Barton Suggests Control of Grubs For Cattle Herds tion from grubs.

By John A. Barton County Agent, Russels County October, November and December are the months to apply cattle grub control. Don't let cattle grubs rob you of beef, milk and leather profits. Control measures are simple, inexpensive and effective Check for grubs in the back of cattle by running your hand along the back on each side of the back bone and if knots or bumps are felt, then your cattle are grubby. Now is the time to

There are two methods of treatment. Where one has only a few cattle, just apply a mixture of 5% rotenone, mixed with two parts of tripoli, earth or volcanic ash to back A fruit jar with some 15 holes in lid will make a good shaker for dusting backs of cattle. A straight edge or stiff bristled brush should first be run along the back knocking off the scab that covers the opening of the grub. Then just rub the dust in with the fingers so that it will enter each opening.

The second method is by spraying. Use 742 pounds of 5% rotenone in 100 gallons of water then apply with a 250-pound pressure sprayer to the back of each animal, using about I to 11/2 gallons per animal Grubs are found along each side of the backbone from the hips forward to the point of the

Usually from 2 to 3 treatments are needed, one applied in October, one in November and if necessary the third in December, making the treat ments about 25 days apart.
