hoelscher was fined \$72.50 and assessed a three-day jail sentence for driving while intoxicated.

Philip Lugo was fined \$48.80 and ordered to jail for 60 days on a charge of aggravated assault.

Kenneth Allred was arrested at Abilene for local officers on a charge of "hot" checking here.

Quentin Melton was arrested at Coleman for non-payment of a fine here. He paid the fine of \$156.10 owed this county.

Bill Carter was arrested here last week on a charge of car theft in Concho county.

Jerry Lee Green was arrested for non-payment of a fine and also was charged with disturbing the peace in Concho county.

## Ballinger Labor Camp To be Improved Soon

A meeting was held Tuesday afternoon to make plans for immediate improvement at the Ballinger labor camp. The group appointed to serve as a labor camp board met at the chamber of commerce office to discuss the needs and decided to start work at once.

Ed Curry, chairman of the chamber of commerce retail committee, was named chairman of the board. Joe McCauley, a manager was appointed executive secretary. Others include John A. Barton, county agent; Frank Kemp, chairman of the agricultural committee; David Batts and Walter Egge-meyer, farmers; and Mrs. C. P. Bailey, of the United Council of Church Women.

Any person who has scrap lumber that will be donated to this cause is asked to contact

Mr. McCauley. The first work to be done will be repairing the sheds, building toilets, installing water in showers and minor alterations.

The city pays the rent on the land where the camp is located and furnishes water. Clyde Chapman, county commissioner, has cleared off the grounds and provided wood for heating and cooking.

A number of cotton picking crews have already stopped at the camp this year. Conditions there are not good at the present time and for this reason the work will be pushed as fast as possible so that laborers coming into the area can find shelter and other necessary accommodations.

A large number of farmers in this section need pickers at once and the labor camp is a necessity.

## New Street Sweeper Is Purchased by City

The Ballinger city commission at its meeting Tuesday purchased two pieces of equipment, approved building permits and transacted routine business.

A contract was let for an Austin-Western street sweeper. This firm was low bidder for the new equipment at \$8,718.50 with an allowance of \$1,018.50 for the old sweeper.

The representative of the Austin-Western Co. stated that the order would be called in by telephone and should be here and in operation within 15 days or before. City officials stressed the need and asked for shipment as quickly as possible.

City officials have watched a number of sweepers in action in recent weeks and are pleased that the Austin-Western was low. This type of sweeper carries a large water tank to spray in front of the 5-foot broom. The dirt and dust is taken from the pavement into a hopper and hauled away by trucks. As soon as the new machine arrives it will be operated on all city pavement.

The commissioners also approved the purchase of a two-ton International truck from the Ballinger Truck & Tractor Co. The truck was bought for \$2,205.93 and will come equipped for butane gas.

The current tax rolls were approved and signed by the commission. The total value of properties on the rolls is \$4,159,306 which is \$36,197 more than last year's total.

A tax rate of \$1.90 on the \$100 has been set for this year and should net the city \$70,036.

Two building permits were approved.

Mrs. Freeman Owens received approval for a permit for \$200 for an addition to a residence on Broadway between East and Largent avenues.

A \$150 permit was approved for Louie Thompson for construction of a garage and store-room.

Oranhood, will begin a series of sermons on the general theme: "I Love the Church Because..." Next Sunday the subject will be "Because God planned it for My Good." In each sermon he will show by the scriptures and by human experience a category of values of the church.

At 7:30 p. m. after varied worship periods led by members and groups in the church, the pastor will preach a series of sermons on "The Christian Way of Life." These are based on the Sermon on the Mount as reported in Matthew.

Herman Price, Sunday school superintendent, announces one change in the organization. Mrs. J. W. Longenette has resigned as superintendent of the elementary school in order to give more time to the office of president of the Christian Women's Fellowship. Mrs. Oranhood will direct the elementary school beginning next Sunday.

## Quarterback Club Helps to Finance Chartered Busses

The Bearcat Quarterback Club has guaranteed funds for the Ballinger high school football team to travel first-class to and from all out-of-town games. The club will advance \$230 while the school authorities will furnish \$105 so that the Bearcats will have chartered busses for all five of their out-of-town games this year.

These trips will be to San Saba, Lake View, Coleman, Brady and Winters.

Meetings of the Quarterback Club are held each Wednesday night beginning at 8:15. A picture of the game the week before is shown at each meeting.

Club officials have set a goal of 300 members for the year and all fans are urged to join. Annual dues are \$2.00. The club stands ready at all times to assist coaches and school officials in any way it can.

Money for the transportation costs will be taken up by free will offerings at meetings.

## Cemetery Board Sets October 13 Work Day

Directors of the Ballinger Cemetery Association are calling on all citizens of Ballinger and others interested to give one afternoon of work on October 13. This announcement was made by Oscar Harbor, president of the association, after a meeting the past week-end.

Mr. Harbor stated that the work project would be started at 1:00 p. m. and that all local stores would be asked to close until 4:30 p. m. and permit all employees to help. Each person is asked to bring his own tools and all merchants who can are asked to furnish a pick-up or truck.

During the past summer Evergreen Cemetery has grown up in weeds and grass and is in very bad shape. The association has had very limited funds and has been unable to provide enough labor to do the work.

The directors believe every Ballingerite has a great amount of pride in the cemetery and will be willing to cooperate in the project to get burial grounds in good condition. The directors believe that when this is accomplished they will be able to maintain the cemetery.

Delinquent taxes owed the association have reached a staggering amount. Many have not paid their annual taxes or dues and for this reason, the task can not be done by one employee. The officers point out that a few years ago the cemetery was smaller and that more people looked after their own lots. Payment of annual taxes also was much better than in recent years.

The lots that are covered by perpetual care are also a problem for the directors. The \$100 paid for perpetual care cannot be spent, but is to be invested and only the interest or income from that investment can be used in looking after the lot. This investment brings only about \$3 per year at best and is not sufficient to give care to a lot for 12 full months.

## Two Oil Producers And Gasser Listed For County's Fields

Texas Pacific Coal & Oil Co. No. 3-Walter Pettitree, in the Hull-Dobbs field, has been completed for a daily flowing potential of 211.76 barrels of 40 gravity oil. Top of pay is 3,940 feet.

Columbian Fuel Corp. No. 3-Val T and J. T. Bilups has been brought in for a daily gauge of 425,000 cubic feet of gas. The well is located nine miles northeast of Winters.

Vincent & Welch No. 2-Myrtle Taylor has been finished for a daily pumping potential of 65.76 barrels of 47 gravity oil. The location is in the South Crews (Gardner) field.

Burt Oil Co. has filed an application for its No. 1-W. H. Schwartz, projected for 4,100 feet. The location is three miles east of Crews.

Pan-American Production Co. will drill its No. 1-G. Nunn, 4 1/2 miles north of Ballinger. An application has been filed for a 2,500-foot try.

Gilliam Drilling Co. No. 1-Ash-ton, in the Beddo, East (Serratt) field, is to be drilled to 4,200 feet.

J. W. King, Jr., No. 1-W. W. Farley, six miles southeast of Winters, will explore to 2,750 feet.

## Supervisor for Soil Zone to be Elected

Clarence Spill, secretary of the Runnels county soil conservation district, stated this week that final plans have been made to elect a supervisor for sub-division 5. The election will be held at 2:00 p. m. Tuesday, October 6, at the Dale school.

All people who own land in this area are eligible to vote. The zone is bounded on the west by the Ballinger-Winters highway, on the north by the Winters-Content road, on the east by the Coleman county line and on the south by the Ballinger-Coleman highway.

A conservation program will also be presented during the election. All of the district's conservation equipment will be there and leaders will explain operations. Woodrow Hoffman will talk on guar and John Barton will discuss increased production. After the election a short field trip will be made to see grass seeding demonstrations.

A few farmers indicated they would wait until after frost and use strippers in their fields. L. L. Williams stated Wednesday morning that a number of pickers were coming into this section but that many were moving on without taking jobs here.

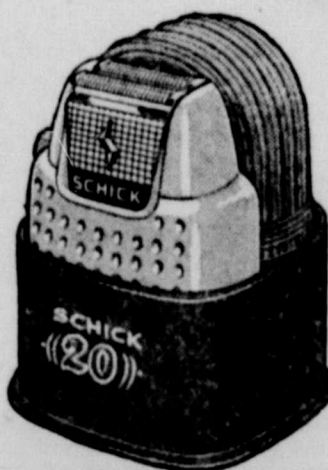

NOTES**

Runnels county law enforcement officers go far beyond just performing their duty in many cases. Every week juveniles are helped with a lecture, a second chance to mend their ways, and often receive assistance from boys' organizations. Last week a blind youth came to the sheriff's office and before the day passed had been placed in a job where he could make his room, board and some spending money. Many of these details take much time but are not required of the officers, who are human, however, and always trying to help boys and young men get out of trouble.

The cotton harvest is moving slowly in this section, mainly because large crews of pickers have not been arriving here as in previous years. Leaders think the movement will head this way when picking is finished in South Texas. Cotton is opening fast and according to a report by ginner last week pickers are needed now. A committee has been designated to make improvements at the Ballinger migrant labor center. The United Council of Church Women investigated the camp in connection with its migrant labor study and found conditions very bad. City and county officials were enlisted in the effort to improve the facilities and this is expected to cause more laborers to stop here. Some mechanical pickers and strippers are being operated but only in fields where plants have been defoliated.

Runnels county boys who belong to 4-H clubs and F. F. A. chapters are getting their livestock projects underway for the spring shows. Some animals have been on feed all summer and are to be exhibited at the State Fair this month. Others were bought by the boys with the view of having them ready for shows which start in January. In the past farmer boys of this county have set some excellent records and with the planning and assistance of their leaders are expected to offer even stiffer competition this year.

The Ballinger Chamber of Commerce has designated November 2 and 3 as Dollar Days. The cooperation of a large number of business firms will be sought in offering special values for the two days, and it is hoped to draw large shopping crowds here. Preliminary work for the organization of the city-wide sales event is being done this month and after this is cleared one of

The Rowena Lions Club is continuing its campaign to raise money with which to purchase a fire truck for the community. In a special softball game, played there last week, proceeds of \$102 went to the fund. Members have been gathering scrap iron to sell and securing money from other sources. As soon as enough money is on hand an order will be placed for the fire fighting equipment.

The Comanche County Telephone Cooperative Association has just been granted a loan of \$866,000 for the establishment of rural telephone service in the area. The money will be used for purchasing exchanges at Sidney, Procter and Beattie these special events will be presented each month.

and the building of exchanges at Newburg and Duster. The association will also build some 678 miles of lines to serve the 712 patrons who have already signed up and others along the lines who are expected to take the service. Work on the project will be started within three months.

The West Texas Utilities Co. has announced a cooking school to be held at Bronte on October 5. The electric kitchen will be set up in the American Legion hall and Mrs. Jeanie V. Wynne will give the lectures and demonstrations. Invitations have been extended to all women of the Bronte section and good attendance is expected. Recipes and favors will be given and all the food prepared during the demonstrations will be served or given to those attending.

Brownwood citizens voted heavily last week in opposing the offer of the Lone Star Gas Co. to purchase the distribution system from the city. At the same time they voted in favor of authorizing \$250,000 in bonds for the city to use in securing an adequate gas supply. The Lone Star had offered the city \$225,000 for the system and would agree to give complete service if the sale was made. City officials have obtained an option for gas from the Sidney field, 20 miles from Brownwood. The Santa Anna Tile Co. factory received shakedown tests last week in preparation for the beginning of regular production on a new wall tile that has unusual market possibilities. Final construction was completed last week and company officials are assembling a crew

of 30 men for day time operation. All equipment in the building is new and includes special drying apparatus that has been developed during the plant's construction. H. L. Markland, of Santa Anna, is president of the corporation.

Coleman officials are waiting on a federal permit to put into operation new radio equipment in all police cars. The equipment was installed last week by Motorola radio technicians and has been checked for operation. A set has been installed at the city hall and cars will be able to talk to each other or the city station. Cost of the sets were \$300 each and the equipment will make possible much better protection.

The Winters Future Farmers of America chapter will be represented in the junior livestock show at the state fair, Dallas, with seven fat lambs. The boys have been feeding their animals during the summer to get them ready for the state competition. All stock will be taken to Dallas on October 19 and the final judging will be on October 21. The Winters chapter is busy at present with other feeding projects which will put a large number of animals in spring shows.

La Vonda Watkins, of Paint Rock, has been selected as the Concho county 4-H gold star girl. A member of the Paint Rock club four years, she has been very active, taking part in practically every phase of club work during that period. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs.

L. G. Watkins and her mother has served as president of the White Point home demonstration club.

Two officials of the state health department made a survey at Hamlin last week to check possible health hazards. The survey was ordered after an outbreak of typhoid fever. Hamlin physicians stated the disease was being held in check and the survey was to find where it had originated so that the cause could be eliminated. As soon as the findings are prepared state health officials will make a report at a mass meeting.

A large crowd was at Eden last Saturday night for a barbecue dinner and other entertainment. For several weeks Edenites had sold tickets in a wide area of West Texas. Purpose of the barbecue was to raise money for construction of a city park. The proposed site is 3 1/2 acres in Pfleger Mott, which is covered with pecan trees.

The Colorado City Kiwanis Club sponsored "Kid Day" last week which attracted a large crowd. "Kid Day" is an annual affair and has always brought the youngsters as well as their parents to town. After registering the kids saw a free movie before the lunch hour. At noon light refreshments were served and the children assembled for pictures and a parade. Following the parade a pet show was held, cash prizes being awarded in several classes. Free train rides, inspection of national

Lyle DePuy, 19-year-old blind youth, hitch-hiked his way into Ballinger the past week-end after being on the road for 2,550 miles in search of work. He went to the court house and asked officers to help him find employment.

Questioned on what he could do the young man told of his qualifications which included music, farming and various other jobs.

He lost the vision in his left eye at the age of 3 and in the right eye at the age of 6. When he became totally blind he had studied piano for two years and continued to work on music after taking up all brass wind instruments, organ, accordion and drums.

He attended the school for the blind at Columbus, Ohio, until he graduated. He reads braille and is fast on a typewriter.

He played in the school band while he was a student and later had a small orchestra of his own. He has also done work with V. F. W. and American Legion bands. He stated that the limited amount of playing he could do in the eastern part of the United States would not permit him to keep up his union dues and provide instruments. He said he had worked on farms during harvest seasons, handled horses and operated mechanical milking machines.

Young DePuy said that he had been educated to do things but the public had not been educated to give a blind man a chance.

He was given a job in a local cafe washing dishes and did a good job. He hopes to find some permanent employment in this part of the country.

Survivors besides the wife include a son, David Earl; decedent's mother, Mrs. C. C. Grissom, Seymour; a sister and four brothers.

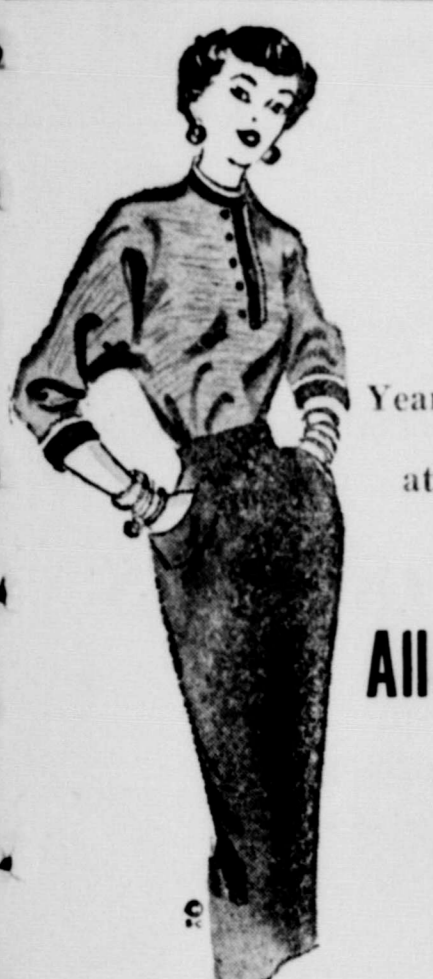

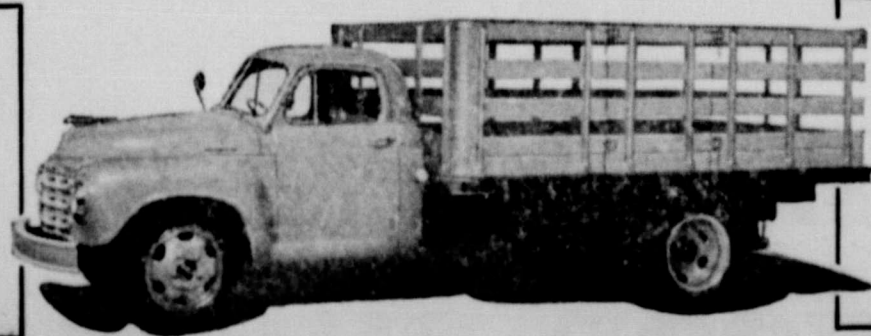

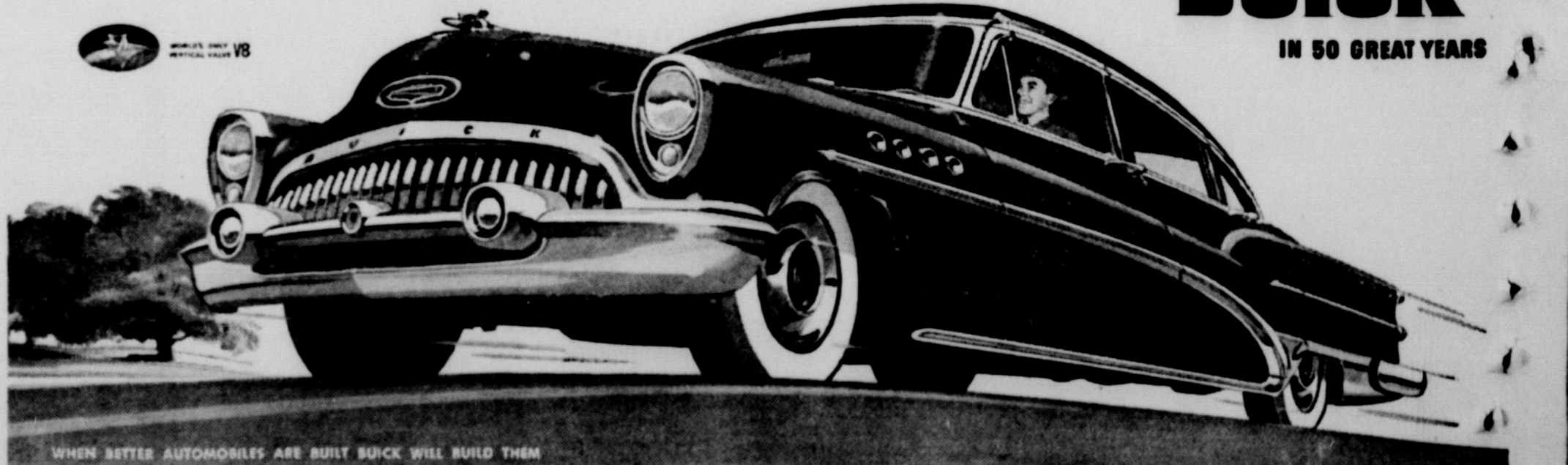
